◆ Citizen Telephone Survey

The City has commissioned a private research company to conduct a random telephone survey of 400 likely local registered voters in Placentia to evaluate potential support on the recommendations and alternatives presented in the Budget Stabilization Plan. In particular, the survey will focus on a potential increase in the current utility users tax. The telephone survey will be administered during the course of this weekend. The results of the survey will be presented to the City Council at the May 20th meeting.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

◆ Senior Center Volunteer Appreciation Breakfast

The annual Senior Center Volunteer Appreciation Breakfast was held on Thursday, April 10th at 8:00 a.m. at the Placentia Senior Center located at the Edwin T. Powell Building. There were approximately 15 senior center volunteers and members of the Senior Advisory Committee in attendance. As a way to show the dedicated senior center volunteers our appreciation, the Community Services Department organized a pancake breakfast complete with fresh berries, bananas, eggs, bacon, hash browns, coffee, orange juice and apple juice. Each volunteer received a certificate of appreciation, a tote bag, a volunteer name badge and City of Placentia senior center volunteer polo shirt with an embroidered City logo. The volunteers were reminded how valuable they are to the operations at the Senior Center and without their dedicated work, the Community Services Department would not be able to provide the quality senior programming the community has been able to enjoy. ◆ Easter Eggcitement and Spring Carnival

The annual Easter Eggcitement and Spring Carnival event was held on Saturday, April 12th at Kraemer Park. The event was sponsored by the Placentia Library District, the Placentia Library Friends Foundation, the Placentia Rotary Club and the Placentia Women's Round Table Club. The event featured a pancake breakfast, face painting, game booths, nonprofit display booths, vendor booths, potato sack races, a cake walk, inflatables, an egg hunt area, a train ride, craft area, story time, and photos with the Easter Bunny! Overall this family friendly event was a big success, drawing over a 1,000 people throughout the day and providing several fun activities for free or at a low cost.



PUBLIC WORKS

◆ Safe Routes to Schools – School Signs Compliance

The City was approved for \$409,000 in Safe Routes to School (State) grant funding for the School Sign Compliance Project (the SSC Project). The SSC Project has upgraded all of the school signs and markings throughout the City, which includes school warning, crosswalk, and speed limit signs, as well as pavement legends. The signage and striping portion of the SSC Project is now complete and the City Council approved a Notice of Completion on April 1st. The procurement/installation of pedestrian count-down heads and School Route Plan maps is continuing and should be complete within the next couple of months. Once complete, the City will meet all Federal requirements necessary for proper school signage. City Staff is also beginning to prepare the public education and information related to providing the new safety measures for walking to our schools.



PUBLIC WORKS

◆ Richfield Road and Orchard Drive Traffic Signal

The Richfield Road Widening Project Cooperative Agreement, which included funding for the traffic signal, has been approved by both Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA) and the City of Placentia. Included within that agreement is a contribution of \$20,000 from the City of Yorba Linda, which shares a portion of the intersection with Placentia. The City of Yorba Linda has received an executed copy of the cooperative agreement and will now pay the City's invoice for their share (\$20,000). The City received bids for the project on January 21st. A contract for construction of the project was approved by the City Council at the February 18th City Council Meeting. The City held a pre-construction meeting on March 11th and a notice to proceed has been issued for March 17th. The contractor has started the project and is now ordering the traffic signal equipment. The construction contractor is anticipating all work to be completed by July, 2014.

◆ Bastanchury Road Rehabilitation

The City has received funding from a Rubberized Asphalt Grant to rehabilitate Bastanchury Road. The City contracted with an engineering firm for preparation of the designs and specifications for the project and the final plans are being reviewed by the City Engineer. All utilities have been contacted and continue to provide the City with their utility maps.

◆ City of Placentia and Yorba Linda Water District Turf Replacement Demonstration Project

The City and Yorba Linda Water District (YLWD) has replaced the existing turf, approximately 5,404 square feet, on the medians located on Yorba Linda Boulevard between Valencia Avenue and Linda Vista Street. The water conservation project promotes the use of artificial turf. The main portion of the project started on March 10th and was completed on March 18th. Based upon additional funding being available, the City has looked at other medians along Rose Drive, north of Palm Drive, to utilize the remaining amount of funds. The City is reviewing a proposal by the contractor for the work and will discuss with YLWD before moving forward.

◆ Demolition of 235 South Bradford

The demolition of the project began on March 17th and was completed on March 25th. The City has installed a temporary fence to keep pedestrians safe from the construction site and to mitigate any dust. The City is now working on the design of the site, which will be made into a public parking lot for the use of patrons visiting our downtown merchants. The City is currently reviewing the aesthetics for the landscaping, lighting and other amenities and it is anticipated the final design will be completed in early May. Bids for construction are anticipated in early June.

◆ City Hall ADA Improvements

As part of the federally mandated consent decree, the City is required to provide additional wheel chair compliant access to the City Council Chambers, as well as provide companion seating. In addition, the City is required to provide public counter access, via a lowered public counter space between the Finance Department and City Clerk's Office. City Staff received proposals the week of February 24th. The construction work for the counter in the City Clerk area occurred during Friday, March 28th to Sunday, March 30th. The City Council Chambers construction was complete on April 2nd. The City is now working with the contractor for proper signage, which will be installed this week.



PUBLIC WORKS

◆ Richfield Road Widening

Lakeview Avenue will be closed to traffic during construction of the Lakeview Avenue Railroad Grade Separation Project. Traffic will be detoured to Richfield Road as a primary detour route. The Orange County Transportation Authority has approved two cooperative agreement amendments for the project to assist in funding its completion. The improvements resulting from this project will alleviate an existing choke point on Richfield Road to allow for improved traffic flow. The project began on March 24th and is anticipated to be completed in early summer.

◆ Wilson Well – Golden State Water Company

Golden State Water Company (GSWC) is preparing a new water well at 202 Wilson Avenue. GSWC is working closely with the City to install a new storm drain through Kraemer Park and underneath Chapman Avenue, which is designed to connect to the City's storm drain system. This storm drain is only used during routine maintenance and discharging of the well. The work through Kraemer Park and on Chapman Avenue will be completed next week. The exploratory drilling phase of the project is anticipated to begin the same week. At this time it has not been determined how long the drilling will take; however the work will take place during the City's authorized hours for construction activity. The exploratory drilling will determine whether the site is suitable to provide enough water necessary to use the location as an operating well. If the site is sufficient, the well will be fully operational by Fall 2014. GSWC has indicated that the project construction will last thru July 18th. City Staff has been instructed to direct all calls and questions to Steve Brown with GSWC at 714-528-1463, ext. 101. GSWC has indicated that should the drilling become too obtrusive for nearby residents, temporary accommodations may be provided until the drilling is complete. In addition, a notice from GSWC will be distributed to adjacent residents that may want to obtain more information about the project.

◆ Orange County Transportation Authority Grade Separation

On Monday, March 24th, Southern California Edison (SCE) underground conduits providing service to Del Cerro Mobile Home Estates were damaged during the removal of existing retaining wall along the property. It was found that during the construction of the wall, underground SCE conduits were not relocated, but rather the footing for the retaining wall was poured over a portion of the conduits. The conduits and service were known by the contractor to be in the vicinity but it was not expected to have been casted into the bottom of the wall footing. The conduits were essentially pulled up as they pushed over the retaining wall as part of breaking it apart which then cut service.

SCE was on site performing other work and were able to quickly respond to the service disruption. A temporary quiet generator to provide electrical power Del Cerro was placed at the site and OCTA is handling noise complaints. SCE is looking at potential noise blankets around the generator until a permanent fix can be made which is expected mid to late May.

◆ Maintenance Division

The Building Maintenance Crew is working actively with Brea Electric at Arroyo Verde Park to obtain power to the walk lights throughout the park. This will help ensure better safety for visitors attending the park.

The City's asphalt crew has been working to fill potholes adjacent to the following bus stops: Chapman & Kraemer, Placentia & Nutwood and Chapman & Bradford.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

◆ Crime Prevention

Placentia Library Self Defense Class

As a representative of the Placentia Police Department, Officer Conroy assisted the Placentia Library with hosting a self-defense class on Saturday, April 19th. About a dozen adults attended the class and were very enthusiastic about learning the basics of self-defense. Officer Conroy taught grip escapes, distraction strikes, and how to strike the face. He also emphasized the importance of self awareness in public.

◆ Code Enforcement/Police Services Officers Activities

13 Courtesy Notices and 7 Administration Cites were issued, totaling \$1300.

April 14, 2014

Police Services Officers conducted regular safety checks on a male arrestee held for drunk-in-public. One arrestee was booked and transported to Orange County Jail.

April 15, 2014

One call for service was handled and a found property report was taken, with the property booked at Placentia Police Department. Four illegal signs were removed throughout the City. Three code enforcement courtesy notices and five parking cites were issued.

◆ Code Enforcement/Police Services Officers Activities

April 16, 2014

Police Services Officers made a follow-up to a prior report, responded to one call for service, and conducted a patrol check of the west alley of Moonbeam. Four arrestees were booked in the jail and all were transported to Orange County Jail. Four administrative citations were issued for expired business licenses.

April 17, 2014

Police Services Officer responded to one call for service, removed fourteen signs and issued seven courtesy notices. Two adults were booked in the jail and one was transported to Orange County Jail.

April 19, 2014

Police Services Officer booked and transported two prisoners to Orange County Jail, cited and released one additional prisoner from Placentia City Jail and issued six parking cites.

April 17, 2014

An Officer arrested a male adult for two felony arrest warrants off a traffic stop. Officers each arrested a male adult for DUI. All officers conducted numerous stops and patrol checks throughout the night.

April 21, 2014

At 4:08 p.m., officers responded to a vehicle versus bicycle injury traffic collision on Imperial west of Rose. A 12 year old juvenile female was riding her bicycle westbound on the south sidewalk of Imperial and was struck by a vehicle exiting the parking lot of 1150 E. Imperial. The juvenile was transported to Kaiser Hospital – Anaheim with non-life threatening injuries. At 5:15 p.m., officers responded to a vehicle versus pedestrian injury traffic collision on Rose north of Imperial. The adult male pedestrian was transported to UCI Medical Center with non life threatening injuries.
