City Introduces New Fraud Hotline

A fraud hotline has been launched by the City of Placentia as part of its continuing effort to increase transparency and accountability. The hotline is designed for reporting suspected cases of fraud, waste or abuse by the City, its employees, contractors or vendors. Incidents can be reported online at www.placentia.org/fraudhotline or by dialing toll-free (844) 404-3168. On either platform, the reporter can choose to provide his or her contact information or remain completely anonymous. A *Report Key* will be issued to the reporter which allows them to follow-up on their submitted case.



Reported incidents will be investigated by City officials and/or the City Attorney's Office depending on the severity of the report and implicated individuals. After thoroughly researching various options, the City of Placentia partnered with Navex Global to implement the fraud hotline service. Navex has been utilized by many agencies across the public and private sectors to provide a confidential reporting tool to assist management and employees in addressing fraud, abuse, and other misconduct in the workplace, all while cultivating a positive work environment and instilling confidence and trust from the community. District Elections Overview

On July 19, 2016 the City Council voted to adopt resolutions to place a measure on the November 2016 ballot asking voters whether Placentia should amend its current “at large” system for electing officials to a “by-district” system.

Should the measure be approved by voters, the City will retain a consultant to prepare maps with five boundaries for proposed districts based on technical data and community input. These maps would be reviewed and approved by the City Council during a public hearing process. Each of the newly developed districts will be represented by a single Council Member living within that district chosen by the voters of that district.

The City received a demand letter dated December 11, 2015 from the Mexican American Legal Defense Education Fund (MALDEF) alleging the City’s “at large” system of electing City Council members violates the California Voting Rights Act (CVRA) and must be converted to afford Latino voters an equal opportunity to elect City Council members. The demand letter threatened a lawsuit if the City did not comply with MALDEF’s demands. After evaluating the merits of the letter with the City Attorney’s Office and analyzing other cities’ losses under similar threats, the City entered into a settlement agreement with MALDEF in February 2016, which was subsequently amended. One intent of the settlement agreement is to create at least one district in which Latinos constitute a majority of the citizen voting age population. The City could be exposed to financial liability for not complying with the California Voting Rights Act if the ballot measure fails in November 2016. Therefore, the settlement agreement includes a provision that would place the measure on the November 2018 ballot if it fails in November 2016.

If the measure is adopted by voters, the City will contract with a demographer to design one or more electoral maps. The map boundaries would result in nearly equal districts based on population and be designed to respect the geographic integrity of neighborhoods and any community interest, including racial, ethnic and language minorities.

If the measure is adopted in November 2016, then by May 1, 2018 Placentia shall approve and adopt one of the final district map plans. If the measure is adopted in November 2018, then by May 1 2020, Placentia shall approve and adopt one of the final district map plans. Significant Events

July 14, 2016

An Officer attempted a bike stop in Atwood. The male adult dropped the bike and fled on foot. A foot pursuit ensued and a perimeter was quickly set. At approximately 5:40 p.m., Officers were dispatched to the Burger King at Rose and Yorba Linda regarding a drunk male inside harassing customers. When an Officer arrived, he could see the male was in the process of confronting patrons inside the store. When the Officer made contact with the male inside the restaurant, the male immediately became confrontational. When the Officer placed his hands on the subject a struggle ensued. The Officer took the subject to the ground and in doing so, struck his head on a trash can bin causing a small laceration on his forehead. The subject was taken into custody outstanding warrant for resisting arrest. He was later booked at Orange County Jail. The Officer was treated at Placentia Linda Hospital and released.

Remote Rescue – July 16 - A medical aid was reported within the Irvine Wilderness Park at approximately 9:10 a.m. A male hiker with chief complaint of cardiac related illness on Fox Run Trail ¼ mile from Serrano Ridge requested assistance and a full REMOTE response was dispatched. OCSO was advised and they coordinated their copters for search. DUKE1 responded from JWA. Park rangers also responded to assist locating the patient.
