◆ Update on the Citizens Fiscal Sustainability Task Force

The Citizens Fiscal Sustainability Task Force have had five meetings thus far to discuss the City's fiscal condition and potential cost reduction and revenue enhancement solutions. The Task Force will be meeting on Thursday, May 7th and Tuesday, May 12th at 6:00 p.m. in the Community Meeting Room to discuss long term sustainable solutions to eliminate our budgetary deficit, establish a healthy reserve, build on our operations, and address the City's deferred infrastructure improvements. We anticipate presenting these recommended solutions to the City Council at the May 19th City Council Meeting. ◆ Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Training

The Spring Edition of Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Training concluded on Saturday May 2nd. The training was offered by the cities of Placentia, Brea, and Yorba Linda in conjunction with the Orange County Fire Authority. The final drill was conducted at the Placentia Corporation Yard and the elected officials from Placentia, Brea and Yorba Linda attended the final day recognizing the CERT graduates at the conclusion of the drill. Special thanks to the CERT volunteers that came back to assist on the final day.

CERT is a training program that prepares you to help yourself, your family, and your neighbors in the event of a disaster. During an incident, emergency service personnel may not be able to reach everyone right away. By getting trained in CERT, you will have the skills to help emergency responders save lives and protect property. As a member of a CERT team, you can respond to disasters, participate in drills and exercises, and take additional training. CERT teams are known and trusted resources to emergency responders and their communities. The next CERT class will be held in October and will be hosted by the City of Placentia. ♦ Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Services (RACES)

April 29, 2015

At 9:12 p.m. an underground transformer explosion/fire was reported near a pool area on the 300 block of Chapman. Responding units assisted Orange County Fire Authority with evacuations and a safety perimeter. Edison also responded and made the area safe within one hour. Residents in the complex were without power until repairs were completed the next day.

Building Division Activity

1. Building permits for phase five (5) of the Beazer Homes (T-17145) @ Kraemer & Morse have been issued on 5/4/15. There are a total of eight single family homes in this phase. Total construction valuation is \$2,300,000.
2. Residential remodeling building plans for a single family home at Ave. Alvarado St. have been reviewed and approved by the Building Division on 5/4/15. Scope of work includes removing existing non-bearing walls, add new bath rooms, new plumbing and electrical fixtures.
3. Cell site improvement plans for AT&T Wireless center @ 378 E. Orangethorpe Ave. have been reviewed and approved by Planning and Building Divisions on 5/5/15. Scope of work includes new antennas, new equipments cabinets, new electronic devices attached to the existing cell tower.
4. Tenant improvement plans and structural calculations for an industrial building (Suburban Propane) at 535 S. Melrose St. were reviewed and approved by Planning & Building Divisions on 5/4/15. Scope of work includes new interior office space, T-bar ceilings, 2 new bathrooms, HVAC, electrical fixtures, new ADA in compliance parking spaces and accessibility for all interior doors, entrances and exits. Cost of the construction is \$135,000.

Yorba Linda

Vegetation Fire – April 30 - At 1:23 p.m., an Initial Attack Vegetation Fire response was dispatched to the area of the westbound 91 near Yorba Linda Boulevard in Yorba Linda, for the report of a vehicle fire on the right shoulder of the freeway. The vehicle was located at approximately 1335 hours with no extension to the surrounding vegetation. One unit was able to handle the fire and the balance of the response was cancelled.

Yorba Linda

Vehicle Fire – April 30 - At 4:18 p.m., ECC received a call from Metro Net reporting CHP on scene of a vehicle fire; in turn, they dispatched a Vehicle Fire response to the area westbound 91 near Weir Canyon Road in Yorba Linda. In checking with CHP the ECC could not verify that a CHP unit was on scene and they began to get 9-1-1 calls reporting the fire. At 4:21 p.m., the ECC balanced the call to an Initial Attack Vegetation Fire response and the additional units were dispatched. The first arriving unit found a vehicle on the right shoulder, fully involved, with extension to the nearby vegetation. At 4:31 p.m. the vehicle fire was knocked down and the surrounding vegetation was quickly contained. The incident was handled by the first two engines on scene and the medic van.

Mission Viejo

Natural Gas Leak – May 1 - At 9:05 p.m., Truck 9 was dispatched to a reported natural gas leak on Los Altos in Mission Viejo. Truck 9 arrived on scene and reported that a large gas line supplying the complex had been compromised. The assignment was augmented with Battalion 4, Engine 9 and Engine 24. The Sherriff's Office assisted with evacuating the surrounding apartments by using the reverse 911 system. The gas company arrived on scene and isolated the leak and the scene was turned over to the Sherriff's Office for a possible crime scene. Residents were allowed to return their apartments by 11:20 p.m.

Structure Fire – May 2 - At 10:58 a.m. a Structure Fire response was dispatched to OCFA Fire Station 56 on Sendero Way in San Juan Capistrano. First arriving units found heavy black smoke showing and began to investigate. The investigation revealed a fire in some construction material on the roof of the structure. The Primary All Clear was given at 11:14 a.m. and the fire declared Under Control at 11:23 a.m. The fire was primarily confined to the materials on the roof with limited damage to the inside of the structure.

Remote Rescue – May 2 - At 4:39 p.m. a Remote Rescue response was dispatched for the Aliso Woods Canyon Park area in Laguna Niguel, for the report of a bicyclist that had fallen near the intersection of Lynx Trail and Wood Canyon Trail. Ground units were able to drive directly to the patient, loaded the patient into the Park Rangers vehicle and he was driven out of the park to be evaluated by awaiting paramedics. The balance of the responding units were cancelled.

Remote Rescue – May 3 - At 5:17 p.m., a Remote Rescue was dispatched to Aliso Woods Canyon for a mountain biker down. Patrol 57 and Medic 57 were able to make access to the patient. The male presented with a traumatic head injury. Helicopter 2 was able to lower the stokes basket, the medic and the ALS equipment first, then go pick-up the rescuer off of Truck 9. The patient was then hoisted and transported directly to Mission Hospital as a trauma patient. The fact that a paramedic rescuer was assigned to Helicopter 2 expedited the transport and allowed Medic 57 to remain in service after care was transferred to Helicopter 2.

Structure Fire – May 5 - At 4:26 p.m. a Structure Fire response was dispatched to Graham Street in Cypress. As units were en route they observed heavy smoke in the area of the fire and asked for the balance of the Working Structure Fire response. First arriving units found a two story multi-family dwelling with numerous vehicles on fire in the carport/garage area under the second floor of the structure.
