ADMINISTRATION

◆ School Crossing Guards

As many residents are aware, the City has been facing significant fiscal challenges for several years. During the last year alone, the City faced a \$1.5 million dollar deficit and had to reduce services accordingly in order to adopt a balanced budget. During the City's annual budget planning session, the City made the difficult decision to reduce the paid crossing guard program for the Fiscal Year 2014/15 budget and examine a volunteer crossing guard program. Based on the California Department of Transportation's Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) and the City's limited funds, the City determined that it was able to fund 5 of the 16 locations for a budget savings of approximately \$110,000. In light of this situation, the City and the Placentia Linda Unified School District worked together to come to an amicable solution. As a result, the School District has agreed to cover the cost of the remaining 11 crossing guard locations for the 2014-15 school year ending in June. We will continue to work with the School District to determine a sustainable, long term solution for the crossing guard program and have begun to reach out to local PTA's to request volunteer sign-ups. Weather Outlook: *Above Normal Temperatures for September 21 – September 27.* For more information, please visit the [National Weather Service Climate Prediction Center](#).

Fire Outlook – Low/Moderate: Thunderstorms will be isolated overall and mainly confined to the deserts. But the ones that occur in the Cleveland and San Bernardino National Forests should produce some rainfall. In addition, local north winds over portions of the Los Padres National Forest will keep relative humidity recovery poor on the south side of the Santa Ynez Mountains tonight and Wednesday night. Look for large fire potential to drop over Southern California after Wednesday, but it may turn breezy Thursday afternoon in some of the desert interface regions. Some lightning may occur over the Sierra and the foothills, leading to an increase in initial attack potential in Central California Thursday into the weekend. Significant Emergency Incidents

Silverado Unincorporated

Vegetation Fire - September 12 - At 10:33 a.m., a medium watershed vegetation response was dispatched to a reported vegetation fire in the area of Silverado Canyon Road. The assignment was upgraded to a high watershed response after units reported a large header showing. Engine 15 arrived on scene and reported approximately 10 acres with a rapid rate of spread. The assignment was augmented with fixed wing aircraft and a type III strike team. The fire was determined to be on the forest resulting in CNF becoming the central ordering point. OCFA sent numerous overhead to help support the fire until USFS Team #2 could assume command. Three OCFA personnel suffered heat related injuries. They were treated and released at area hospitals.

Traffic Collision with Structure - September 13 - At 3:49 p.m., ECC received a report of a vehicle into a structure, and dispatched a traffic collision with structure response to North Euclid Street in Santa Ana. ECC received further reports of the vehicle now on fire, extending to the structure, and balanced the assignment to a structure response. Engine 78 arrived on scene at 3:58 p.m., reporting active fire, and assumed Euclid Incident Command. At 4:06 p.m., Engine 78 reported a patient, who was later transported advanced life support to UCIMC. Heavy Rescue 6 and a Santa Ana City Building official were requested, to assess structural integrity.
