

Electric Vehicle Charging Station Installation at the Civic Center

Installation of new electric vehicle charging stations at the Civic Center has begun. In an effort to reduce fuel and maintenance costs, the City recently acquired 10 new Chevy Spark electric vehicles for use in day-to-day City operations. The new vehicles have replaced traditional gasoline vehicles in the City's fleet and the vehicles were purchased utilizing grant funds from the Air Quality Management District. Additional grant funds were awarded to the City for the installation of 12 new vehicle charging stations. The charging



stations are being installed along the northern edge of the Civic Center parking lot. Two of the charging stations will be made available for the general public's use while visiting or conducting business at the Civic Center. Work on this project began the week of February 1, 2016 with the removal of shrubbery and plant material and is expected to last one to two weeks. Once installed, the charging stations will keep the City's new electric vehicles on the road, providing various services to our community, while at the same time reducing long-term fuel and maintenance costs, as well as helping to reduce our carbon footprint.

Significant Events

January 27, 2016

Officers were dispatched to the area of Placentia Ave and Orangethorpe Ave in reference to a fight between a group of males. Upon arrival, it was discovered that the incident that occurred was in the City of Fullerton. One male was attacked and stabbed by gang members. Placentia Police Officers assisted at the scene and also assisted Fullerton PD by searching additional locations. The main suspect was located in an alley way of Pearl Drive in Fullerton and was taken into custody by officers. Additional suspects are outstanding.

January 31, 2016

Due to the severe weather storm, the patrol units were occupied with calls for service and self-initiated activity throughout the day. The heavy wind and rain caused power lines to go down and a transformer to go out in two locations, one of which caused two intersection signals to go out at the intersection of Kraemer and Madison. There were numerous incidents of power outages to residents due to the strong gusts of wind.

Portable stop signs were brought out by the Public Works crew for the intersections of Kraemer/Alta Vista and Kraemer/Madison. A TCA was called in to handle traffic control for the downed power line and to monitor one intersection.

A sexual assault was reported at approximately 3:35 p.m. After a preliminary investigation by patrol officers, a detective was notified and responded to interview the victim and conduct follow-up evaluation.



BUILDING AND PLANNING DIVISION

1. Architectural plans and structural analysis for a new tenant improvement project (Stereo Brewery) located at 950 South Via Rodeo were reviewed and approved by the City's Planning and Building Divisions as well as Orange County Fire Authority on January 25, 2016. This project will be a beer brewing facility that includes offices, a manufacturing area, a tasting room, and storage areas. The estimated cost of construction is over \$200,000.
2. Building plans for a residential rehab project located at 2017 South Main Street have been submitted to the Building and Planning Divisions for review and approval on January 25, 2016. The scope of work includes remodeling the existing substandard home from 1,085 sq. ft. to a one story 2,085 sq. ft. home plus a detached two (2) car garage with a one bedroom unit attached to the new garage.
3. Solar panel installation plans and structural calculations for eleven (11) residential homes were submitted and approved by the Building Division on January 17, 2016. These projects are for single family detached homes only.
4. A residential room addition project located at Traylor Avenue were reviewed and approved by the Planning and Building Divisions on January 26, 2016. This project includes a new master bedroom and restroom addition, as well as new plumbing, electrical and HVAC fixture units. The cost of the construction is \$48,000.
5. Tenant improvement plans for an industrial building located 132 East Crowther Avenue were reviewed and approved by the Planning and Building Divisions on January 26, 2016. The scope of work includes interior non-bearing walls, new offices, ADA in compliance of existing restrooms, new HVAC, electrical, mechanical and plumbing fixtures. The cost of the construction is \$150,000.
