## ◆ Employee of the Quarter - Sergeant Brian Perry

Interim City Administrator Damien Arrula announced at Tuesday's City Council Meeting that Placentia Police Sergeant Brian Perry has been selected as the most recent Employee of the Quarter. Sergeant Perry was hired by the Placentia Police Department in January 2001 after working for the Los Angeles Police Department and the MTA Police Department. In 2004 Sergeant Perry was selected to work with the Department's Special Enforcement Detail as a Gang Detective, an area of focus that Sergeant Perry had demonstrated a great deal of interest in when he was assigned to patrol. Sergeant Perry had demonstrated an ability to communicate and build relationships and partnerships with community and family members in those neighborhoods where related crimes and issues were most prevalent. Sergeant Perry was later promoted to the position of Gang Investigator within the Gang Unit and was responsible for the investigation, filings and prosecution of gang cases within Placentia, including investigating all gang related homicides. Sergeant Perry was recognized by the courts and the Orange County District Attorney's Office as an expert in the area of criminal street gangs, not only in Placentia but throughout other areas of Orange County.

In 2008, Sergeant Perry tested for the position of Sergeant and was successful in that process and returned to the Patrol Division as a Field Supervisor. In the summer of 2013, Sergeant Perry was selected to return to the Special Enforcement Detail (SED) this time as the supervisor. In doing so Sergeant Perry found himself tasked with so much more. With limited staffing, Sergeant Perry took the initiative and began supervising both the Bureau and SED. This was done simultaneously as he reviewed cases and submitted them for criminal filing. Sergeant Perry also assisted other Detectives and showed a commitment to work that demonstrated an "above and beyond" attitude.

Because of this commitment to duty and service to the community of Placentia, Sergeant Perry has been selected as the Employee of the Quarter.

## ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

### ◆ The Exchange at Gateway Ribbon Cutting and Santa Fe Drive Street Dedication

Council Member Craig Green and City Staff attended the Exchange at Gateway Ribbon Cutting and Santa Fe Drive Street Dedication on Thursday, October 22nd in the City of El Monte. The new Transit-Oriented Development (TOD) is a one-of-a-kind smart-growth development in the heart of the San Gabriel Valley. This unique project is adjacent to the Metro Station which serves more than 35,000 riders per day and is considered one of the largest transit centers in the Western United States. The initial phase of this project includes a 485 units of housing and more than 25,000 square feet of retail commercial.

TOD is rapidly sweeping the nation and the public has embraced the concept as the most desirable places to live, work, and play. Real estate developers have quickly followed to meet the high demand for quality urban places served by rail systems. Transit Oriented Development is also a major solution to the serious and growing problems of climate change and global energy security by creating dense, walkable communities that greatly reduce the need for driving and energy consumption. This type of living arrangement can reduce driving by up to 85%.

This project is very similar to Placentia's Transit Oriented Development (TOD) project that is currently in the rezoning planning phase along the future Metrolink Station Platform. The City is currently working with a specialized planning firm to rezone the area to create a vibrant, livable, sustainable community adjacent to the Metrolink Station. Our proposed development would focus on walkable, mixed-use communities centered around the Metrolink Station.

### ◆ Significant Events

#### **October 16, 2015**

A residential burglary occurred in an apartment complex on the 800 block of W. La Jolla in which a male suspect removed the screen from a 17 year old female’s window and climbed inside her home. Once inside the bedroom, the suspect took off his shirt, but was immediately confronted by the girl’s father and fled the area. Police Officers located the subject a short distance away and ultimately took him into custody after a short struggle.

A male parolee became upset after an argument with his girlfriend and broke several vehicle windows and the front window of a business in the 1100 block of E. Yorba Linda Blvd. Police Officers were able to locate the subject as he was returning to his residence and he was subsequently arrested for felony vandalism.

#### **October 17, 2015**

At 5:27 pm, St. Jude Hospital called regarding a patient in the Emergency Room with two stab wounds who was being transferred to UCI Medical Center for further care. The victim stated the attack may have occurred near the McDonald’s on Placentia Ave. The victim is in stable but critical condition.

An investigation revealed a stabbing victim who was also the victim of a robbery with the crime occurring on the railroad property south of the west alley of the 300 block Camarillo. K-9 Officer assisted the California Highway Patrol and Orange Police Department units with a pursuit that terminated in front of the Emergency Room doors at Kaiser Anaheim. Police Service Dog Habo assisted in apprehending the suspect just as he reached the doors to enter the hospital.

## **Building Division Activity**

1. Tenant improvement plans for an industrial building located at 1031 South Melrose St. were submitted and reviewed by Planning and Building divisions on October 12. Scope of work includes new office space, conference room, quality control office area, storage and employee break rooms. It also includes restroom renovations per ADA regulations, new T-bar ceilings, HVAC and plumbing fixtures, and storage racking systems. The cost of the construction is \$300,000.00
2. Solar panel installation plans of total eight (6) homes were reviewed and approved by the Building Division on October 13. These installations are for single-family detached houses.
3. Tenant improvement plans for an industrial property located at 950 South Richfield Rd. was submitted and approved by the Building Division on October 14. Scope of work will be adding structural concrete foundations for different new machineries. The tenant is a major manufacturer of the aerospace industry.
4. New Use Permit plans (UP) 2015-06 for a new business application (Laser Island) located at 1840 N. Placentia Avenue were submitted for review and comments on October 13. This business will be occupying approximately 10,000 sq. ft. of total floor area without door recreational facilities such as a miniature golf course.

**Structure Fire – October 15** - At 4:14 p.m. a Structure Fire response was dispatched to Montego Way in Tustin. First arriving units found a single story detached garage fully involved in fire and asked for the balance of the Working Structure Fire response. The fire was quickly brought Under Control at 4:30 p.m.

### Orange

**Medical Aid – October 20** - At 4:31 p.m. Helicopter 1 responded to a reported Medical Aid in Santiago Oaks Regional Park in the City of Orange. As they arrived on scene ground units were making contact with the patient who was lying on the ground on a single track trail. Orange Rescue 4 advised that the patient had a lower leg fracture and would need to be transported via helicopter to the ER. Helicopter 1 found an area to flat pitch land 100 yards from the patient. Once the patient was treated and loaded into the Stokes Basket the patient was then carried to the aircraft. Both Medics from Orange Rescue 4 maintained patient care enroute to Orange County Global Medical Center, Santa Ana, arriving at approximately 5:11 p.m.

### Villa Park

**Vehicle into Structure – October 21** - This morning at approximately 11:30 a.m., units from the Orange County Fire Authority and the City of Orange Fire Department responded to Aubrey Circle in the City of Villa Park for a report of a vehicle into a structure. The first arriving unit confirmed that a vehicle had driven through the garage door and a load-bearing garage wall. The driver, the homeowner, was still inside the vehicle. Paramedics assisted the patient out of the car and assessed him for injuries. The patient, an 82 year old male suffered no injuries and was treated and released at the scene.

Orange County Fire Authority Urban Search and Rescue (US&R) units (Truck 34 and Heavy Rescue 6) were requested to assist in removing the vehicle from the garage and stabilizing the wall that was compromised. A Villa Park building department official responded to the scene and “red-tagged” the garage. The remainder of the residence was still habitable and the homeowner was allowed to stay.

### Santa Ana

**Structure Fire – October 21** - At 6:22 p.m., a structure fire response was dispatched to West 2nd Street in Santa Ana. Engine 75 arrived onscene at 6:26 p.m. reporting heavy smoke showing and balanced to a working fire assignment. Engine 75 established “2nd Incident Command” and reported knockdown and primary all clear at 6:32 p.m. Red Cross responded for three displaced adults and one minor. A building official made contact with Battalion 9.
