PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE – Led by Commissioner Emrick

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS – Resident Blake Montero in attendance. Mr. Montero wanted to thank the Commission for looking into the Landscape District 92-1 and gave information regarding Placentia Champions Sports Complex.

COMMISSIONER COMMENTS AND REPORTS - None provided.

1. **APPROVAL OF MINUTES** –

April 11, 2016 and May 9, 2016

Due to lack of quorum, the Minutes of April 11 and May 9, 2016 will be postponed for approval until the next Recreation and Parks Commission meeting on July 11, 2016.

2. **OVERVIEW OF LANDSCAPE MAINTENANCE DISTRICT 92-1** –

Public Works Manager, Luis Estevez, discussed what Landscape Maintenance District 92-1 is. It was established in 1992 and has 2,200 parcels of land that the Landscape Maintenance District Covers. Funds collected through the district are used for landscape maintenance services such as upkeep of medians, and parkways located within the district boundaries, which also includes Placentia Champions Sports Complex (PCSC). In 1996 City Council took action to remove the PCSP from the Landscape Maintenance District. At the time, the City's general fund was able to support the cost of maintaining the sports park. However, in 2010, the City opted to move the cost back into the Landscape Maintenance District due to financial issues. In 2014, property owners were asked to vote to increase assessments that had been set since 1992 and are collected within that Landscape Maintenance District since (it costs about \$154.00/year per residence to maintain this district). Fees have stayed the same while there has been an increase in landscape maintenance costs. This fiscal year, there is less revenue than expenditure. In 2015, voters elected not to increase costs to the Landscape Maintenance District. The city pays \$48,775 a year to maintain the

landscape and an additional \$12,775 for bathroom maintenance, which all comes from the City's general fund. In current FY 2015-16, the City has collected \$49,353 from sport's user groups for field use. There has been an additional \$41,734 from the sports leagues to use the lights at the PCSC. The sports user groups are contributing a total of \$91,087.20 a year.

3. **MONTHLY REPORT -**

Staff González handed out a blue calendar with events for the Teen Arts Center. Community Services is planning on working with the Library and Boys and Girls Club with staffing and planning events for the Teen Arts Center. These include excursions, dinners, art week, and more.

Staff Gonzalez stated that the memorial bench has almost been finalized. A resident can submit an application with the location of the bench, the name of who will be remembered and \$1,000 check. The balance of \$650 for the bench will be paid upon bench installation. The application and plaque selected will go to the Commission to be approved. Accounts and cost have already been determined for the program.

City Council will be going dark for their next meeting because of the 4th of July holiday. The next City Council meeting will be held July 12, 2016. The St. Jude's Grant is on the next council agenda. The council has also decided that they will not be revisiting the medical marijuana issue. They unanimously voted No on bringing any medical marijuana businesses to the city. Staff González added that the laser leveling of the fields at the Placentia Champions Sports Complex was approved by City Council. The work will be starting the first week in July taking approximately ten days with the remaining of the month the fields will be closed.

4. **PARKS AND FACILITY PROJECT UPDATES-**

Staff González is still waiting for a grant update for the Veterans History Project grant. Backs Building ADA upgrades will be in the lobby and bathrooms and making a pathway from handicapped parking to the front doors. It will be started in October and completed in December. Gomez and Whitten pools are being renovated. There is a tentative grand opening day for Whitten pool on Wednesday June 29 at 3:00 p.m. Starting June 27, 2016, there will also be free meals, "Kid's Café" at Whitten Center. It will run Monday, Wednesday, and Thursdays at 11:00 a.m.

5. **BUDGET UPDATE -**

Staff González and Ortiz gave an overview regarding City expenditures and revenue. Some special department supplies were identified and were not accounted for when creating the budget. For example, updating tables and chairs for building rentals or supplies for Heritage Festival. The City does receive about \$90,000-100,000 in revenue from facility rentals.

6. **SPORTS USERS FINGERPRINTING POLICY DISCUSSION-**

Staff Brand discussed what background checks the sports users must go through. For example, girls' softball has a criminal history and background check and an interview process. Placentia Little League has optional fingerprinting, and checks the sex offender data base. Staff Brand suggested speaking with the Police

Department to find out how extensive the background check should be used by the sports groups. Commissioner Newman asked what other cities policies are. Staff Ortiz stated that they will not let the user groups rent fields until all their paperwork is completed. Staff González recommended a study on surrounding city policies, which will be presented at the next meeting.

7. **PARK INSPECTION REPORT –**

Commissioner Bartelt commented that the Parque de Los Vaqueros bathroom paper towel dispenser does not close. It was noticed on Sunday, June 12 at 11:30 a.m. Staff González has asked Staff Cardenas to put locks on the power outlets at the parks. Staff González is looking for grants to work on Parque de los Niños to expand parking and create a baseball field.

8. **STAFF COMMENTS**

Staff Ortiz reviewed the information on Concerts and Movies in the Park and discussed the community walks that have taken place and other walks that are planned to come. There was a Walk with the Mayor on May 21 and around 15 people participated. On June 12, at Kraemer Park, a walk with a St. Jude Hospital doctor had about 20 participants. The Pack Walk will be on Saturday, July 9, 2016 at Kraemer Park at 10:00 a.m. This will include a dog walk, parade, and dog costume contest. Commissioners and staff suggested going to PETCO, veterinarians, parks, grooming locations, and Lazy Dog restaurant to give flyers out.

Staff González reviewed the current agreement with the Placentia Yorba Linda Unified School District (PYLUSD) dated 2007. In this agreement, a concession stand/storage building and restrooms were to have been built at the Valadez school site; maintenance costs were to be split 50-50. The current Superintendent is leaving and efforts have been made to meet with him prior to his departure to discuss these issues. In addition, part of the discussion with the Superintendent will be the imbalance that is now taking place since fees are now charged for using the pools (which triggered higher fees for swimming lessons for the residents), and the schools increasing use of City sites for free.

Commissioner Newman stated that we haven't been pushing the district to hold them to the agreement that was made. Commissioner Emrick stated that Commissioner Hunt knew about a "sunset" clause that would end the agreement. Staff González stated that there was no end date with the agreement between the School District and the City so this should not be a concern. It was agreed that building a concession stand would be beneficial not only to the sports groups but also, it would make this location more appealing and help in the allocation of field distribution. Staff González added that the intent at this meeting with the Superintendent will be to press the District to honor the agreement and to find out how they are going to fund the improvements.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE – Led by Commissioner Hunt

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS – Resident Blake Montero in attendance. Mr. Montero asked if any of the Commissioners lived by Champions Park and expressed concerns that the Commissioners were not educated about the 92.1 ruling that relates to the special Landscape District assessment. Commissioners Hunt and Newman informed Mr. Montero that this item would be placed on a future agenda in order to be discussed. Commissioners are not able to offer comments or a response due to the Brown Act rules.

COMMISSIONER COMMENTS AND REPORTS -

Commissioner Emrick commented that he was too fast in taking the Ethics training online and he will have to retake it; the minimum time required is two hours.

1. **APPROVAL OF MINUTES** –

April 11, 2016

Due to lack of quorum, the Minutes of April 11, 2016 will be postponed for approval until the next Recreation and Parks Commission meeting on June 13, 2016.

2. **MONTHLY REPORT -**

Staff González distributed the Community Services calendar of activities and announced that the Summer opening of registration will be on Saturday, May 21. The Police Department will be offering a station tour and the Placentia Library will participate by having an information booth about their Summer reading programs. In addition, the first community walk will take place at 8:00 a.m., followed by one scheduled on June 9 at Kraemer Park at 6:30 p.m. Other community walks will be planned for July and August to include "Walk with the Doc" and "Pack Walk" – a dog walk, parade and dog costume.

On the City Council meeting of May 17, 2016, a Certificate of Recognition will be presented to the two top sponsors of the Love Placentia event, Bimbo Bakeries and Premier Chrysler Jeep. Each donated \$5,000.

Staff Rodarte coordinates the programs that are offered at the Whitten Center in conjunction with the partnership with the Friendly Center. Staff Rodarte presented an overview of the services to the community that are provided; food distribution, counseling for those individuals that do not have insurance, domestic violence, tutoring and upcoming events such as "Airplane Day", "Make a Garden", "Father/Daughter" event, etc. Commissioner Granger asked for contact information that can be given out to individuals in need of some of these services. A suggestion was made to have a business card with the back side in Spanish.

Commissioners Hunt and Newman reported that a meeting had been held with the Sports Advisory Committee last week. Concerns about the parking at Tuffree Park were discussed. The sports users were advised that if the neighborhood is negatively impacted by people parking on the streets close to the park, this may trigger a request for "Permit Parking". Another concern was the closure of Tri-City Park at 9:00 p.m. and the earlier closure once daylight savings time kicks in. The good news is that the County has not brought up the parking fee implementation. Commissioner Newman added that the sports groups have been getting along very well and no problems have been encountered.

Staff González commented that it was fantastic that the sports users have not had any controversy. They were reminded that they have to provide their 501C-3 proof and rosters to confirm that at least 60% of their participants are Placentia residents. Additionally, all coaches must be fingerprinted and their Board of Directors must provide confirmation in writing to the city. A revision to the policy to include "Fingerprint Policy" will be added to next month's agenda for discussion.

3. **PARKS AND FACILITY PROJECT UPDATES -**

Staff González reported that Zoot Velasco, from the Muckenthaler Center In Fullerton, had sent an e-mail announcing his departure from the Muckenthaler as he had accepted a CEO position for Kern County Museum effective the end of June. In the meantime, Community Services has applied for a grant from the Orange County Arts Council to help continue Teen Center Arts programming.

Staff González added that she is currently preparing the long grant application for a three year cycle of the USDA grant that supports the Farmer's Market. The application is due on Thursday, May 12, 2016.

St. Jude Hospital continues to be a great partner and has approved another grant for fiscal year 2016-2017 in the amount of \$65,000; \$50,000 toward outdoor exercise equipment and \$15,000 for other healthy living grant writing opportunities. The outdoor exercise equipment will be installed at Santa Fe Park. With the St. Jude Hospital initial grant, the City began the first steps to be considered an "Eager City" toward healthy living. The goal is to move up to a "HEAL" City (healthy eating, active living). The hospital is interested in attending a ribbon cutting after the installation of the outdoor exercise equipment at Parque De Los Niños and once the pool renovations are completed.

Staff González indicated that the design phase for the Backs Building restroom renovation is almost complete. An ADA ramp from the parking lot to the building entrance was added. This project includes renovations to the lobby and both

restrooms to be accessible. CDBG grant funding will be used. The laser leveling of the fields at Placentia Champions will be completed in July.

4. **LOVE PLACENTIA EVENT PROJECT REVIEW -**

Staff Ortiz reported that the Love Placentia event had over 1,200 volunteers and was a great success. Many of the projects included painting of the picnic shelters and fences around the pools, window cleaning and landscaping. Staff learned that preparation of the ground and slopes should be done before the event to make the planting easier. One of the top sponsors was Bimbo Bakeries; they had about 20 of their employees volunteer at Parque De Los Ninos and after the event noted that they would be willing to participate in other Community events. Commissioner Granger commented that it would be nice to see a positive article in the newspaper on this event.

5. **TEEN CENTER PROGRAMS UPDATE –**

Staff González indicated that plans were underway for the City to continue the teen programs at the Teen Arts Center. A meeting will be scheduled with the Placentia Library to discuss their participation. At the meeting with the Boys & Girls Club teens, they expressed a variety of interests: water color, social work, sports, etc. Staff González met with an Art teacher that has many ideas for art classes. Another possibility is to offer a video game design workshop as well as sports activities and games. The summer Teen program would run from July 5 through the end of August.

6. **ADOPT A BENCH PROGRAM REVIEW –**

Staff Gonzalez reported that the Adopt a Bench program was an active program when the City still operated Tri-City Park. A recent request from a resident came in to dedicate a bench at Tri-City Park. Staff González updated the old application process that now includes updated prices and the opportunity to dedicate a bench at any of the City parks. The resident was given a choice of three areas at Tuffree Park and the family made their selection. The total cost of the bench is \$1,650 and includes three lines and no more than 28 characters for a plaque that will be affixed to the back of the bench. A new account will be created to track the money as it comes in and the costs of the bench and plaque are paid. Commissioners Granger and Newman suggested to add a disclaimer to the application form that states: "City reserves the right to limit the number of dedicated benches at each of the City parks".

7. **BUDGET UPDATE –**

Staff González reported that the budget process had been delayed due to the recent employee embezzlement. City Manager has reassured that it will not be affecting city operations and that no cuts or layoffs are anticipated. Each department has turned in their budget requests and a meeting will be scheduled soon with the Department heads to finalize the budget. The interim Finance CFO has come on board. More updates on the budget will be provided at the next meeting.

Commissioner Hunt inquired about the City's use of the High School pools. Staff Ortiz commented that the School District had informed the City that there would be an hourly fee of \$30/hr. of actual pool use and an additional \$10/hr. for

custodial service. In the past, these fees have been waived. An invoice was received from the School District charging for the time that staff is there to set up and take down which was not part of the original discussion. These unexpected fees have triggered an increase of swim lessons fees to try to offset this added expense. Morning lessons at Valencia High School increased from \$60 last year to \$70 and evening lessons at El Dorado High School went from \$45 to \$60 per session.

Commissioner Hunt stated that the School District has not honored the agreement signed for the sale of Melrose and the new Valadez Middle School. As per the agreement, the School District had to build restrooms and a snack stand by the fields. Staff González will be meeting again with the School District and Commissioner Hunt will be notified of this meeting for his attendance.

Park Inspection Reports -

Commissioner Granger commented that Parque De Los Niños looked great and at Kraemer Park, the area downstairs of the Backs Building used by the Boys and Girls Club, still has a lot of trash; they should be using the leaf blower away from the building. The bucket left on top of the Powell Building reported last month has been removed.

STAFF COMMENTS –

Staff Maurer reported that the Summer Placentia Quarterly is expected to be delivered to all residences in the upcoming weekend. Staff Gonzalez added that through a recycle grant, new trash receptacles will be ordered (34 total). They will be replacing the old containers at Kraemer Park, Placentia Champions Sports Complex and some of the other parks.

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS – None in attendance.

COMMISSIONER COMMENTS AND REPORTS -

Commissioner Granger asked for Staff González' business card.

1. **APPROVAL OF MINUTES** –

March 14, 2015 Minutes

Commissioner Granger noted a correction under Staff Comments, second paragraph, last sentence "tile mosaic around the wall behind the fountain" instead of "around the base of the fountain".

MOTION by Commissioner Granger to approve the Minutes of March 14, 2016 as corrected; **SECOND** by Commissioner Dougherty and **CARRIED** by a **4-0-2-1 VOICE VOTE** (Emrick, Newman, Absent; Hunt Abstained).

2. **MONTHLY REPORT** -

Staff Ortiz reported that the deadline for Photo Contest entries was extended to April 28 to allow for more participation. A flyer with information about the "I Heart OC" was distributed. This is an opportunity for the community to come together on April 27-28 and donate to local nonprofits. The Placentia Community Foundation hopes to receive support on these days for their scholarship program. In the past, the City of Placentia, Heritage Festival and Boys & Girls Club have in turn received donations from the Placentia Community Foundation. Another event coming up is Shred Day scheduled on Saturday, April 23 from 8:00 a.m. – 11:00 a.m. in the Placentia Police compound. This is a great way to get rid of old records.

3. **PARKS AND FACILITY PROJECT UPDATES** -

Staff González reported that the agenda report on the concrete for the outdoor exercise equipment at Parque De Los Niños was going to City Council on April

19, 2016. St. Jude Hospital provided \$50,000 to purchase the outdoor exercise equipment and the City's match of \$21,300 for the preparation and concrete work is coming from the Park Development Fund. Once the equipment is installed, St. Jude Hospital and the Commissioners will be invited to the Ribbon Cutting sometime in May.

Staff González added that St. Jude Hospital had also provided a grant of \$69,000 to replaster both community pools as well as replacing the filtration system. This item is also going to City Council for approval at the April 19, 2016 meeting. Staff Pischel commented that Staff González' experience with grants is very impressive and the Community Services Department is very fortunate to have her.

4. LOVE PLACENTIA EVENT PROJECT REVIEW -

Staff Ortiz indicated that the "Love Placentia" Citywide serve day event is scheduled on Saturday, April 30. Marilyn Anderson, from the Police Department is the lead. So far, 400 volunteers have signed up online. A list of the projects scheduled to be done on this day was distributed. Commissioner Hunt commented that he was happy to see that many of the projects listed have been flagged before by the Commission. Staff González added that Bimbo Bakeries had agreed to sponsor \$5,000 towards the supplies needed for this event, and Sherwin Williams was donating paint.

5. TRI-CITY PARK CLOSURE UPDATE -

Staff Pischel provided an overview of the Tri-City Park transfer to the County that took effect in January 2013. In the last three and a half years, the County has addressed the maintenance and operations of the park and continues to work on the capital improvement projects identified prior to the transfer i.e., lighting, irrigation system, lake renovation, tree trimming, etc. The County's high maintenance standards show and the park looks great. There are activities that will continue to be held at the park as per the agreement such as the Heritage Festival, Concerts in the Park, etc. at no cost to the City.

Staff Pischel indicated that the Tri-City Park Authority has not been an active group since the transfer took place and was not officially dissolved. The members of the Authority (representatives from the cities of Brea, Fullerton and Placentia) will take this action to their respective City Councils soon. Staff Pischel added that if the Commissioners had any concerns about Tri-City Park, to share them with Staff. The City of Placentia maintains a good relationship with the County and any issues would be addressed.

Staff Brand reported that on February 17, 2016, he had received a phone call from the president of Pony Baseball, Tim Wetzel to discuss the sign that was posted by the County about the early closure of Tri-City Park at 6:00 p.m. Consequently, an e-mail was received from the County confirming this information. As a result, staff contacted all the other sports groups and related this information. In addition, the City started receiving phone calls from the residents around Tuffree Park complaining about the parking problem in the neighborhood. It was discovered that the parking available at Tuffree Middle School and by Tri-City Park was underutilized.

Staff Brand added that steps were then taken to address this complaint. All the sports groups using the fields at Tuffree; AYSO, JUSA, Pony Baseball, Placentia Little League and YMCA, were notified and given a flyer to distribute to the parents that notes the availability of parking and requesting that the adjacent neighborhood not be impacted. The time for the park closure since then has moved to 9:00 p.m. for the duration of daylight savings time.

6. **MUCKENTHALER ARTS CENTER UPDATE -**

Staff González distributed a copy of the letter sent by the Muckenthaler Center notifying the City of the termination of the Art Teen Center activities at the Teen Center. She met with Zoot Velasco and it was unclear what the terms of the agreement were and their expectation in regards to the City's money contribution. They felt they could not continue the programming with the seed money of \$5,000 that the City had provided. In order to continue the relationship with the City, a City contribution of \$15,000-\$20,000 would be expected.

In the meantime, Community Services staff met with a group of 15-20 teens from the Boys and Girls Club to discuss their interests in the arts and suggestions. The interests ranged from culinary art to American Idol, science, math, technology, etc. The Placentia Library is also interested in partnering with Community Services to expand on their current teen programs and incorporate the arts. Staff González was enthusiastic about the City continuing and expanding on the Teen Center activities.

Commissioner Dougherty expressed disappointment about the fact that groups like the Muckenthaler approach the City with promises that eventually do not deliver. Staff works hard to make an agreement work, but the City does not get what was offered. When a group is allowed to run the program, the City loses control. Commissioner Bartelt indicated she was upset about the negative way Placentia was represented in the newspaper and statements Muckenthaler made about what they City could not provide and they could. During her visits to the Teen Center, there was very little activity/participation.

Park Inspection Reports -

Commissioner Hunt reported that there is a 5 gallon bucket on the flat roof portion of the Powell Building on the patio area that should be removed. Commissioner Granger commented that an additional trash receptacle should be added to Kraemer Park near the playground/sidewalk area.

STAFF COMMENTS -

Staff González indicated that the laser leveling of the fields at Placentia Champions Sports Complex will be taken to City Council for approval. The ADA restroom renovation to the Backs Building is moving forward. Community Services has a Facebook page and building its "Likes". Everything that is posted on Facebook, is also in the City's website. The Cathy Torrez Learning Center, through the Friendly Center, hosted a "Golden Retriever" to teach kids how to care for animals.

Staff González added that a resident request had come in for a Memorial Bench in honor of a deceased spouse. In the past, memorial bench and tree planting requests have been handled for Tri-City Park. Staff is doing research and putting together

recommendations and an application process for these types of requests at other park locations.
