◆ Kraemer McDonald's Remodeling Project

The McDonald's Remodel Project is nearly complete and celebrated its grand re-opening on May 31, 2014. The redevelopment of the site includes a new drive-thru, exterior façade improvements, a brand new interior and new landscaping throughout the site and is designed to be in line with McDonald's new corporate brand. The new and improved McDonald's is located in the Town Center Shopping Center (corner of Kraemer Blvd. and Yorba Linda Blvd.). Staff are working with the owner on some minor pedestrian improvements adjacent to the driveway to finish the entire development.



ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

◆ New Approval Process for Businesses in Placentia

In an effort to become more business friendly, the Development Services (DS) Department and Finance Department - Business License (BL) Division have worked collaboratively to improve the approval process for establishing new businesses within the community. A detailed brochure with a step-by-step outline of the improved process will be accessible at both the DS and Finance Department counters. Businesses can also access the brochure on the City website under Development Services and Business License. Attached is a copy of the revised brochure detailing the new streamlining process.

ENGINEERING AND CIP PROJECTS

◆ Safe Routes to Schools — School Sign Compliance

The City of Placentia was approved for \$409,000 in Safe Routes to School (State) grant funding for the School Sign Compliance Project (the SSC Project). The SSC Project has upgraded all of the school signs and markings throughout the City and includes school warning, crosswalk, and speed limit signs, as well as pavement legends. The procurement/installation of pedestrian countdown heads and School Route Plan maps is continuing and should be complete within the next couple of months. Once complete, the City will meet all Federal requirements necessary for proper school signage. City Staff is also beginning to prepare the public education and information related to providing the new safety measures for walking to our schools.

◆ Bastanchury Road Rehabilitation

The City has received funding from a Rubberized Asphalt Grant from CalRecycle to rehabilitate Bastanchury Road. The City contracted with an engineering firm for preparation of the designs and specifications for the project and the final plans are being reviewed by the City Engineer. All utilities have been contacted and continue to provide the City with their utility maps.



◆ Maintenance Division

Superior Pavement Markings has started conducting annual city-wide traffic striping. The new striping work started on Monday, June 2nd and is anticipated to be completed on Thursday, June 5th. Residents may experience slight traffic delays during the striping process. Please drive safely when crews are striping lanes.

◆ Special Olympic Torch Run



The Special Olympic Torch Relay made its way through Placentia on Friday, May 30th. Placentia Police Officers and City staff proudly carried the torch from the City limits at Placentia Avenue and Chapman Avenue to Brea City limits off Rose Drive. The runners were cheered on by students from Golden Elementary as they passed their school. As the largest grass-roots fundraiser and public awareness vehicle for Special Olympics, the Law Enforcement Torch Run raised over \$42.6 million in 2012. Since its inception in 1981, it has grown extensively worldwide with over 97,000 volunteers spanning 46 countries, and raising more than \$461 million for the Special Olympics movement.

May 28, 2014

May 28, 2014

At about 4:30 a.m. we received a call of a shooting in the area of Bradford and Chapman Ave. The reporting party was driving and reported that someone was shooting at them from a car driving next to them. She reported that a bullet struck their car. The reporting party was uncooperative and last reported driving north bound on the 57 freeway from Chapman and that the suspect had not followed onto the freeway. We were unable to locate a crime scene and the victim turned off her cell phone. Detectives were notified and took over the investigation.

May 29, 2014

Detectives identified the suspect in the May 28, 2014, shooting and arrested him in Garden Grove.

May 30, 2014

A man was brandishing a firearm at El Camino High School resulting in the school going on lock down. The victim and suspect fled from the area in different vehicles. The suspect vehicle was later stopped in Anaheim and he was arrested. A fight with a large crowd watching on Orangethorpe just east of El Camino High School a couple minutes later. Those who were fighting were detained and handled by the School Resource Officer.

A 13 year old girl was suicidal and armed with a knife in the 500 block of Chapman. Officers arrived and found her holding a knife to her chest. She was disarmed without incident and taken into custody.

Weather Outlook: *Normal to Slightly Above Normal Temperatures for May 31st – June 6th.* For more information, please visit the [National Weather Service Climate Prediction Center](#).

Fire Outlook – Low:

Sunny and warm weather over the next few days will continue to cause ignition components to be quite high during the afternoon hours. Dead fuel moisture will be pushing record low readings by the end of the weekend over much of Southern California. Live fuel moisture continues to decline and many areas on south and exposed areas are far below normal for this time of year. The low afternoon relative humidity during the last few days has left the high county of Southern California highly receptive to new starts, even in shady areas. Expect rapid rates of spread with the possibility of some ladder fuels becoming involved if a new start occurs. This weekend, warmer temperatures will increase large fire potential over the central part of the state, particularly the Sierra Foothills where fine fuel loading is much higher than Southern California. Some light initial attack will continue through the period. You can obtain a 7-day forecast, monthly and/or seasonal by clicking [here](#).

National Fire Preparedness Level: 2 (On a scale of 1-5, with Level 5 being the highest level of fire activity.) Description: Several Geographic Areas are experiencing high to extreme fire danger. Wildland fire activity is increasing, and large fires are occurring in one (1) or more Geographic Areas. Minimal mobilization of resources from other Geographic Areas is occurring. There is moderate commitment of National Resources with the potential to mobilize additional resources from other Geographic Areas.
