Flag Day Ceremony



PUBLIC WORKS

City Hall Electric Vehicle (EV) Charging Stations



The Public Works Department has completed its drought tolerant landscaping along the northern edge section of the Civic Center parking lot. This completes the final phase of the installation of the City's new electric vehicle (EV) charging stations. Two EV charging stations are now available for the general public's use while visiting or conducting business at the Civic Center. There is no cost to the public to use these dedicated EV charging stations. The charging stations

will keep the City's new electric vehicles on the road, providing various services to our community, while at the same time reducing long-term fuel and maintenance costs, as well as helping to reduce our carbon footprint.

Tree Removal and Replacement at Arroyo Park

The City's tree maintenance contractor removed 21 trees at Arroyo Verde Park. A combination of the drought and disease caused these mature trees to die requiring their removal. The City's contractor was careful to inspect each tree to ensure no active bird nests were found prior to their removal. The trees are scheduled to be replaced by the week of May 30th. The replacement trees will be a combination of Canary Island Pine and Chinese Flame Trees. 24-inch box specimens will be replanted at the park. Although significantly smaller than the large, mature trees they are replacing, this size tree is appropriate to ensure the long-term health and viability of the trees. Free Used Tire Recycling Collection Event

Chapman Avenue. Proof of Placentia residency is required. Tires from passenger and light truck tires will be accepted. Tires received by businesses or tires on rims will not be accepted. We will not be requiring appointments for this collection, so please be patient if there is a line to drop off any used tires. All participants will be served on a first come basis. Please keep in mind that it is illegal to haul more than nine used tires without being registered as a tire hauler by the State of California. Maintenance Division

This past week our staff performed various maintenance activities throughout the City. The Graffiti Crew removed graffiti per work order requests Citywide. The Sign Shop repaired and replaced several signs per work order requests. In addition, the finished installing reserved parking signs at the Civic Center Parking Lot. The Patch Crew filled in pot holes. The Paint Crew painted traffic legends in zones 11 striping double yellow also installing reflective pavement markers on Windflower and Hollyhock lanes per work order request. The Ball Field Maintenance Crew worked on the infields at the Sports Complex, Tuffree Park and Torii Hunter field. The Facility Maintenance Crew completed several work orders for City buildings. The Irrigation Crew repaired water valves at Parque De Los Niños, Vaqueros Park and the parkway on Dunnivant Drive. The Maintenance crews cleaned the downtown area and performed weed abatement in assigned areas. Southern California Edison Scheduled Power Outage

SCE will be performing maintenance on the electrical system in the area. In order to perform this work safely, they must temporarily turn off power. This outage will allow SCE to modernize their grid by making needed upgrades and repairs to increase their reliability. They realize that power outages may cause some inconvenience, therefore they try to isolate outages down to the smallest area possible and complete the work safely and as quickly as possible. Outages are scheduled to occur on June 1, 2016 from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. at Gehrig Ave east of McCormack Lane and at Carolina West Side south of Borromco.

Please note that the power may be off for the whole period or may be turned off more than once. This planned outage may not begin exactly at the stated start time, and some conditions may cause this planned outage to be postponed. POLICE DEPARTMENT

Significant Events

May 21, 2016

At approximately 6:36 p.m., Placentia Police Department units responded to a mutual aid call from Fullerton Police Department who broadcast they were in pursuit (felony evading) of two motorcycles eastbound on Orangethorpe from St. College. Our units responded to assist and located the motorcycles near Orangethorpe and the 57 freeway. The motorcycles continued northbound on the 57 freeway in excess of 100 mph. Despite the assistance from Orange County Sheriff Department airship Duke, Units were unable to maintain a visual on the suspects and the pursuit was terminated just north of Tonner Canyon.

May 22, 2016

An Officer chased a wanted felon gang member into the neighborhood at Richfield and Orangethorpe. After an extensive search, the suspect was not located and the search was called off.

Crime Prevention

Neighborhood Watch

A Community Meeting was held at the Whitten Community Center on Thursday, May 19th. School Resources Officer Flores and Crime Prevention Officer Anderson attended the event. There were 19 adults and 8 children in attendance. The meeting discussed how to avoid scams against immigrants, fraud prevention, and Placentia Police Department's deportation policy for undocumented residents. The group shared with the Police many instances where they had encountered fraud and were very grateful for the information.

The family enjoyed learning more about how the Police Department operates. The family asked several questions during the tour to get a better understanding of Police work.

BUILDING AND PLANNING DIVISIONS

1. On May 16th, building plans and structural analysis for a residential remodeling project located at Loyola Street were reviewed and approved by the Building Division. This project includes an interior bathroom remodel, kitchen retrofit, new windows and changes to the structural framing. The cost of the construction is \$30,000.
2. On May 17th, solar panel installation plans and structural calculations for eight (8) homes were reviewed and approved by the Building Division. These solar installation projects are for the detached residential homes.
3. On May 18th, engineering plans for a new residential roof and patio cover construction were submitted and reviewed the by Building and Planning Divisions. The scope of work includes framing alterations for the roof system, new patio cover. The cost of the construction is \$20,000.
4. On May 17th, tenant improvement plans for an industrial building located at 1891 Miraloma Avenue were reviewed and approved by the Planning and Building divisions. This project includes interior remodeling and new 700 sq. ft. steel, framing mezzanine for storage purposes. The cost of the construction is \$45,000.

Significant Emergency Incidents

Seal Beach

Structure Fire – May 20 - At 7:35 a.m. a smoke check response was dispatched to the Seal Beach Pier for a vague report of smoke coming from the end of the pier. Shortly after the dispatch additional calls were received reporting an actual fire at the end of the pier and the incident was balanced to a Structure Fire response. Engine 44 arrived on scene and reported that there was nothing showing and asked the ECC to hold on dispatching the automatic Second Alarm. Upon investigation a fire was located in the old Ruby's Diner and the Incident Commander requested the Second Alarm along with a fire boat. ECC contacted Long Beach Fire and requested the use of their fire boat. Seal Beach PD had already contacted Orange County Harbor Patrol for their boat. With the incident continuing to escalate, the Incident Commander asked for additional water/fire boat resources. ECC then started the coordination for a total of 10 water assets: OC Harbor Patrol (1), SLB Life Guards (1), Long Beach Fire (4), Los Angeles County Fire (2) and Los Angeles City Fire (2). All fire agencies also had Agency Representatives respond to the Incident Command Post. Ground units laid large diameter hose the entire length of the pier due to the stand pipe system on the pier failing at the onset of the incident. Once on scene the fire boats were able to contain the fire to the end of the pier and the structures upon it. The fire was deemed Knocked Down at 0905 hours. Both Edison and So Cal Gas were requested to assist at the scene. One firefighter was injured during the incident and was taken to a local area hospital for evaluation and treatment. Resources remained on scene overnight to monitor the structure.

San Juan Capistrano

Vegetation Fire – May 21 - At 8:12 a.m., Truck 9 and Patrol 7 were dispatched to a reported smoke check in the area of Old San Juan Road, San Juan Capistrano. Truck 9 arrived in the area and reported multiple starts of grass fires. The Sheriff's Department was on scene and had a suspect in custody. Due to the access issues, the assignment was augmented with Battalion 6, Engine 339, Engine 356, Water Tender 16, Crew 1A, Superintendent 1 and the investigators. Helicopter 2 was also requested but was diverted to a remote rescue. The fire was reported under control at 8:56 a.m. and contained to approximately one acre.

Remote Rescue – May 21 - At 8:48 a.m., a remote rescue response was dispatched to a reported hiker down on Lynx Trail in Aliso Woods Canyon Park. DUKE was able to locate the patient visually and ground units were able to make access and assess the patient. Due to the patient's status, Helicopter 2 performed a hoist operation and transported the patient directly to Mission.

Laguna Beach

Remote Rescue – May 22 - At 5:15 p.m. Laguna Beach Engine 4 requested Helicopter 2 for a hoist operation from the beach for a patient experiencing an asthma attack. Per Laguna Beach Engine 4 the cove has no vehicle access and the pedestrian stair access is very steep. Helicopter 2 started towards Bluff Dr, Laguna Beach and were cancelled moments later. Vegetation Fire – May 23 - At 1:03 p.m. a Medium Watershed – Vegetation Fire response was dispatched to the area of Cabot Rd and Paseo De La Colinas. First arriving units found an approximate two-acre fire in light to moderate fuel moving uphill toward some homes. With the fire growing in size and further threatening the homes above the Incident Commander requested a Type I Strike Team at 1:12 p.m. The Incident Commander also requested the sheriff's office to close down roads in the area. The fire was declared Under Control at 2:03 p.m. One firefighter was injured during this incident and was transported to Mission Hospital Mission Viejo for evaluation and treatment.

Structure Fire – At 1:25 p.m. a medical aid response was dispatched for a person having emotional problems in a residence on Lidenwood Farm in Ladera Ranch. As units were en route the OC Sheriff's Office had further communication with the patient and determined for firefighter safety that units should stage away from the scene. A short time later the sheriff's officers arrived on scene and cleared the fire department to enter the scene. As firefighters approached the scene it was then determined that the scene was not safe to enter and it was also seen that the structure was on fire. Engine 58 backed out of the scene, asked for the balance of a Working Structure Fire response and asked for all units to stage away from the scene. Once additional fire units were in the area the Incident Commander determined that a defensive fire fight was needed to ensure that the fire did not spread to the surrounding structures. As the sheriff's deputies provided force protection the firefighters they were able to get closer to the structure; however they were not able to yet enter the structure because the suspect had barricaded himself in a first floor room. Once the suspect was talked out of the structure and taken into custody an interior attack initiated and the fire was extinguished. Edison, So Cal Gas and Red Cross were all requested to assist at the scene.
