Love Placentia Service Day



Love Placentia Service Day was held on Saturday, April 30. Approximately 1,200 volunteers came out to serve the community by demonstrating kindness, meeting the needs others, and impacting lives. The volunteers donated 3,600 volunteer service hours saving the City of Placentia, Placentia-Yorba Linda Unified School District, and Non-Profits an estimated \$84,816 in labor costs.

The day began with a rally at El Dorado High School where Craftsman and Woodfired Pizza, Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs of Placentia served a pancake

attended. Retired Police Chief Ward Smith and Pastor Mandi Pettikas, Rose Drive Friends Church, hosted the event. They thanked all for coming out and making a difference in Placentia. The volunteers were made up from 15 local churches, service organizations, Boy's and Girl's Scout Troops, businesses, and residents.

After the Rally the volunteers spread across Placentia to one of the 33 volunteer sites. Volunteers worked hard to beautify Placentia. Many of the sites had painting projects where bathrooms, picnic tables, and picnic shelters were painted. Fencing, walls, and railings were also painted. At some schools the black top was painted with numbers, lines and circles for the children. Another service opportunity was landscaping. Many of the landscaping projects included planters getting replanted and mulch spread throughout planters and slopes. Weeds, hedges, and trees were trimmed at many City parks and schools. A new structure over the Ontiveros Adobe Landmark was constructed during the service day. Over 100 no-sew blankets were made to benefit foster children, homeless, and the underprivileged. A food drive was conducted at two local grocery stores and the food was donated to the Friendly Center's food pantry. (Continued on next page)



The Placentia Library received service by having volunteers assist in decorating the Library for the summer reading program. A soccer field had its drainage issues fixed and the area cleaned to benefit the many children who play every day. These are just a sampling of the projects that took place throughout Placentia.

Significant Events

April 27, 2016

A gang related shooting occurred at Kraemer Park late in the afternoon. The shooter fired into the gazebo area before fleeing in an awaiting vehicle. Placentia PD officers located the suspect vehicle minutes later in the Gem Streets area of Fullerton. At least two suspects fled from officers. It is unknown if anyone was hit as a result of the shooting but bloody clothing had been located nearby. The investigation is ongoing.

April 28, 2016

Officers and Detectives continued the investigation into the shooting that occurred at Kraemer Park on 4-28-16. After successfully having the barricaded shooting suspect surrender, he was subsequently arrested and a handgun was recovered in the garage where he was found.

May 1, 2016

At approximately 12:40 a.m. Officers received a call of a vehicle burglary in progress on the 200 block of S. Kraemer. The reporting party gave a good description of the suspect and officers were able to arrive on scene within seconds. Officers located the suspect in the east parking lot and took him into custody without incident. Several items of stolen property along with drug paraphernalia were located on the suspect's person.



May 2, 2015

Officers were dispatched to Valencia High School in regards to a possible student showing a handgun to other students. All of the students involved had since left the school for the day. School officials were the reporting party.

May 3, 2016

There was an attempted robbery/carjacking at Kraemer and Alta Vista involving a small black vehicle and a male armed with a shotgun. The suspects followed the victims after they withdrew money from Teachers First ATM. The suspects then cut the victims off at Kraemer and Alta Vista forcing the victims to stop. A suspect produced a shotgun and tried to gain entry into the victim's vehicle. The victims were able to drive away as the suspect was attempting to gain entry into the vehicle. There was no loss. The suspect description is similar to several robberies that occurred in the county during the evening, with the closes being a convenience store robbery in the City of Anaheim.

Officers responded to the 300 block of Jefferson for a male passed out behind the wheel with the engine running. Officers contacted the male and later cited him for possession of a meth pipe and possession of Heroin.

Officers responded to the 300 block of Jefferson regarding an adult son breaking into his parent's residence. Upon contact he was combative and kicked officers while they were taking him into custody. He was transported to Orange County Jail and booked for several charges.

With this report Engine 44 requested the balance of the working structure fire and a Code 3 ambulance. Units arrived on scene and went into the Rescue Exception. Due to the amount of fire on the second floor of the residence the rescue and interior attack were withdrawn. As the fire intensified the Incident Commander requested the Second Alarm at 12:30 a.m. The fire was knocked down at 12:51 a.m. and with smoke removal on the second floor of the residence the victim was located. Structure Fire – April 30 - At 7:10 p.m. a structure response was sent to Aston Street in Irvine. Engine 6 arrived on scene and reported smoke showing from a large one story commercial building doing business as Prudential Overall Supply. Engine 6 established command and balanced the incident to a working structure response. Battalion 5 assumed Aston Incident Command and reported smoke showing from the Charlie side of the structure. Truck 6 Captain was assigned Division Alpha with Engine 37, Engine 6, and his crew reporting to him. Engine 79 was assigned to check for access and extension to the Charlie side. Truck 76 was assigned ventilation (vert/horiz). Engine 28 was assigned RIC. COSB8 and SAFE27 were assigned utilities and safety. The forward progress of the fire was stopped at 7:32 p.m. and the fire was knocked down at 7:48 p.m. No civilian or firefighter injuries were reported. Duty Chief and Division 2 were notified on scene by Battalion 5. Irvine PD, an Irvine building official, and representatives from the business responded. A property release was prepared by the Engine 6 Captain and the scene was left in care of the building manager.

Remote Rescue – April 30 - At 9:02 p.m. hours Helicopter 2 responded to a remote rescue (Medical Aid) in Murietta, Riverside County with DUTY officer approval. The patient was located mid-slope on a single track trail. After CalFire had been searching for the patient for several hours he had been found off the trail after crashing his bike. The patient had multiple injuries and poor vitals PTA, meds were given and the patient was packaged on a back board. The Rescue Medic was inserted and the patient was hoisted into the aircraft by stokes basket and flown to Inland Valley as a trauma.

Remote Rescue – May 01 - At 10:21 a.m. a Remote Rescue response was dispatched to the south end of Peters Canyon Park for the report of a fallen mountain biker. As ground units were accessing the area DUKE1 from the Sherriff's Department arrived over the scene and was quickly able to identify the patient's location. They gave directions to the ground units in order to direct them to the correct trail. Helicopter 2 arrived in the area and DUKE1 was cleared. Helicopter 2 inserted their rescuer and flew to Loma Ridge to pick up a second rescuer from Truck 34. The patient was evaluated, determined that a hoist extraction was needed due to the injuries, and was packaged for transport. Helicopter 2 arrived back at the scene, hoisted the patient into the helicopter at 11:06 a.m., and flew to Orange County Global Medical Center arriving at 11:13 a.m.
