Latest Update on Embezzlement Investigation

On June 17, 2016 the Orange County District Attorney's Office charged Michael M. Nguyen, former Finance Services Manager, with 106 counts for the misappropriation of \$5.16 million in public funds, money laundering and other related counts. The complaint seeks an "aggravated white collar crime enhancement" for the alleged actions.

"We are immeasurably disappointed that, starting in January 2014, one of our employees allegedly exploited his position of trust by manipulating financial controls to steal taxpayers' money for his own benefit. The City has implemented new policies and procedures that have significantly strengthened our accounting systems in a manner that far exceeds government standards to ensure the safety of our taxpayers' funds" said City Administrator Damien R. Arrula.

"The City will continue to work with the District Attorney's Office to help bring justice to those responsible. So far a total of \$3.1 million has been seized for recovery. An additional \$1 million crime insurance policy is being processed. The City will use any and all available actions to recover the remaining stolen funds for the residents of Placentia" said City Administrator Arrula.

City of Placentia Awarded Golden Hub of Innovation Award



The City of Placentia was recognized on Thursday, June 9th for innovation at the Association of California Cities – Orange County (ACC-OC)'s 5th Annual Golden Hub of Innovation Awards. Each year, the ACC-OC, invites cities, special districts, and other public agencies to apply for Golden Hub of Innovation awards in the following categories: Budgeting and Finance, City Innovator of Year, Economic Development, Energy & Environmental Quality, Public Safety, Public-Private Partnerships, Public Engagement, Staffing/Service Delivery Options and

Technology/E-Government. The judging committee selects one winner from each category. The City of Placentia was selected to receive the Golden Hub of Innovation Award in the Energy/Environmental Quality category for their Electric Vehicle Fleet Project.

Through this innovative initiative, the City addressed their need to reduce fleet operating and maintenance costs due to their aging and fuel-inefficient fleet without impacting the City's General Fund. The City acquired 10 new Chevy Spark electric vehicles and installed 12 electric charging stations at the Placentia Civic Center. Instead of solely relying on taxpayer funds, the City made use of California Environmental Protection Agency grants, Air Quality Management District grants and Mobile Source Air Pollution Reduction Review Committee Clean Transportation funding. The City will now save approximately \$30,000 per year in fuel and vehicle maintenance costs. Find out more information about the award and ACC-OC [here](#).

Public Works Department Awarded Transportation Improvement Grant

The Public Works Department is pleased to announce it has received a \$45,000 Project V grant from Orange County Transportation Authority. The Community Based Transit Circulators Program (Project V) is funded through Measure M2, the County's half-cent sales tax used for transportation improvements. These funds will be used to develop a transit planning document that will evaluate the feasibility of providing a year-round bus shuttle and special events shuttle. The year-round community shuttle/trolley service will be based out of Placentia's Metrolink Station, providing connections to various points of interest inside and outside of Placentia. The proposed project





aims to reduce congestion, improve air quality and provide people with more choices to get around. For more information, please call (714) 993-8189.

Maintenance Division

This past week the Maintenance Division performed various maintenance activities throughout the City. The Graffiti Crew removed graffiti per work order requests city-wide. In addition, personnel installed temporary signs stating that fireworks are prohibited on the 4th of July at designated locations throughout the City. The Patch Crew filled in pot holes on arterial streets. The Paint Crew painted traffic legends in zones 8 and 9. The Ball Field Maintenance Crew worked on the infields at the Sports Complex, Tuffree Park and Torii Hunter field. The Facility Maintenance Crew completed work orders for City buildings. The Irrigation Crew repaired and replaced water valves at City Hall for drought tolerant plant material. The Maintenance Crew cleaned the downtown area and performed weed abatement in assigned areas. In addition, Public Works staff are removing shrubs and installing new water valves, drip lines, planting new trees, drought tolerant plants, and setting down mulch in the main parking lot at City Hall.

On June 12th, Public Works personnel responded to a broken water line at Lakeview and Orangethorpe Avenue. Superior Pavement Markings will be striping all City arterial streets throughout the month of June.

BUILDING AND PLANNING DIVISIONS

1. On June 6th, the Building & Safety and Planning divisions reviewed and approved architectural plans for a remodeling project for an existing day care center located at 201 E Madison Avenue. The scope of work includes remodeling three existing buildings into facilities that meet ADA compliance and re-roof of three of the existing buildings. The estimated cost of construction is \$30,000.
2. On June 6th, the Building & Safety Division approved building plans and structural calculations for a tenant improvement project located at 190 W Crowther Avenue. The scope of work includes interior renovations and installing high storage racks. The cost of the construction is \$43,394.
3. On June 7th, the Building & Safety Division reviewed and approved architectural plans for a residential room addition project located at Maertzweiler Drive. The scope of work includes a 220 sq. ft. loft addition, new electrical and mechanical fixtures. The estimated cost of the construction is \$29,640.
4. On June 8th, the Building & Safety and Planning divisions approved room addition building plans and structural calculations for a residential project located at Frederick Street. The scope of work includes a 390 sq. ft. expansion of the family room as well as new HVAC, plumbing and electrical fixtures. The estimated cost of the construction is approximately \$50,000.



5. On June 8th, a Use Permit application for a new retail auto sales located at 1940 Petra Lane was submitted to the Building Division for review and comment. This new retail auto sales office will occupy approximately 5,000 sq. ft. of the warehouse for storage purposes and will be subject to obtain approval from the Orange County Fire Authority.

Engine 54 treated the patient and the patient was flown to OC global via Helicopter 1.

A night operation was approved as well as a plan for the next operational period.
