The nomination period for candidates opens Monday, July 14<sup>th</sup> 7:30 a.m. and closes Friday, August 8, 2014, 5:00 p.m. Candidates must be residents and registered voters in the City of Placentia. Official nomination papers and candidate manuals will be available in the City Clerk's Office during the above referenced nomination period. ### ◆ Community Emergency Response Team (CERT)

## ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

### ◆ New Vendors at the Farmers Market

The Placentia Farmers Market continues to excite as news travels fast amongst Placentia residents and neighboring residents of the new location at the Placentia Town Center. Shoppers are happy and surprised to learn that the certified Farmers Market will continue every Tuesday from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. Two new vendors, the Old Town Baking Co. and Angelo's Farms, unveiled their offerings last week. It is anticipated that the certified Farmers Market will grow with a minimum of 20 unique and exciting vendors. Placentia Town Center is located at the corner of Yorba Linda Blvd. and Kraemer Blvd. A formal grand opening event is scheduled for Tuesday, July 15<sup>th</sup> at 4 p.m. with giveaways and entertainment.



### ◆ Placentia Green Bucks Program to Promote “Shop Locally and Support Placentia”

A new economic development program, Placentia Green Bucks, will begin on July 15<sup>th</sup> to promote our local business community through purchases at the Farmers Market. The “Placentia Green Bucks Program” rewards shoppers that spend fifteen dollars (\$15.00) or more at the Farmers Market with a five dollar (\$5.00) green buck certificate that can be used like cash on purchases at participating merchants.

### ◆ Development Plan Review Streamlining

To facilitate a mutual goal of becoming more business-friendly while maintaining City standards, the Planning Commission and City Council have approved improvements to the City's development plan review (DPR) process for certain small developments. The streamlined changes to the DPR include the following:

- Modifying the exemption for exterior additions in the commercial and industrial zones from less than 250 square feet to less than 10% of the total square footage of an existing building;
- Exemption of construction of commercial or industrial facilities on parcels of one acre or less;
- Exemption construction of four or less dwelling units in a residential zone;
- Modifying the exemption for accessory buildings from less than 250 square feet to less than 500 square feet.

The recommended DPR improvements will allow relatively minor expansions and/or small projects to be reviewed administratively. After Staff review of exempted DPR projects, if all City standards and development regulations are met and no other discretionary actions are required, the projects could then proceed into plan check. This new process will encourage investment in the City and promote an economic development friendly atmosphere within the City's development services division.



## ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

### ◆ Schaner Ranch Development

The Schaner Ranch Development continues to make progress. Residents will notice that site cleanup and tree removal is completed. The developer will now begin to stage construction equipment for grading work. The 45-day period for an outside developer to purchase the development has passed and HQT has notified the City that numerous offers were received and that they have selected Beazer Homes to deliver the development that was approved by the Planning Commission and City Council.



Beazer Homes is a national home-builder with its West Coast offices in Brea. HQT and Beazer will be hosting a joint meeting concerning the development at the Backs Community Building (201 N. Bradford Ave.) on July 16<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 pm. At the meeting residents will get a chance to receive more information on Beazer Homes and their previous developments as well as meet the Beazer staff.

## ENGINEERING AND CIP PROJECTS

### ◆ Landscape Maintenance District

Residents in specific areas of Placentia have long enjoyed parks and green landscaping along street medians, traffic islands, parkway vistas, and public rights of way that are maintained by the City through an assessment paid through property taxes. The existing assessment is no longer sufficient to adequately fund the associated utility costs (water, electricity and gas) as well as labor, equipment and materials. Ballots have now been mailed to all property owners in the Landscape Maintenance District. A brochure with additional information about the LMD and why a new assessment is necessary have been mailed out this week to all property owners. A Public Hearing for the proposed assessment is scheduled for the August 5<sup>th</sup> City Council meeting.



### ◆ Emergency Sewer Line Repairs on Orangethorpe Avenue

The City will begin repairs to a sewer line that was damaged on Orangethorpe Avenue. The line was damaged as a result of Southern California Edison relocating their high voltage distribution poles. City Staff is working with OCTA and the contractor of the grade separation to repair the line beginning next week. It is anticipated that one lane on Orangethorpe Avenue may require closure, for the duration of the two week project.



## POLICE DEPARTMENT

### ◆ DUI Enforcement Operations Planned this Weekend

Police Officers from the Placentia Police Department's DUI Enforcement Team will be deployed this weekend to stop and arrest alcohol and drug-impaired drivers in the Department's ongoing traffic safety campaign. Special roving DUI saturation patrols will take place on Friday, July 11<sup>th</sup> between the hours of 6:30 p.m. and 2:30 a.m. in areas with high frequencies of DUI collisions and/or DUI arrests.

Placentia Police remind everyone that they can assist in preventing DUIs from ever occurring. If you are planning a gathering or celebration with alcohol included, or if you are out on the town, plan ahead and designate a non-drinking sober driver. A DUI and drug-impaired arrest can cost up to \$10,000 or even more, including time in jail, the loss of your driver's license and high insurance rates. These enforcement efforts are funded by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. Remember, everyone is encouraged to help keep our roadways safe. Please report drunk drivers by calling 911.

### ◆ Crime Prevention

#### **Volunteers in Police Services (VIPS) and Police Chaplains**

The Placentia Police Department welcomes four new volunteers this week. Three new VIPS (Volunteers in Police Services) will be assisting the departments of Records and Property, and also assisting with Graffiti Checks. The other volunteer has joined our Chaplain Association. The Police Department is grateful to these individuals for choosing to donate their time as volunteers.

### ◆ Code Enforcement

#### **June 30, 2014**

### Weekly Update on Response and Preparedness

**Weather Outlook:** *Above Normal Temperatures for July 12<sup>th</sup> – July 18<sup>th</sup>.* For more information, please visit the [National Weather Service Climate Prediction Center](#).

#### **Fire Outlook – Low:**

The area with the highest large fire potential will shift later this week from the Sierras to the mountains of Southern California where drier afternoon conditions are expected. Low daytime relative humidity along with breezy weather in the desert interface areas such as the Banning Pass and the Antelope Valley will allow for elevated large fire potential in these areas Thursday and Friday. Expect rapid rates of spread and near total consumption of brush in any new start in this region. Lighter winds and a slight increase in relative humidity will keep large fire potential low this coming weekend. But a return of thunderstorms may result in the potential for new starts in the mountains of Southern California next Monday. Expect moderate initial attack in the central part of the state today, then light to moderate initial attack in Southern California Thursday and Friday. Very light initial attack and resource demand is expected this weekend. You can obtain a 7-day forecast, monthly and/or seasonal by clicking [here](#).

**National Fire Preparedness Level: 2** (On a scale of 1-5, with Level 5 being the highest level of fire activity.) Description: Several Geographic Areas are experiencing high to extreme fire danger. Wildland fire activity is increasing, and large fires are occurring in one (1) or more Geographic Areas. Minimal mobilization of resources from other Geographic Areas is occurring. There is moderate commitment of National Resources with the potential to mobilize additional resources from other Geographic Areas.
