Placentia Appoints New City Administrator

On Tuesday, March 1, 2016, the City Council approved the appointment of Mr. Damien R. Arrula to the City Administrator position for the City of Placentia. Since February 2015, Mr. Arrula, the Assistant City Administrator, has served in the capacity as Acting City Administrator/Interim City Administrator for the City of Placentia.

Mr. Arrula's responsibilities include management and oversight of all City operations and departments, which include 115 full-time and 75 part-time employees, as well as the City's 2015-2016 total budget of approximately \$32 million. Mr. Arrula currently assists in managing special development projects such as the Old Town Santa Fe District Plan, Transit Oriented Development Packing House District Plan, and General Plan update. During his tenure with Placentia, Mr. Arrula has assisted in securing funding for the pending Placentia Metrolink Station, downtown parking structure and the formation of the Citizens Fiscal Sustainability Task Force.



Prior to working for the Placentia, Mr. Arrula held the positions of Economic Development Director, Administrative/Economic Development Officer, Senior Management Analyst, and Management Analyst with the cities of Claremont, El Monte and Sierra Madre. In his past experience, he has developed a variety of programs and economic development projects, including the downtown revitalization, the development of large retail centers and hotels, completed unique transit-oriented development projects, recruited car dealerships and established a variety of award-winning housing developments. He also managed capital improvement projects, including development of an emergency operations center, construction of a CNG fueling facility, and development of one of California's first municipal thermal-solar pool heaters, which received national recognition.

Mr. Arrula holds a Bachelor of Science in Political Science and a Minor in General Management from Cal Poly Pomona. He has a Masters of Public Administration from the University of La Verne and a post-graduate leadership certificate from Claremont McKenna College. Mr. Arrula looks forward to serving the Placentia community as City Administrator.

PUBLIC WORKS

Public Works Department Update

Our staff performed maintenance activities throughout the City. The Graffiti Crew removed graffiti per work order requests and City wide. The Sign Shop repaired and replaced signs on Chapman Avenue, Kraemer Boulevard and Alta Vista. The Patch Crew filled potholes on Bastanchury Road east of Valencia Avenue and crack sealed pavement on Rose Drive. The Ball Field Maintenance Crew worked on infields at the Sports Complex, Tuffree Park, and Torii Hunter Field. The Facility Maintenance Crew completed work orders at City facilities and repaired lights at Tuffree Park. The Irrigation Crew checked and repaired irrigation systems at McFadden Park and the Bradford House. The Maintenance crews cleaned the downtown area and debris on arterial streets. On February 27, stand-by personnel set-up traffic control on Jefferson Street for the opening day of Placentia Pony Baseball.

As a reminder to our residents, City staff is now assigned to remove the graffiti, pick up dead animals, maintain the downtown landscaping and make sure the OCTA bus stops throughout the City of Placentia are clean. The new phone number to report graffiti or dead animal pick up is (714) 993-8279.

Storm Preparation

During the rainy season, sandbags and sand will be available to Placentia residents at the City's Corporation Yard at 2999 La Jolla Street, Monday through Thursday from 6:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Proof of residency will be required and residents must bring their own shovel to fill their bags with sand. Sandbags will also be available at Fire Station #34, 1530 Valencia Avenue. Sand bags can be very useful in diverting water, protecting slopes and structures, and assisting in erosion control.

Southern California Edison would also like to remind residents that due to the heavy rain projected this season, power outages, downed power lines or dangling wires may occur. Significant Events

February 24, 2016

Numerous thefts of copper were reported from the commercial complex on the north side of the 100 block of east Yorba Linda Blvd. The thefts occurred from roof top air conditioners.

There was a stabbing in the 900 block of South Placentia which stemmed from a workplace disagreement. The suspect was arrested at the location and booked for attempted murder. The victim suffered a superficial stab wound and was released at the scene.

Fullerton PD had a gang related stabbing in the Gem tract. A Placentia PD officer located one of the suspects in the City of Anaheim and took a juvenile into custody. Fullerton PD responded to the station and took custody of the juvenile.

February 25, 2016

A residential burglary was reported by the owner of a vacant house on Lawanda. The owner was away from the house, but was watching surveillance footage of somebody in her house wearing a mask. Officers arrived and surrounded the house quickly and the owner reported she could still see the suspect inside when we were on scene. K9s were called in from home and Anaheim PD's helicopter was requested. The residence was cleared with the help of K9s and found to be empty. Unknown loss is reported at this time.

About one hour later, a resident on Montgomery (about 2 miles away) reported a suspicious male in her backyard with a possible screwdriver in their hand. Officers arrived and surrounded the residence, but the suspect was found to be gone after a search. The item found that was left



behind by the suspect was a handheld tool that could be used as a pry tool for burglary purposes. This appeared to be the method of entry on the Lawanda burglary. An incident report was taken.

Four additional air conditioner condenser thefts were reported from businesses in the Town Center complex.

BUILDING AND PLANNING DIVISIONS

1. Tenant improvement plans for an existing wireless cell phone structure (Verizon Wireless) located at 1102 E. Yorba Linda Boulevard were reviewed and approved by the Planning and Building Divisions on February 22, 2016. The scope of work includes adding new antennas, new racks, fiber power boxes, cable jumpers, power cabinets and new electronics devices. The cost of the construction is \$15,000.
2. Beazer Homes (T-17145) at Morse Avenue and Kraemer Boulevard are still in construction and currently building their Phase 7 homes. There are two remaining phases (Phase 8 & 9) which have a total 17 new detached homes plus four (4) built-out units which are located at the current visitor's parking area. The cost of the remaining construction is approximately \$8 million.
3. Residential solar installation plans and structural calculations for 14 homes were reviewed and approved by the Building Division on February 23, 2016. These are for single-family detached homes.
4. Building permit for the asbestos removal project at 1275 E. Yorba Linda Boulevard was issued on February 18, 2016. This is a commercial building (in front of the current Fairway Ford Dealership) that has been vacant for the over 10 years. The owner(s) of the property (more than 30,000 sq. ft. of total floor area) intends to demolish all of the above ground structures soon.
5. Building plans for a residential home remodeling project located at Farmer Lane were reviewed and approved on February 24, 2016. The scope of work includes removing first floor's load bearing wall and adding new supporting beams and footings. In addition, a new kitchen, bathrooms, electrical, mechanical and plumbing fixtures will be added. The cost of the construction is \$65,000.
