City Hall Electric Vehicle (EV) Charging Stations



The Public Works Department has completed its drought tolerant landscaping along the northern section of the Civic Center parking lot. This completes the final phase of the installation of the City's new electric vehicle (EV) charging stations. Two EV charging stations are now available for the general public's use while visiting or conducting business at the Civic Center. There is no cost to the public to use these dedicated EV charging stations. The charging stations will

keep the City's new electric vehicles on the road, providing various services to our community, while at the same time reducing long-term fuel and maintenance costs, as well as helping to reduce our carbon footprint.

Maintenance Division

This past week our staff performed various maintenance activities throughout the City. The Graffiti Crew removed graffiti per work order requests citywide. The Sign Shop repaired and replaced several signs per work order requests. The Patch Crew filled in pot holes citywide. The Paint Crew painted traffic legends in zones 11 and 12. The Ball Field Maintenance Crew worked on the infields at the Sports Complex, Tuffree Park and Torii Hunter field. The Facility Maintenance Crew completed work orders for City buildings and painted offices in City Hall. The Irrigation Crew repaired water valves at Tuffree Park and replaced nozzles on the parkway on Alta Vista Street. The Maintenance crews cleaned the downtown area and performed weed abatement in assigned areas.

On May 26th, Public Works personnel responded after hours to repair an overflowing toilet at the Gomez Community Center. On May 29th, personnel responded after hours to pick up a dead animal at 122 Gomez Circle. On May 30th, personnel setup after hours temporary stop signs at Placentia Avenue and St. John Street. Significant Events

May 28, 2016

A small group (25 to 30) of individuals against the proposed medical marijuana ordinance held a peaceful protest at the corner of Kraemer and Yorba Linda from 10:00am to 12:00pm.

At 1:23pm, units received a call of a male kicking a female near Orangethorpe and the 57 freeway overpass. The 911 caller did not know her address and the search area narrowed down to 1,100 meters in the vicinity of the 800 block of W. Crowther. The caller suddenly disconnected and Dispatch did not have the ability to recall caller as it did not allow for incoming calls. After an hour long foot search of the suspect and freeway embankments, and with the assistance of the CHP helicopter, units were unable to locate the couple. Numerous people were contacted during the search and no one provided any additional information. Surrounding agencies were notified and an incident report was taken.

May 22, 2016

Eight arrests, including two arrests for felony evading, possession of a sawed off shotgun, narcotic and property crimes, were made.

Crime Prevention

Neighborhood Watch

The neighborhood of Gillman Circle met for their second Neighborhood Watch Meeting on Tuesday, May 24. Sixteen adults attended the meeting as well as Crime Prevention Officer Anderson. The Neighborhood Watch program is set up as a series of three different meetings covering different topics at each meeting. At this meeting, residents were trained in vehicle and home burglary protection. The meeting covered the best practices to protect your home, alarms and cameras, vacation home checks, current trends in burglary and what to do if you become a victim.

A separate Neighborhood Watch Meeting was conducted on Wednesday, May 25, 2016 for the Bradford Court HOA. Police personnel and a Neighborhood Watch board member attended the meeting. This was the first in a series of three meetings for this group. The residents were trained



in how and what to observe, what is suspicious behavior, contacting the police, and 911 education. Also crime statistics were shared with the residents. Remote Rescue – May 28 - At 9:56 a.m., a remote rescue response was dispatched to a hiker down at Black Star Falls. Helicopter 2 was able to locate the victim from the air and lowered down the rescue medic for patient evaluation. Helicopter 2 found a 29-year-old female who had suffered a head injury from a branch that had fallen 30-40 feet from a large oak tree. The patient was determined to be a trauma and was treated and packaged on scene. She was hoisted into Helicopter 2 with the assistance of a Truck 9 rescuer and flown directly to OC Global with continued ALS evaluation enroute.

Structure Fire – May 29 - At 2:29 p.m. an automatic water flow alarm was balanced to a structure fire response on Duryea Ave, Irvine. Engine 6 arrived on-scene and reported smoke showing from a large one story commercial building doing business as Electrolurgy INC. Engine 6 established command and balanced the incident to a working structure response. Battalion 9 arrived on-scene and assumed Duryea Incident Command. Battalion 5 arrived on-scene and assisted Battalion 9. Engine 79 was assigned Division Bravo with Engine 28 and Engine 6 reporting to him. Truck 76 was assigned the task of ventilation. At 2:50 p.m. Division Bravo called for emergency gross decontamination of exiting crews due to possible hazardous materials involvement. Engine 74 was assigned emergency gross decontamination of exiting crews. Engine 6, Engine 28, and Engine 79 were gross deconned and their turnouts were collected. Safety 27 arrived on-scene and was assigned incident safety. The forward progress of the fire was stopped at 2:54 p.m. No civilian or firefighter injuries were reported.

Haz-mat 4 and Haz-mat 204 were called to the scene to stabilize the potential hazardous materials release. Haz-mat 4 and 204 were assigned Haz-mat group, Truck 76 was reassigned Medical Group with CARE 6506 reporting to him, and Engine 74 was assigned to technical decontamination. Haz-mat Group Supervisor reported to the Incident Commander that Liquid Chromate was contained to the containment berms within the building. A representative from OC Health Haz-mat (Mark Sutphin) arrived on-scene and coordinated the release of the building back to the responsible party. OC Health Haz-mat will remain on-scene and monitor the hazardous materials clean up. Engine 6, Engine 28, and Engine 79 equipment was technically decontaminated and their personnel were issued loaner turnouts. Duty Chief and Division 2 were notified on scene by Battalion 9 and Battalion 5.

Irvine PD and representatives from the business responded. A property release was prepared by the Engine 6 Captain and the scene was left in care of the building owner.

Aerial Assistance – May 29 - At 8:48 a.m., a remote rescue response was dispatched to a reported hiker down on Lynx Trail in Aliso Woods Canyon Park. DUKE was able to locate the patient visually and ground units were able to make access and assess the patient. Due to the patient's status, Helicopter 2 performed a hoist operation and transported the patient directly to Mission.

Remote Rescue – May 30 - At 3:12 p.m. Helicopter 2 was requested by Laguna Beach Fire to assist with a rescue on Table Rock Beach. A female had jumped down on to the beach and suffered an ankle injury. Due to incoming tide cutting off any access to the beach the only way to get the patient off the beach was via the helicopter. Helicopter 2 arrived on scene and inserted the rescue medic. Once the patient was packaged, she and the rescuer were hoisted back into the helicopter and they flew direct to Mission Hospital Mission Viejo.
