ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

♦ Branding & Marketing

Allegra Consulting, which has been retained by the City to assist in the development of a unified brand and marketing strategy to attract retailers and improve economic development, has completed its first phase of the branding and marketing project. The first phase included conducting one-on-one meetings with various community stakeholders and a group community workshop. Topics of discussion included what makes Placentia special or unique, what story does it have to tell, where the City is headed, what types of economic development do residents want, etc. Allegra will now take the important community feedback and develop some sample economic development documents to discuss with the City.



ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

◆ Placentia Station Kickoff Event on Wednesday, October 29th

The City will be commemorating the kickoff of the new Placentia Station in the City's historic downtown on Wednesday, October 29th at 10:00 a.m. at the former Placentia Orange Growers Association Building, 209 W. Crowther Avenue. The Placentia Station will be the newest stop on the 91 Line connecting the Inland Empire to Downtown Los Angeles. The development of the Placentia Station will help to revitalize the City's historic downtown and provide an essential transportation service for the region. The contractor has already installed temporary fencing and will soon begin the abatement of hazardous materials. Upon completion, the site will be fully fenced for the construction of the south platform of the Metrolink Station and a possible Transit Oriented Development. ◆ Old Town Santa Fe District Revitalization Plan

On Wednesday, October 15th, the City released a request for proposals (RFP) for various planning firms to submit proposals regarding preparation of an Old Town Santa Fe District Revitalization Plan (Plan). The purpose of the Plan is to 1) prepare a Master Plan, which will outline the public infrastructure improvements needing to be undertaken within the downtown; and 2) prepare a Specific Plan, which will outline guidelines for private development within the downtown. The overarching goal of the Plan is to revitalize the Old Town Santa Fe District. The due date for planning firms to submit proposals to the City is Wednesday November 5. ◆ Retail Gap Analysis Study

Recently, City Staff, in partnership with CB Richard Ellis, presented a comprehensive Retail Gap Analysis Study (Study) to the City's Economic Development Committee and City Council. The Study was one of several economic development work plan items designed to fulfill the City's adopted Economic Development Plan.

The purpose of the Study is to illustrate the amount of retail leakage that is occurring within our City. Retail Leakage (Gap) can be defined as the amount of retail purchases Placentia residents are making which are occurring outside of the City, thereby outlining the opportunity to create more retail within Placentia. The Study also defines Gap categories, such as grocery and restaurants. Highlights of the Study include the following:

- The City has a \$200 million retail sales gap
- Major gap voids include grocery, general merchandise and clothing
- The City has a \$116 million gap alone in the food & beverage category, including restaurants
- \$500,000 to \$2 million is available in potential sales tax through better capitalization of existing assets (retail centers) and creating new development
- The City's vacancy rate (8%) is comparable to surrounding cities; however is higher than the Orange County overall vacancy rate (4.8%)
- There is a large amount of "non-retail" uses (45%) within the City's existing retail centers
- Non-Retail uses (45%) exceed retail uses (40%) within the City's retail centers

Staff will use the Study results as an economic development tool to demonstrate the "retail opportunity" within Placentia to prospective retailers. Staff will also be able to utilize this information to better determine what changes the City may need to make in its zoning code in order to increase the amount of retail businesses within our limited commercial centers. ENGINEERING AND CIP PROJECTS

◆ 235 Bradford Avenue Parking Lot

On September 16th, the City Council awarded a construction contract to CHI Construction for a twelve (12) space parking lot at 235 South Bradford Avenue. The project will improve traffic flow and provide additional parking for visitors of the downtown area. A pre-construction meeting was held on October 7th. The contractor will begin construction of the parking lot on Monday, October 27th. The parking lot is anticipated to be completed the end of November in time for the holiday season.

◆ Richfield Road and Orchard Drive Traffic Signal

The construction work for a traffic signal at Richfield Road and Orchard Drive is currently underway. The foundation for the traffic signal poles has been poured and the traffic signal equipment has arrived for final installation. The traffic signal poles will be installed this week. The final step is to energize the traffic signal through coordination efforts with Southern California Edison. This process is anticipated to take one to two weeks. Once activated, the traffic signal will flash red for motorists to become accustomed to a new traffic signal at the intersection. After a few days the traffic signal will be functioning normally.

Community Meeting

POLICE DEPARTMENT

◆ Significant Events

October 17, 2014

A Police Officer arrested two known and repeated narcotics offenders for felony narcotics possession at Atwood Park. A rollover traffic collision occurred on Rose Drive and Del Cerro along the bypass road. The driver entered the curve too fast and lost control of the vehicle. The vehicle collided with a concrete K-Rail and ultimately flipped over causing non-life threatening injuries to the driver and her two passengers. The driver was arrested for felony DUI.

October 19, 2014

A Police Officer attempted to stop a vehicle leaving the Atwood Park area. The vehicle, which failed to yield to the Police Officer's emergency lights, drove recklessly through the dirt lot and alleyways at Cherry and Depot before finally stopping on the 200 block of S. Lincoln. The driver quickly exited the vehicle as if he was going to run but stopped when confronted by the Police Officer. The man, a known Atwood gang member, was arrested for evading a Peace Officer, child endangerment, and probation violation.

Officers responded to Kelly's bar in the 900 blk. E. Yorba Linda regarding a male brandishing a knife at the bartender after being refused entry. Upon arrival the man had left on foot, however, officers located him approximately one block away. The bar staff positively identified the subject and made a citizen's arrest. A large folding knife was located.

October 20, 2014

A Police Officer was involved in a pursuit that terminated at 212 S. Kraemer. The suspect fled into a nearby apartment. After a short period of time, Police Officers were able to gain cooperation from the suspect who came out of the apartment and surrendered.

October 21, 2014

An attempted commercial burglary occurred at CVS Pharmacy, 100 block of Yorba Linda. Two males entered the store and went to the pharmacy. One male hopped the wall and attempted to steal bottles of prescription mouthwash. The male was shooed away by the pharmacist and the two males ran out of the store and fled the area in a black four door vehicle. A crime report was generated and a Crime Scene Investigation was conducted.

Weekly Update on Response and Preparedness

Weather Outlook: *Normal to Slightly Above Normal Temperatures for October 25 – October 31.* For more information, please visit the [National Weather Service Climate Prediction Center](#).

Fire Outlook – Low: Large fire potential will be low overall during the next few days due to light winds. However, warmer and drier conditions may allow for a higher number of new starts as burning indices will be quite high across inland areas each afternoon through Friday. This weekend, the highest likelihood of a large fire may be across the desert interface regions such as the Banning Pass and the eastern Cleveland National Forest where conditions will be quite windy this weekend. Even though relative humidity will be higher over most areas by Saturday, new starts in these regions may grow quickly due to strong surface winds. Next week, some light offshore flow may occur Monday, but winds are not expected to be strong enough to raise the Santa Ana Wildfire Threat Index beyond the "no rating" category.
