ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

◆ Kraemer McDonald's Remodeling Project

The McDonald's Remodel Project is complete and open for business. The renovation of the site includes a new drive-thru, exterior façade improvements, a brand new interior and new landscaping throughout the site. The new and improved McDonald's is located in the Town Center Shopping Center (corner of Kraemer Boulevard and Yorba Linda Boulevard).





ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

◆ HQT Homes: Schaner Ranch Development

Clean up and grubbing of the Schaner Ranch property is well underway. During the course of cleanup, HQT's tree removal contractor accidentally had a tree fall on a power line, eliminating or reducing power to several homes within the area. The power was restored at 4:30 p.m. the same day. HQT is implementing best-management practices for future tree removals to eliminate dust and has brought a water truck to the site.



ENGINEERING AND CIP PROJECTS

◆ Richfield Road Widening

Richfield Road between Orangethorpe Avenue and Fee Ana Street has been closed to traffic. The County of Orange Public Works Department has placed a "stop work" notice on the Richfield Road Widening Project as a result of a change in the plans. A field meeting is set for Friday, May 23rd, to try and resolve the issue. Until the issue is resolved, Richfield Road will be closed to thru traffic across the flood control channel. The City's construction manager, designer, and contractor are all working on the issue to open the road as soon as possible.

◆ Richfield Road and Orchard Drive Traffic Signal

The Richfield Road Widening Project Cooperative Agreement, which included funding for the traffic signal, has been approved by both OCTA and the City of Placentia. Included within that agreement is a contribution of \$20,000 from the City of Yorba Linda, which shares a portion of the intersection with Placentia. The City received bids for the project on January 21st. A contract for construction of the project was approved by the City Council at the February 18, 2014 City Council Meeting. The City held a pre-construction meeting on March 11th and a notice to proceed has been issued. The contractor has started the project, but has been delayed as the result of further potholing needs due to unforeseen oil lines near the traffic signal locations. The potholing has occurred this week and the contractor will have the information they need to order the correct traffic signal equipment. The construction contractor is anticipating all work to be complete by August.

◆ Bastanchury Road Rehabilitation

The City has received funding from a Rubberized Asphalt Grant from CalRecycle to rehabilitate Bastanchury Road. The City contracted with an engineering firm for preparation of the designs and specifications for the project and the final plans are being reviewed by the City Engineer. All utilities have been contacted and continue to provide the City with their utility maps.





ENGINEERING AND CIP PROJECTS

◆ Metrolink Station/Packing House

A Notice to Bid for demolition services related to the demolition of the packing house was sent to contractors and placed on the City's website on April 24th. Bids are due May 29th. City Staff conducted a mandatory job walk this week on May 20th and May 21st for those demolition contractors interested in bidding on the project. The City expects to award a bid for this project sometime in June.

◆ Landscape Maintenance District

City Staff has brought before the City Council a resolution for the formation of a new Overlay Landscape Maintenance District (OLMD), which will assist to alleviate the current General Fund subsidy within the current LMD. The action by the City Council at the April 15th meeting provides for the ballot process to begin for formation of the District. City Staff will return to the City Council on June 3rd with the Engineer's Report and proposed ballot language for the new district. The Engineer's Reports for the original city lighting and landscape maintenance districts will also be brought before the City Council on June 3rd. A Public Hearing for the OLMD is proposed for August 5th.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

◆ DUI/Drivers License Checkpoint planned for May 23rd

Placentia Police Department Traffic Bureau will be conducting a DUI/ Drivers License Checkpoint on Friday, May 23rd at an undisclosed location within the city limits between the hours of 8:00 p.m. and 2:00 a.m.

Officers will be contacting drivers passing through the checkpoint for signs of alcohol and/or drug impairment. Officers will also check drivers for proper licensing and will strive to delay motorists only momentarily. When possible, specially trained officers will be available to evaluate those suspected of drug impaired driving. Drivers caught driving impaired can expect jail, license suspension, and insurance increases, as well as fines, fees, DUI classes, and other expenses that can exceed \$10,000.

Drunk and drugged driving are among America's deadliest crimes. In 2011, 774 people were killed and over 24,000 injured in alcohol and drug impaired crashes in California. The deterrent effect of DUI checkpoints is a proven resource in reducing the number of persons killed and injured in alcohol or drug involved crashes. Research shows that crashes involving alcohol drop by an average of 20% when well publicized checkpoints are conducted often enough.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), checkpoints have provided the most effective documented results of any DUI enforcement strategies, while also yielding considerable cost savings of \$6 for every \$1 spent and are supported by nearly 90 percent of California drivers. Based on collision statistics and frequency of DUI arrests, DUI checkpoints are placed in locations that have the greatest opportunity for achieving drunk and drugged driving deterrence. Locations are chosen with safety considerations for the officers and the public.

Funding for this checkpoint is provided to Placentia Police Department by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety. If you see a drunk driver, Call 9-1-1.

◆ Life Saving *Click It or Ticket* Mobilization Begins *Placentia Police Department Kicks Off High Visibility Enforcement*

The Placentia Police Department wants to remind motorists to *Click It or Ticket*. In order to enforce this reminder, beginning Monday, May 19th, officers will be joining in the 2014 National Seatbelt Enforcement Mobilization and cracking down on motorists who are not belted.

Even with a seatbelt usage rate of 97.4%, California still has 800,000 or more who aren't buckling up. In a crash, they stand a 50% greater chance of being killed than those who have taken the two seconds to buckle in. In an on-going effort to reach those remaining safety hold-outs, police, sheriff and the California Highway Patrol (CHP) departments across the state will be taking part in *Click It or Ticket* from May 19th through June 1st.

"With the motoring public beginning their summer vacations, we want to ensure that every family arrives at their destination safely," said Traffic Sergeant Scott Millsap, "It is the driver's responsibility to make sure that every occupant in their vehicle is properly wearing a seatbelt. If you are not wearing your seat belt, you will be ticketed."

According to new data released from the Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), fatalities are up nationwide for the first time in five years. In 2012, 10,335 people who were killed in motor vehicle crashes were not wearing their seat belts. NHTSA data also details how more traffic vehicle deaths occur at night. In 2012, 61% of passenger vehicle occupants killed during the nighttime hours of 6:00 p.m. – 5:59 a.m. were not wearing their seat belts.

"Wearing a seat belt is one of the easiest and best things you can do to protect yourself in the event of a car crash," said Rhonda Craft, Director of the California Office of Traffic Safety. "Taking a few moments to properly secure yourself and all your passengers before going on your way could mean the difference between life and death."

The cost for a seat belt violation in California for unbuckled vehicle occupants over age 16 is a minimum of \$161 for a first offense. The penalty fees for failing to properly buckle up any child under the age of 16 is a minimum \$490 per child for a first offense, plus a violation point will be added to the driver's record. If the parent is not in the car, the driver gets the ticket.

◆ Significant Events

May 14, 2014

Police Officers responded to an injury Traffic Collision on Placentia Avenue and Fender. Orange County Fire Authority and Fullerton fire had to cut the roof and both doors off a vehicle to remove the driver. He was transported to UCI as a trauma patient and is expected to survive.

Police Officers responded to a welfare check at a house located on the 300 block of Rainer. The reporting party let officers into the residence with a garage door opener. Officers found a 66 year male adult in a rear bedroom of the house. He had a self inflicted gunshot wound to the head. Detectives and the coroner responded to the location to further the investigation.

A few minutes after 3:00 a.m., Placentia Police Department received a call of a possible home invasion robbery on the 1000 block of Avenida de Pio Pico. Three men were ransacking a downstairs bedroom when they were interrupted by the homeowner. All three men were armed with handguns when they ordered the man to get them money from the master bedroom. Once back inside his bedroom, the victim locked himself inside and called the police. Despite arriving only minutes later, a search of the residence proved negative for the suspects. Ransacking and other evidence of the crime was present inside the house. Crime Scene Investigation as summoned to process the crime scene.

May 16, 2014

An Police Officer arrested a male adult for possession of prescription pills for sale on a traffic stop. Another Police Officer located and arrested a male adult for DUI after a caller reported him. A Field Training Officer and his trainee arrested a female adult for DUI after a caller reported her running several red lights and watched her park at CVS (Yorba Linda Blvd / Kraemer). A K9 Officer arrested a female adult for public intoxication after she was found passed out on somebody else's lawn.

May 17, 2014

Police Officers were sent out to the 300 block of Camarillo reference a report of two children who were missing. When the Police Officers arrived, the children (5 year old and 7 year old) had returned. They disclosed to their mother that two homeless men had led them to the homeless encampment near the railroad tracks under the 57 freeway. Police Officers responded and detained several homeless men. Field show-ups were conducted and two men were identified as being involved in the incident. The two men were arrested for suspected kidnapping. A third man was arrested for a felony warrant.

A local gang member assaulted his girlfriend and then barricaded himself in the attic of his home on the 900 block of S. Melrose when the police arrived. A SWAT callout was initiated. After several hours, the man finally gave up to SWAT officers. He was booked into Orange County Jail for several felony crimes.

◆ Significant Events

May 18, 2014

At approximately 3:55 a.m. on May 18, 2014, Placentia Police Officers were dispatched to the area of Melrose Street and Orangethorpe Avenue to investigate a 911 call reporting a domestic violence. The female victim was reporting she had been assaulted by her boyfriend and he was now chasing her. When officers arrived on scene, the male suspect fled from them. He was initially located hiding on a roof of a home in the 900 block of S. Melrose Street, but refused to surrender and barricaded himself in the attic of the home. Officers attempted to convince Medina to surrender peacefully from the attic, but he continued to refuse to do so. At approximately 5:30 a.m., North County S.W.A.T. was called to the scene to assist. At approximately 7:43 a.m., the suspect surrendered to S.W.A.T. officers and was taken into custody.

The suspect was arrested for felony Domestic Violence and resisting arrest. He was later booked into Orange County Jail.

The victim, who was found with visible injuries, refused medical treatment.

May 19, 2014

A male adult was arrested for possessing methamphetamine. A male adult was arrested for violating a served domestic violence restraining order. A male adult was arrested for outstanding arrest warrants. Police Officers responded to a death investigation at 212 Primrose. A 59 year old male was found deceased by a family friend.

◆ Code Enforcement

May 12, 2014

A patrol check of the 300 block of Aguirre was conducted with negative results. Two arrestees were booked and transported to Orange County Jail on warrants. Eight illegal signs were removed and two parking citations were issued. A Police Services Officer responded to eight calls for service and took one report.

May 14, 2014

A Police Services Officer responded to one call for service (palm fronds on power lines), eleven signs removed, two public works requests and four courtesy notices were issued. The Police Services Officer responded to Orangethorpe and Richfield to assist on an injury traffic collision. One impound was handled. One DUI arrestee was booked and released; one arrestee was booked and transported to Orange County Jail on felony drug charges.

Fire Outlook – Low:

Large fire potential will continue to be low through the end of the work week due to cool temperatures and relatively humid conditions. There will be some lightning near the higher terrain, but the storms should be accompanied by wetting rains in the mountains. However, Thursday afternoon, there is a chance for a couple new ignitions if the storms drift into the foothills and adjacent valleys of Southern California. The storms will be brief in nature and will not produce much in the way of downdrafts or wind. This weekend, warmer and drier weather will result in higher fuel receptivity to ignition. Although winds will remain light over the weekend, increased outdoor activity associated with the long holiday weekend may result in an increase in initial attack and resource demand. New starts this weekend should remain small as stable conditions and light winds will allow for only moderate rates of spread.
