OCTA Board of Directors Approves the Placentia Metrolink Station and Parking Structure

At the June 27th Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA) Board of Directors meeting, the Board Members approved the funding and cooperative agreement for the construction of the newest Metrolink Station in Orange County and a new parking structure. Mayor Pro Tem Craig Green, Council Members Scott Nelson and Chad Wanke, City Administrator Damien Arrula, and City Staff were present at the Board meeting along with several representatives from the Placentia Chamber of Commerce, Placita Santa Fe Merchants, and Cal State Fullerton's Transportation Department.

Once constructed, this will be the 13th station serving the 91 line, which will run from Los Angeles Union Station to downtown Riverside. The Placentia Metrolink Station will be the closest station in proximity to Cal State Fullerton and will provide passengers with an alternative to the Fullerton Metrolink Station.

"The City has been working with OCTA on the construction of a Metrolink Station and Parking Structure to serve the City and surrounding area for several years now," said City Administrator Damien Arrula. "We are particularly thankful to CEO Darrell Johnson and his OCTA team for their partnership and support in developing a cohesive plan together to bring this project to fruition. We are excited for the prospect of having the station serve as the catalyst for making Old Town Placentia a destination while serving regional transportation needs in the North Orange County area" said City Administrator Arrula.

The Cooperative Agreement will be presented at the July 12th Placentia City Council Meeting for final approval. After the completion of the station design and the construction bid is awarded, OCTA anticipates beginning construction in May of 2018. The total cost of the Project is \$35 million of which the City will contribute \$5.4 million. The Orange County Task Force on Drowning Prevention held a news conference yesterday at the William Woollett Jr. Aquatic Center in Irvine. The news conference focused on the media campaign launch of the drowning prevention messaging, implemented to reduce drowning related incidents and drowning fatalities. The campaign is made possible by the support and contributions from both OCFA member cities and additional Orange County cities. OC Task Force on Drowning Prevention Chair Al Murray and OC Supervisor and Task Force member Todd Spitzer both spoke at the event which was well attended by the public and the media. The OCFA distributes a monthly video newsletter to all OCFA personnel to keep crews and staff up-to-date on recent incidents and current topics within OCFA. The [Video Newsletter for June 2016](#) is now available to view.

OCFA, the American Red Cross, the City of San Clemente, San Clemente CERT, and JustServe volunteers partnered to install free smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms at Palm Beach Park in San Clemente. The event took place on Saturday, June 25 from 9a.m. to 12:30 p.m. A total of 105 smoke alarms and 37 carbon monoxide alarms were installed. Residents also received fire safety and emergency evacuation information.

OCFA and the American Red Cross installed 183 smoke alarms in 57 homes near Madison Elementary in Santa Ana on Saturday, 6/25. This outreach completed efforts that began on 5/21 at the Love Santa Ana Initiative event.

Remote Rescue – June 23 - At 1:09 p.m., Newport Beach Battalion 6, Newport Beach Engine 68, Newport Beach Medic 65, Battalion 5, and Helicopter 1 responded to a reported remote medical aid in the city of Newport Beach. Enroute Battalion 5 coordinated with NPBB6 in determining the patient location. NPBB6 reported that the patient was located in the Irvine Conservancy near Bommer Canyon and West Fork. Battalion 5 requested Patrol 57 and Patrol 11 to respond. Battalion 5 arrived on scene and established 73 Incident Command at the end of Ridge Park. Patrol 11 made access off the NB 73 and Patrol 26 made entry at Bommer Canyon and Shady Canyon. Helicopter 1 arrived on station and located the patient. Due to the terrain and patient injuries, Helicopter 1 was advised to insert their rescue paramedic. Truck 9 rescuers were inserted to help load and extract the patient. The patient was packaged, extracted, treated, and transported by Helicopter 1 to Mission Hospital as a trauma.

Haz-Mat Response – June 25 - At 11:18 a.m. an Auto Alarm response was dispatched to the Costco at 2655 El Camino Real in Tustin. Engine 21 arrived on scene and determined that there was a confirmed refrigerant leak, that the store was being evacuated and requested the Haz-Mat units to respond. A maintenance worker from Costco arrived at the store and was able to stop the leak. Haz-Mat units made an entry to do air monitoring while the building was being ventilated. Once air quality inside the store was back to safe levels the building was turned back over to store management.

After units were dispatched a request was made for Duke1 from the sheriff’s department. They advised the Duke1 was already in the area attempting to locate the patient as they had received a call at 12:59 p.m. of a female that had run out of water. Duke1 was requested to move communications over to 5A to coordinate with Helicopter 2. Duke 1 located the patient and had the paramedic make an evaluation of the patient and she was determined to be uninjured. Helicopter 2 confirmed that Duke1 did not need the OCFA rescue paramedic to be inserted to make a patient evaluation and again Duke1 advised there paramedic was with the patient and she was uninjured. All traffic was closed on Laguna Canyon Road. Fire was reported over ridges in the middle of the wilderness park with best access from Ridge Crest Park. Incident Command was established by Battalion 4 at 2535 Laguna Canyon Rd. Incident Commander ordered Type III strike teams, hand crews, fixed wing aircraft, additional helicopters from CAL FIRE, water tenders, and patrols to the incident as well as overhead support staff. A Type III S/T was ordered and filled from MetroNet. Helicopter 2 advised the fire spotting, burning at a moderate rate of spread mid slope in moderate fuels. At 1537 hours an air attack mapped the fire at 40-45 acres. D5 arrived onscene at 1600 hours and assumed Incident Command. CAL FIRE agency representative arrived onscene at approximately 5 p.m. Forward progress of the fire stopped at 6:06 p.m.
