◆ Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Training

The Fall Edition of the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Training concluded on Saturday November 7th. The training was offered by the cities of Placentia, Brea, and Yorba Linda in conjunction with the Orange County Fire Authority. The final drill was conducted at the Placentia Corporation Yard and Placentia's Mayor Chad Wanke and elected officials from Brea and Yorba Linda attended the CERT Ceremony to recognize the graduates. A special thanks to the CERT volunteers that came back to assist on the final day.

CERT is a training program that prepares you to help yourself, your family, and your neighbors in the event of a disaster. During an incident, emergency service personnel may not be able to reach everyone right away. By getting trained in CERT, you will have the skills to help emergency responders save lives and protect property. As a member of a CERT team, you can respond to disasters, participate in drills and exercises, and take additional training. CERT teams are known and trusted resources to emergency responders and their communities. The next CERT class will be held in April and will be hosted by the City of Placentia. ◆ Water Line Installation

◆ Storm Season Preparation

The City and the Public Works Department are preparing for the upcoming storm season. Public Works crews cleaned a total of 536 storm drains to minimize potential flooding issues due to clogged storm drain lines. In the upcoming weeks, they will be performing tests and inspections of the City's storm water pump stations.

The City has 2,200 sand bags and 46,000 pounds of sand available for residents to use on their properties. Residents may pick-up sand bags at the City's Corporation Yard located at 2999 La Jolla St. from Monday through Thursday from 6:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Residents will need to show identification to prove City residency and bring their own shovel to fill up the bags with sand. Each resident is allowed up to 10 sand bags.

The Orange County Fire Authority also offers sandbags to residents at Fire Station 34 located at 1530 N. Valencia Avenue, Placentia, CA 92870. The Station's limit is 10 bags per resident and pick-up times are 24/7 at the self serve Fire Station (permitted there is sand available).

◆ Posthumous Presentation Honoring Placentia Police Department Lt. Alexander's Service to the Turkish-American Community

At the City Council meeting of November 17th the City of Placentia received a special presentation in honor (posthumously) for one of its own. It has been a year since the passing of Police Lt. Kenneth Alexander, who had served the Department as a patrol commander but also served others as well. The community may not have known that Lt. Alexander, along with working for the Placentia Police Department and being a decorated U.S. Army veteran, also worked for the U.S. State Department and was assigned to the Turkish Consulate in Los Angeles. Lt. Alexander worked as part of the security and protection detail for the Turkish Consul General and her staff. Lt. Alexander not only did a job, but built great partnerships and friendships with the Turkish Consul staff as they rotated in and out of their assignments in the Los Angeles area. Lt. Alexander in so many ways was a true ambassador for the United States. Lt. Alexander was able to share that experience with residents here in Placentia that are from Turkey and active in the Turkish-American community of southern California.



At Tuesday night's City Council meeting, the Vice Consul of Turkey, Yavuz Selim Cankal and Placentia resident Turgut Cakiraga presented Mayor Wanke and Police Chief Ward Smith with a special plaque recognizing and appreciating Lt. Ken Alexander for his commitment to service to not only his community, Placentia, but the greater southern California Turkish-American community.

November 11, 2015

A commercial burglary at Walgreens on the corner of Rose and Yorba Linda was reported by staff when they arrived to work that morning. The theft appeared to be 2 bottles of cough medicine with codeine. Police Officers were able to obtain surveillance footage from the incident.

November 12, 2015

Police Officers responded to Valencia High School to assist Child Protective Services with a female that claimed that she was raped. The incident happened in the south end of the city six months ago by a known suspect. A report was taken and detectives were notified.

November 13, 2015

Police Officers were extremely proactive making numerous traffic stops and pedestrian checks which resulted in 6 arrests and several vehicles impounds.



POLICE DEPARTMENT

◆ Significant Events

November 13, 2015

At approximately 12:17 p.m., Police Officers responded to calls of a vehicle into a building at the U.S. Post Office located on the 1600 block of E. Orangethorpe. The driver of the vehicle, an 83 year old man, was not injured as a result of the collision. The driver stated that he turned off of Lincoln and into the parking lot. He attempted to brake, but claimed the brakes failed. He struck the curb, a large cement / wood pillar outside (sheering it off at the base), and continued into the east door of the post office. The Post Office lobby was unoccupied at the time of the collision. Due to the structural damage to the building, the Building Inspector red tagged the post office and one additional business east of the post office until emergency repairs were completed to shore up the roof line of the building.

November 15, 2015

A vehicle fire occurred in the 100 block of Southampton inside a condo complex. The vehicle, a white work van, had electrical problems and it is believed that was the cause of the fire. Two residences were evacuated as a precautionary measure. Orange County Fire Authority and the Fullerton Fire Department handled the fire.

November 16, 2015

A domestic violence incident occurred in the 100 block of west Orangethorpe in Placentia. The victim was found in the City of Fullerton after a second incident occurred there when the suspect struck the victim with a vehicle. Police officers went to the original crime scene and located the suspect. He was subsequently arrested for domestic violence charges.

November 17, 2015

Police Officers were dispatched to the area of Madison and Aquamarine with an assault in progress. Numerous 911 calls were received. Police Officers located a male and female in the area and the male was subsequently arrested for domestic violence charges for assaulting the woman.

November 18, 2015

Police Officers were sent to a residence on the 400 block of Somerset for a medical aid. A man at the location had gone unconscious and stopped breathing. The Police Officer who arrived first on scene began CPR. When Paramedics arrived, they took over treatment. The man was transported to Placentia Linda Hospital.

Police Officers responded to a construction site to the rear of Mi Casita restaurant. Workers uncovered bones during an excavation project after removing part of the restaurant foundation. Detectives responded to the location. The bones were determined to be that of a horse.

Building Division Activity

1. Tenant improvement plans and structural calculations for a commercial office building located at the Northwest corner of Orangethorpe and Lakeview Ave. were reviewed and approved by the Planning and Building divisions on November 9. This building was posted as an unsafe for occupancy building by the Building Division several months ago due to the sinking of the 2nd floor balcony. The property owner has since hired a licensed California structural engineer to prepare all structural plans for the upcoming repair work. The cost of the construction is \$100,000.
2. Building and structural plans for an interior renovation project located at the 100 block of Main Street were submitted to the Building Division for review and approval on November 10. The scope of work includes a new roof and ceiling structural members, new interior walls, and strengthening of existing foundation.
3. Tenant improvement plans and structural report for the Verizon cell tower located at 505 Jefferson Street were reviewed and approved by Planning and Building Divisions on November 9. This existing tower will be replacing many of the existing mounting equipments and electrical fixtures due to outdated system. The cost of the construction is \$45,000.
4. Interior remodeling and renovation project for an existing industrial building at 750 Monroe Way was approved by the Planning and Building divisions on November 10. The scope of work for this tenant improvement plan includes demolition of existing office space, construction of a new office area with new cabinets, office desks, storage rooms, and a new unisex restroom in compliance with the ADA Regulations.
5. Thirteen (13) solar panel installation projects for residential single family detached homes were reviewed and approved by the Building Division on November 12.
6. Certificates of occupancy for the new 10 unit apartment project located at 718 thru 727 West La Jolla Street was released by the Building Division on November 12. There are two (2) independent building and each consists of five (5) apartment units. Each apartment unit will have three bedrooms and two bathrooms with two attached garages under the 1st floor.

Remote Rescue – November 15 - At 2:24 p.m. a Remote Rescue response was dispatched to Aliso Wood Canyon Park for the report of a hiker with a knee injury somewhere on Car Wreck Trail. Ground units were able to make access into the park and located the patient at 2:55 p.m. It was determined that Helicopter 2 would need to do a basket hoist operation and two rescuers were inserted that packaged the patient.
