

PUBLIC WORKS

Civic Center Landscape Improvements

City Staff recently renovated six median islands located in the Civic Center parking lot. The medians were previously turf grass. They were replaced with low-water usage plant materials. In addition, the irrigation systems for each median were renovated by replacing pop up irrigation heads with drip emitters. By eliminating thirsty turf grass with shrubs and plant materials as well as implementing drip irrigation, staff estimates an annual water savings in these medians of approximately 170,000 gallons.

State water conservation regulations enacted two years ago prohibit the watering of ornamental grass street medians throughout the State. As such, much of the turf grass found in the City's medians have since died. In response, the City Council allocated \$80,000 in Fiscal Year 2016-17 for a Citywide street median turf grass renovation project. City staff is designing the new landscape improvements in-house and will complete this work utilizing a combination of City staff and contractors. The turf grass entry median on Kraemer Boulevard at the Brea City Limits is currently under renovation along with a turf grass median on Chapman Avenue across from City Hall. Be on the lookout for more median renovations around town in the next few months!





Temporary Freeway Closure Along the 91 Express Lanes

Beginning September 9, OCTA is undertaking a rehabilitation of the 91 Express Lanes along the SR-91 corridor between Orange and Riverside Counties. This project will require the closure of the 91 Express Lanes, and the #1 general purpose lane over a series of weekends beginning in September. Branded “The 91 Weekend Shift”, repaving is scheduled to occur over an estimated 10 consecutive weekends, 5 weekends in each direction and 1 direction at a time. Paving will begin in the eastbound direction from about SR-55 to the County line. Once repaving is finished in the eastbound direction, crews will repave the 91 Express Lanes in the westbound direction, from about the County line to SR-55. Changes to OC Bus Service Begins in October

OC Bus is changing! Beginning October 9, OCTA will roll out extensive changes to its bus system, including adding more-frequent arrivals and better connections. In some areas where ridership is low, some routes will be changed or discontinued. New community shuttles are on the way to assist and supplement discontinued service in some areas. Additionally, anytime, anywhere bus pass purchasing will be available through the OC Bus app. Also, the price of a Day Pass will drop from \$5 to \$4 for six months. Maintenance Division

This past week our staff performed various maintenance activities throughout the City. The Graffiti Crew removed graffiti per work order requests citywide. The Sign Shop repaired and replaced signs per work order requests. The Patch Crew filled in pot holes on arterial streets Yorba Linda Boulevard and Valencia Avenue. In addition, the Patch Crew dug the footings and poured concrete for the Eagle Scout Project at City Hall. The Paint Crew painted traffic legends in zones 20 and 21. The Ballfield Maintenance Crew worked on the infields at the Sports Complex, Tuffree Park and Torii Hunter field. The Facility Maintenance Crew completed work orders for City buildings including renovations for offices at City Hall. The Irrigation Crew repaired and replaced irrigation valves at City Parks: Kraemer Memorial, Tuffree Hill, McFadden and Champions Sports Complex. The Maintenance Crew cleaned the downtown area and performed weed abatement in assigned areas. In addition, City Staff are planting new drought plant material at City Hall in the main parking lot medians.

Our contractor, West Coast Arborists (WCA), will be trimming the Ficus vines on the following arterial streets: Bastanchury Road, Golden Avenue, Kraemer Boulevard, Placentia Avenue, Rose Drive and Chapman Avenue for the next few weeks. WCA will also be trimming the palm trees on



the City's parkways on Kraemer Boulevard, Palm Avenue and Bradford Avenue.

September 1, 2016

A residential burglary was reported in the 500 block of Gerhold Lane. The offense occurred while the residents were asleep inside at approximately 5:00 a.m.; they awoke to find their house ransacked. Placentia Police Detectives are actively investigating this incident.

A suspicious person was reported to have flagged down a person and asked if they could help "rob a grandma" so she could use the money to buy drugs. The suspicious person was located and arrested for possession of a meth pipe and warrants.

A DUI hit and run traffic collision occurred at Chapman and Murray. The suspect was located a block away and was the registered owner of the vehicle. The suspect had the ignition keys and was identified by witnesses. The suspect was arrested for DUI and misdemeanor hit and run.

City Council Approves a 10 Unit Condominium Project

On September 6th the City Council approved a 10 unit condominium project located on Spruce St. east of Van Buren and north of Orangethorpe Ave. These Spanish Mediterranean style units will feature a two-car garage, covered entries and recessed window treatments and energy efficient low profile concrete tiles. In addition, every home opens to a patio deck onto the central courtyard area from the second floor off the master bedroom.

All of the dwelling units will have two bedrooms and will have a floor area of 1,858 square feet. The floor units will also include ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) compliance amenities.

Grading has commenced and construction of these new condominiums will begin shortly after.

Building & Safety and Planning Divisions

1. On August 22nd, the Building & Safety Division reviewed and approved structural plans and detail analysis for a single-family home foundation repair project located at Heather Avenue. The scope of work includes installing steel pipe columns underneath the existing concrete footing to the bedrock in order to repair the damaged footings. The valuation of this project is \$35,000.
2. On August 22nd, the Building & Safety Division reviewed and approved solar panel installation plans and structural analysis for eight (8), single-family homes. The valuation for these projects range from \$15,000 to \$32,000.
3. On August 23rd, the Building & Safety and Planning divisions reviewed and approved tenant improvement plans for a new hair salon located at 1158 Imperial Hwy. This project includes new partition walls, restroom renovations, new plumbing, electrical and HVAC fixture units. The valuation of this project is \$45,000.
4. On August 23rd, the Building & Safety and Planning divisions reviewed and approved architectural plans for a room addition project located at Browerwoods Place. This project involves converting the portion of an existing tandem garage into a new bedroom. The valuation of this project is \$25,000.
5. On August 24th, the Building Division reviewed and approved residential remodeling plans for a single-family home at Lasterbrook. The scope of work includes removing existing non-bearing walls, new interior walls, restroom and kitchen remodeling, new HVAC and electrical systems. The valuation of this project is \$50,000.

Remote Rescue – September 3 - At approximately 10:30 a.m. OCSO made a third party report of a bicyclist down with an off duty firefighter onscene underneath the Crown Valley Bridge between Cecil Pasture and Jardines. A bike response was dispatched as ECC attempted to call back the phone number of the onscene reporting party. There was no answer upon call back. Engine 9 arrived onscene, assumed Crown Valley Incident Command, and balanced to a remote rescue response. The patient was on a dirt bike trail in the bottom of the riparian under the bridge. DUKE 1 assumed the search role and ORC Helicopter 3 assumed rescue and HELCO. Battalion 7 arrived onscene and assumed Incident Command. Helicopter 3 inserted a rescuer; the patient was flown directly to Mission Hospital as a trauma.

Amphitheater Incident Command advised there were five traumas, one moderate, and three persons signed AMA onscene. Incident Command confirmed Irvine PD personnel were not injured. Vegetation Fire – September 6 - At 2:24 p.m., a medium watershed vegetation response was dispatched to the area of Avery Parkway in Mission Viejo. Truck 9 arrived on scene at 2:33 p.m. and reported 1-2 acres in light to medium fuels. The assignment was augmented with fixed wing aircraft, one additional helicopter with crew, three Type III Engine Strike Teams, two Type I Engine Strike Teams, and one Crew Strike Team. The fire was contained to approximately 77 acres (1/8 acre in LRA and the remainder in SRA).

Structure Fire – September 7 - A structure fire was reported on Brighton in Westminster at 10:58 p.m. Engine 66 arrived on scene, assumed Brighton Incident Command, reported heavy smoke, and requested a balance to a working structure assignment. Incident Command requested an additional medic unit and a code 3 ambulance as a precaution. Engine 66 confirmed one civilian patient, GGVM1 handled patient care.
