## AlertOC Regional Test Exercise

September marks National Preparedness Month, urging residents and businesses to prepare for the many hazards that threaten our daily lives and sense of normalcy – most often occurring in Southern California with little to no warning. Consider the state's historic drought, drawing ever-increasing concern from first responders due to the elevated wildfire danger. Often disasters occur rapidly, forcing evacuations and road closures to neighborhoods. AlertOC, the County's mass notification system, is a critical link for residents to immediately learn of any required actions, such as evacuating their homes during an imminent fire. On September 22, more than two million Orange County residents received a call to test AlertOC. The drill replicated a large scale, multi-jurisdictional emergency requiring thousands of numbers to be called simultaneously across Orange County's entire region. This was the seventh annual regional test of the system and included 26 participating cities as well as the County's unincorporated areas. Overall, the City of Placentia showed the highest success rate with respect to making contact across the County according to preliminary reports from the County.

The distinctive feature of AlertOC is the ability for individuals to register multiple contact methods and addresses. Registrations of cell phone and alternate numbers dramatically increase the ability to reach the greatest number of community members within minutes. This enables landlines, cell phones and e-mail addresses to be incorporated into a single notification system. It is also strongly encouraged that residents who registered their contact information in the past visit the website and login to ensure their information is most accurate and up to date. ### Free Flu Shots

To receive a flu shot, participants should be feeling well on the day of the flu shot and must complete a brief health screening to ensure they can safely receive a flu vaccine. "We appreciate the opportunity to partner with the Orange County Health Care Agency and other community partners," said City Administrator Damien Arrula. "The event will help improve our capabilities to respond to a large scale event while offering free flu shots to our community."

### Parent Meeting at Cathy Torrez Learning Center



## PUBLIC WORKS

### Emergency Operations Center Renovation Project



At its September 20th meeting, the City Council awarded a construction contract to R Dependable Construction for the Emergency Operations Center Renovation Project. The City's Emergency Operations Center (EOC) is housed within City Hall and forms the base of operations to plan, coordinate, and implement the City's emergency response plan for natural disasters or other serious incidents. This project will renovate the City's existing EOC to provide additional floor space, as well as new ceilings, lights, flooring, paint and drywall improvements, storage and counter space. In addition, the electrical system will be completely renovated and will provide floor mounted electrical outlets and data ports at multiple work

stations to connect EOC operators to the City's network. Multiple flat panel televisions will also be installed and connected to the City's network and will be able to receive and display live video feeds from the field.

The newly remodeled EOC will fully integrate the City's emergency response system by more effectively connecting City Hall with the City's mobile command unit, field operations and improve emergency response coordination with outside agencies during regional emergencies. The EOC will also provide space for classroom and training activities to support additional City operations as well as regional law enforcement taskforces.

The budget for this project amounts to \$225,000 which is funded entirely with a combination of Public Safety Fee Mitigation funds as well as Asset Forfeiture funds. No General Fund dollars will be expended on this project. Construction on this project is expected to begin in late October and should be completed within three months.

### Changes to OC Bus Service Begins in October

OC Bus is changing! Beginning October 9, OCTA will roll out extensive changes to its bus system, including adding more-frequent arrivals and better connections. In some areas where ridership is low, some routes will be changed or discontinued. New community shuttles are on the way to assist and supplement discontinued service in some areas. Additionally, anytime, anywhere bus pass purchasing will be available through the OC Bus app. Also, the price of a Day Pass will drop from \$5 to \$4 for six months. All available Patrol, Traffic, and Investigative units responded and began searching for the child. The Placentia Police Department also had assistance from Anaheim Police Helicopter (PA announcements from overhead), Fullerton PD, and Cal State Fullerton PD after a Red Channel Broadcast was made. At 2:15 p.m. the child was located unharmed within the large property and apparently wandered off and/or hid from her relatives. An incident report was taken and a referral was made to Child Protective Services for follow-up.

#### September 19, 2016

A male was stabbed in the 1600 block of Vincente. The male was stabbed on the arm and was taken to a trauma capable emergency room. He was later rushed into surgery due to the severity of the injury. The suspect is outstanding and Placentia PD are currently investigating the incident.

#### September 20, 2016

An apartment caught fire after the resident burned food on his stovetop. No one was injured and the residents escaped. Numerous engine companies from Orange County Fire Authority responded and put the fire out. The damage to the property is estimated to be approximately \$8000.



Fall has arrived, and it has brought strong, gusty winds. A fire weather watch will be in effect starting tomorrow, September 23, through Sunday afternoon for the Inland Empire and Santa Ana Mountains. A fire weather watch means that critical fire weather conditions are forecast to occur, and red flag warnings are possible. Any fires that develop could spread rapidly due to these conditions. Orange County Fire Authority has increased staffing in anticipation of an offshore wind event. This up-staffing includes a hand crew, a second helicopter, and a 24-hour dozer.

Prior to HazMat arrival the portion of the resort near the spill was evacuated along with the air handling systems in the area were shut down. Once HazMat arrived, they made a level B entry, identified the chemicals involved and were able to clean up the spill with no further hazard. Paramedics evaluated three people on scene that were complaining of minor respiratory issues and eye irritation. All three were treated at scene and released.
