◆ City Receives the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting

For two years in a row, the City of Placentia's Finance Department has received the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting from the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) of the United States and Canada for the City's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR). The Certificate of Achievement is the highest form of recognition in the area of governmental accounting and financial reporting, and its attainment represents a significant accomplishment by a government and its management.

The CAFR has been judged by an impartial panel to meet the high standards of the program including demonstrating a constructive "spirit of full disclosure" to clearly communicate its financial story and motivate potential users and user groups to read the CAFR.

◆ Learn-to-Swim

The 2014 summer Aquatics program is set to open on Monday, June 23rd. Swim lessons will be held at Valencia High School Pool, Monday-Friday from 10:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m. and at El Dorado High School Pool on Mondays and Wednesdays from 6:00 p.m. - 8:00 p.m. Swim instruction is provided to youth ages 9 months - 12 years old and is taught by certified American Red Cross Water Safety Instructors. ◆ P.A.R.K.'s Program


The 2014 summer P.A.R.K.'s program will begin on Monday, June 23rd. We have two sites, Koch Park and Cathy Torrez Learning Center, which will be open Monday-Thursday from 1:30 - 4:30 p.m. Two additional sites, the Gomez Center and Whitten Center, will be open Monday - Thursday from 11:30 a.m.-3:00 p.m. Children attending the program are supervised by Community Services Staff who are trained in First Aid and CPR. The P.A.R.K.'s activities include sports, games, arts and crafts and special events. The City partners with the Friendly Center to provide additional academic resources and support for the P.A.R.K.'s programs. ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

◆ Placentia Farmers Market Returns

◆ Development Plan Review Streamlining

To facilitate a mutual goal of becoming more business-friendly while maintaining City standards, the Planning Commission and City Council have approved improvements to the City’s development plan review (DPR) process for certain small developments. The streamlined changes to the DPR include the following:

1. Modifying the exemption for exterior additions in the commercial and industrial zones from less than 250 square feet to less than 10% of the total square footage of an existing building;
2. Exemption of construction of commercial or industrial facilities on parcels of one acre or less;
3. Exemption construction of four or less dwelling units in a residential zone;
4. Modifying the exemption for accessory buildings from less than 250 square feet to less than 500 square feet.

The recommended DPR improvements will allow relatively minor expansions and/or small projects to be reviewed administratively. After Staff review of exempted DPR projects, if all City standards and development regulations are met and no other discretionary actions are required, the projects could then proceed into plan check. This new process will encourage investment in the City and promote an economic development friendly atmosphere within the City’s Development Services Division.

◆ Improved Approval Process for New Businesses in Placentia

In an effort to become more business friendly, the Development Services (DS) Department and Finance Department - Business License (BL) Division have worked collaboratively to improve the approval process for establishing new businesses within the community. The first step is for businesses to work closely with the DS Department in securing a Building and Zoning (B&Z) or Home Occupation permit. In this process, staff will verify zoning and proper use of proposed location. Once all requirements have been fulfilled through DS, new business owners can obtain a business license through the BL Division of the Finance Department. Upon business license payment, DS will release the B&Z or Home Occupation permit to the prospective business owner. A detailed brochure with a step-by-step outline of the improved process will be accessible at both the DS and Finance Department counters. ENGINEERING AND CIP PROJECTS

◆ Street Sweeping Request for Proposals

The City's contract for street sweeping services expires on September 25, 2014. To ensure the City is receiving the best service at a reasonable cost, Staff will be conducting a competitive bidding process for street sweeping services rather than extending the current contract. The draft request for proposals is complete and being reviewed by Staff. Based upon the current schedule, bids will be due on July 17th and an award of contract will go before the City Council on August 17th.

◆ Measure M Compliance and Traffic Signal Synchronization Plan Update

City Staff has completed the Measure M compliance package. The package includes checklists, CIP programs, Maintenance of Effort documents, and an updated Traffic Signal Synchronization Plan. The eligibility package is submitted annually and affirms the City's commitment to meet all requirements of Measure M. The City Council approved the Plan at the June 17th City Council Meeting. The City will receive approximately \$763,000 in Measure M funding next year.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

◆ Valencia High School Teacher Arrested

On June 11, 2014 at approximately 1:25 p.m., Placentia Detectives arrested Rebecca Eileen Diebolt, age 35, of Brea for Oral Copulation with a person under the age of 18 and Sexual Penetration with a person under the age of 18. Diebolt is a teacher at Valencia High School in Placentia.

On June 4, 2014, the victim contacted the Placentia Police Department and reported she had a sexual relationship with Diebolt from 2004-2008 when she was a student at the high school and Diebolt was her Language Arts teacher and also a swim/water polo coach at the school. The victim alleged she and Diebolt first formed a relationship when the victim was approximately 15 years old and the relationship later developed into a sexual one. According to the victim, she and Diebolt had multiple sexual encounters that occurred in Diebolt's classroom on the Valencia campus as well as Diebolt's home after school and on weekends. The victim alleges she and Diebolt continued their sexual relationship after she graduated from high school and while she was attending college as an adult.

After being assigned the case, Placentia Detectives investigated the victim's allegations, leading to Diebolt's arrest. Detectives arrested Diebolt without incident as she exited her vehicle in a shopping center parking lot in the 2500 block of East Imperial Highway in the City of Brea. Diebolt was later booked at the Orange County Jail with bail set at \$100,000.

Detectives are working to determine if there are any additional victims. Anyone with information concerning this case is encouraged to contact Placentia Detectives at 714-993-8146.

◆ Code Enforcement

June 9, 2014

The Police Services Officer handled one call for service, conducted patrol checks at Placentia Auto Body and investigated a possible code violation. Code Enforcement inspected 10 properties for code compliance, and assisted with traffic control at an injury traffic collision. One arrestee was booked in the jail.

June 12, 2014

The Police Services Officer responded to two calls for service, handled one flag-down/public assist, and conducted several patrol checks of Placentia Auto Body. One arrestee was transported to Orange County Jail and one courtesy notice was issued.

◆ Crime Prevention

Community Meeting

The Placentia Police Department was invited to speak at the Senior Forum at St. Josephs Catholic Church on Thursday, June 12th. Crime Prevention Officer M. Anderson and Lt. Alexander met with 16 members of the congregation. The meeting covered several topics including reporting suspicious activity to the Police Department, crime prevention for the Summer, and how to avoid frauds and scams. Also information was distributed regarding how to receive information on crimes that are occurring in Placentia and how to acquire notification on upcoming events.

◆ Significant Events

June 13, 2014

The Placentia Police Department's Traffic Division worked a DUI saturation detail. Police Officers observed two vehicles street racing. They coordinated with other Police units and both vehicles were pulled over. Both drivers were arrested for street racing. A Police Officer arrested a male adult for domestic violence. Another Police Officer arrested a male adult for DUI drugs. A Police Officer arrested a male juvenile for delaying/obstructing a Police Officer. A Police Officer made a traffic stop for expired registration. The female adult driver was found to be driving on a suspended driver's license. When she was asked to step out of the car due to it being impounded, she refused. The driver then kicked a Police Sergeant and she was arrested for driving on a suspended license/battery on a Police Officer.

June 15, 2014

At 4:02 p.m., Police Officers responded to 1700 block of Truman Circle for a welfare check. The reporting party stated that a 63 year old male subject with kidney and liver disease lived alone at the location and had not been seen or heard from in 4 days. Police Officers arrived and forced entry into the residence and located the male lying on the hallway floor in dire need of medical attention. Orange County Fire Authority responded and transported the male to Placentia Linda Hospital for further treatment.

A female adult was arrested for being under the influence of a controlled substance and obstructing/resisting arrest.

June 16, 2014

Night Watch personnel broke from briefing to assist Day Watch personnel with a burglary in progress at the Marshalls clothing store. As a result of their combined team effort, the burglar, a female, was located and arrested for burglary and outstanding warrants. As the investigation continued, an adult male accomplice was located and arrested for burglary as well.

June 17, 2014

A misdemeanor hit and run occurred at Orange Grove and Diamond. A witness reported that a black Mercedes collided with a fire hydrant, shearing the fire hydrant off at the base. During an area search for the vehicle, the vehicle was located in the 400 block of Twilight. As Police Officers were conducting their investigation where the vehicle was located, two males were contacted nearby, one being the registered owner of the vehicle. The driver of the vehicle could not be determined and a traffic collision report was taken and the vehicle was impounded.

At 4:55 p.m., Police Officers responded to 500 block of Melrose reference a structure fire. A machine inside of the business caught on fire and was out by the time officers and Orange County Fire Authority arrived on scene. No injuries were reported and Orange County Fire Authority handled the investigation.

Weather Outlook: *Normal to Above Normal Temperatures for June 20th – June 27^h.* For more information, please visit the [National Weather Service Climate Prediction Center](#).

Fire Outlook – Low:

There will be a low to moderate threat for large fire across the region through the forecast period. Fire growth and spread will be dominated by the fuels and topography through early next week, since no widespread strong winds are anticipated. Moderate rates of spread will be possible during the peak heating hours of the afternoon. Live fuels moistures will decrease more rapidly over the next week due to above normal temperatures and humidity in the single digits and teens. Any ignition that becomes large may be able to burn actively at night due to poor humidity recovery. Initial attack activity is expected to remain light through the forecast period. National Fire Preparedness Level: 2 (On a scale of 1-5, with Level 5 being the highest level of fire activity.) Description: Several Geographic Areas are experiencing high to extreme fire danger. There is moderate commitment of National Resources with the potential to mobilize additional resources from other Geographic Areas.
