PUBLIC WORKS

Landscape Street Median Improvements



Renovations were recently completed on a landscaped street median on Kraemer Boulevard. The median is located at the entry point into Placentia on the City's border with Brea. The entry median was previously turf grass which was replaced with low water usage plant materials. In addition, the irrigation system for the median was renovated by replacing pop up irrigation heads with drip lines. By replacing the turf grass with shrubs and plant materials as well as utilizing a drip irrigation system, staff estimates an annual water savings of approximately 60,000 gallons.

State water conservation regulations enacted two years ago prohibit the watering of ornamental grass street medians throughout the State. As such, much of the turf grass found in the City's medians have since died. In response, the City Council allocated \$80,000 in Fiscal Year 2016-17 for a Citywide street median turf grass renovation project. City staff are designing the new landscape improvements in-house and will complete this work utilizing a combination of City staff and contractors. This project benefits the community by improving the aesthetics of our streetscapes as well as saving tens of thousands of gallons of potable water each year and lower



utility bills. A turf grass median on Chapman Avenue across from City Hall is currently being renovated with the improvements expected to be completed within the next few weeks. Be on the lookout for more median renovations around town!

Changes to OC Bus Service Begins in October

OC Bus is changing! Beginning October 9, OCTA will roll out extensive changes to its bus system, including adding more-frequent arrivals and better connections. In some areas where ridership is low, some routes will be changed or discontinued. New community shuttles are on the way to assist and supplement discontinued service in some areas. Additionally, anytime, anywhere bus pass purchasing will be available through the OC Bus app. Also, the price of a Day Pass will drop from \$5 to \$4 for six months. Irvine

HazMat Response – September 9 - At 8:03 a.m. a chemical spill response was sent to West Construction Circle in Irvine. Engine 6 arrived on scene of an approximate 500' x 200' semi-covered Waste Management recycling facility with nothing showing. Engine 6 reported that several employees were complaining of eye and throat irritation. Battalion 5 arrived on-scene and established Construction Command. Engine 6 and Truck 6 were assigned to isolate, deny entry, and evacuate any remaining employees along the Alpha, Bravo, and Charlie side of the facility. Engine 6 reported that they had approximately 20 employees stating they were experiencing eye and throat irritation. Battalion 5 declared a Multi-Casualty Incident and requested additional resources. Engine 6 was assigned Medical Group and established a treatment area, initiated triage, treatment, and transported seven BLS patients. HazMat 204 was assigned HazMat Group Supervisor with the objective of air monitoring and identify the location and type of HazMat involved. HazMat 4 and Engine 27 were assigned to HazMat Group Supervisor to assist with their objectives. HazMat made entry and were unable to locate or identify the source of the HazMat. The incident was turned over to Orange County Health HazMat. Orange County Health HazMat later reported that they found seven tear gas canisters in the area where the Waste Management employees were working. The incident was declared under control at 10:43 a.m. No civilian or firefighter injuries were reported. Duty Chief and Division 2 were notified on scene by Battalion 5. Representatives from Irvine Police Department, Cal-OSHA, and Waste Management assisted.

Kitchen Fire – September 9 - A kitchen fire was reported by the resident on Charmaine Lane in Yorba Linda at 9:09 a.m. Engine 10 arrived onscene and reported heavy smoke from the structure, assumed Charmaine Incident Command, and requested the initial alarm assignment balanced to a working structure fire. Knockdown and primary all clear occurred at 9:26 a.m. Engine 32 reported ornamental vegetation in the rear yard had ignited with no threat to exposures. There was one displaced adult and one displaced child who stated they would be staying with family overnight.
