Public Works Department Update

City Staff performed various maintenance activities throughout the City. The Graffiti Crew removed graffiti per work order requests and City-wide. The Sign Shop repaired and replaced signs on Harmony Lane, Madison Avenue and Moonbeam Street. The Patch Crew filled potholes on Bastanchury Road, La Jolla Street and Kraemer Boulevard. The Ball Field Maintenance Crew worked on infields at the Sports Complex, Tuffree Park and Torri Hunter field. The Facility Maintenance Crew completed work orders for City buildings and repaired parking lot lights at City Hall and Whitten Center. The Irrigation Crew checked and repaired irrigation systems on City Parks. The Maintenance crews cleaned the downtown area and debris on arterial streets.

Significant Events

February 17, 2016

Numerous vehicle burglaries were reported in the area. A neighboring agency caught two of the suspects who had a carload of stolen property from the various heists in the community.

A School Resource Officer arrested four students at Valencia High School for possession of marijuana.

February 20, 2016

Thirteen air conditioning compressors were stolen from a roof at a strip mall at Rose and Alta Vista. The total value of the items is believed to be over \$100,000.

At approximately 8:10 p.m., a traffic collision occurred at the intersection of Bastanchury Road and Placentia Avenue involving two vehicles. The investigation resulted in the arrest of a female driver with a Blood Alcohol Content nearly three times the legal limit.

February 21, 2016

At 6:30 p.m., Police Officers responded to Cebu Court to assist mental healthcare workers with an evaluation on a male adult.

At 11:40 p.m. we responded back to the same residence who had the mental evaluation after several 911 calls stating the male was screaming in the backyard and destroying the house. Police Officers encountered the male in the backyard screaming and tearing down the back fence of the residence. The subject was extremely agitated and yelling incoherently. The male was examined at the scene by Orange County Fire paramedics and transported to Placentia Linda Hospital for treatment. Paramedics suspected the male ingested bath salts. He was sedated at the hospital and was awaiting another mental evaluation.

February 22, 2016

At approximately 2:50 a.m., Brea Police Department asked for assistance when they went on a foot pursuit of a possible rape suspect from a residence on Anchorage. During the investigation, they believed they encountered the suspect across the street on a bike. When the Police Officers approached, the suspect fled. A perimeter was set up and a police helicopter responded to assist with the search of the suspect. The suspect was not located.



BUILDING AND PLANNING DIVISIONS

1. Tenant improvement plans for a commercial office space located at 1407 N. Rose Drive (Yolanda Animal Hospital) were reviewed and approved by the Planning and Building divisions on February 16. This project involves with interior new offices, lab, ADA in compliance restroom remodeling, site plan improvement, new electrical, plumbing & HVAC fixture units. The cost of the construction is \$40,000.
2. Solar panel installation plans and structural reports for nine (9) single-family homes have been reviewed and approved by the Building Division February 16. The of the construction ranges from \$15,000 to \$45,000 per home.
3. Building plans for a residential remodeling project located at Jamaica Circle were submitted and approved by the Planning and Building divisions on February 17. The scope of work includes the addition of 20 sq. ft. in the kitchen, removal of non-load bearing interior walls, new windows, doors, plumbing, electrical and mechanical fixture units. The cost of the construction is \$35,000.
4. The 2nd submittal of new residential condo project plans (10 units at 1548 Spruce) by HQT Development were reviewed and approved by the Planning and Building divisions on February 17. The issuance of a building permit is subject to the approval of grading plans by the city's Engineering Division and Orange County Fire Authority approval. The cost of the construction is \$3,500,000.

Silverado Canyon Unincorporated

Remote Rescue – February 18 - At 8:25 p.m. units responded for a REMOTE rescue to the base of the waterfall area of Black Star Canyon in Silverado Canyon. Orange County Sheriff was on scene in the area and their helicopter, Duke, had positive visual contact with two uninjured lost hikers signaling with a flashlight. Duke requested a hoist rescue to extract the hikers who were 3-4 miles by ground up the trail. Helicopter 1 effected a hoist rescue for both stranded hikers and delivered them to Irvine Lake for offloading to waiting OCSO.

San Juan Capistrano

Structure Fire – February 20 - At 12:23 a.m., ECC dispatched a structure fire response to Calle Roberto in San Juan Capistrano for a report of smoke coming from the roof. Units arrived on scene with heavy smoke production from the roof, and the incident was upgraded to a working structure fire. At 12:48 a.m., the call was upgraded to a second alarm fire. Remote Rescue – February 21 - At 9:43 a.m. units responded to Aliso Woods Canyon Park just off the Aliso Woods Canyon Trail and Cholla Trail for a male with a reported possible leg fracture. Park rangers were also enroute. Rangers discovered the patient and transported the patient to the parking lot where the patient was confirmed not critically injured and opted to take himself to the hospital. All responding units were cancelled.

Santa Ana

Kitchen Fire - February 23- At 12:51 p.m. units responded to S. Hickory Street in Santa Ana for a reported kitchen fire. Engine 74 arrived on scene at 12:56 p.m. reporting smoke and fire from the “D” side of the structure and established Hickory Incident Command. Hickory Incident Command requested a working structure assignment. Engine 74 reported wires down on the “C” side of the structure and requested a verbal safety announcement with tones. Battalion 9 assumed Hickory Incident Command. Truck 76 requested the area with wires down be taped off for Firefighter safety. At 1:03 p.m. Battalion 9 updated the condition as heavy fire and smoke from the rear of the structure with wires down; crews are working on a primary all clear. Battalion 9 requested a second alarm balance at 1:06 p.m., and accomplished primary all clear and knockdown one minute later. A second warbled safety announcement was made to warn of the downed wires affecting a chain link fence. Red Cross was requested for four adults and five children displaced. Battalion 9 released most units at 3:03 p.m. and turned the incident over to Engine 74. Engine 74 was complete at 5:59 p.m. after providing a property release notice to the homeowner.
