DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

Placentia Veterans Village



The City is taking the lead on a state-of-the-art development that will bring permanent supportive housing to military veterans who are homeless or disabled. This high-quality Craftsman style development will be the first of its kind in Orange County. The City is partnering with the County of Orange, Mercy Housing California, and New Directions to plan, design, construct and administer the Placentia Veterans Village, a high quality, service-enriched, affordable housing

development in the City of Placentia. The development site is a 3.65-acre unimproved site comprised of two parcels, one is owned by the Orange County Flood Control District and the adjacent parcel is owned by a private party. The Development is located adjacent to a newly constructed street located near the intersection of Orangethorpe Avenue and Lakeview Avenue; north of the Atwood Flood Control Channel. The current property is vacant and has frequently been used for illegal dumping. The new Development will improve the property significantly while addressing a need in Orange County and throughout the nation.

The proposed Development will include fifty (50) fully furnished apartment homes, (forty-nine (49) for veterans and one (1) for one on-site management unit), a courtyard, community garden, recreation room, energy efficient appliances, computer lab room, and resident services offices. The state-of-the-art development will be LEED Gold, utilizing energy efficient design principles and building materials.

“The City is proud to be in the forefront of this much needed development,” said Mayor Craig Green. “Any solution to the increasing plight of the homeless in our community must include a focus on veterans who have risked their lives to protect our freedoms. Even one veteran sleeping on our streets is too many,” said Mayor Green.

On Tuesday, January 10, 2017 the City Council approved a development agreement and entitlements for the proposed Development and on Tuesday, January 24, 2017 the Orange County Board of Supervisors approved a long term lease agreement for Mercy Housing to begin the next phase of the Development, which will include preparing building plans and applying for State grants.

“I was extremely pleased to see that the County Board of Supervisors and our City Council have unanimously approved the necessary documents to make the Placentia Veterans Village a reality,” said City Administrator Damien R. Arrula. “Once developed, the Placentia Veterans Village will create a high-quality community that offers a unique model of excellent development combined with coordinated services to support our homeless and disabled veterans on set them back on a path toward stability. Placentia has taken the lead in this area and we hope that many other Orange

- Pre-Fire Management worked cooperatively with the USFS to provide emergency access to Holy Jim. This involved clearing a major debris flow that covered Trabuco Creek Road and the associated removal of stranded vehicles. OCFA's Heavy Fire Equipment Operators, as well as various pieces of heavy equipment were used.
- Pre-Fire Management began the initial development process for establishing standardized responses into Open Space Areas for medical emergencies, and was the initial liaison to OC Parks. This project will now be overseen by EPAC, with Chief Harrison as the lead.
- Working cooperatively with OC Parks, State Parks, and the USFS, Pre-Fire Management helped provide an assessment of damage to remote area roads, associated emergency access issues and needed repairs. This involved a ground-based assessment, as well as Air Operations assistance.



- Initial planning is underway for upcoming Heavy Equipment Workshop and Fire School at Camp Pendleton. These are cooperative efforts to better prepare our resources for future fires. Agencies include CAL FIRE, USFS, and other local government cooperators.
- An educational process is being developed for the implementation of the new Fire Danger Operating Plan.
- The final draft of the Countywide Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CAL FIRE Grant Funded) is nearing completion and was discussed at last week's COAST meeting, and with other associated stakeholders.
- The Emerging Tree Pests of Orange County Task Force is developing an Incident Action Plan to address the challenges for Goldspotted Oak Borer and Polyphagous Shot Hole Borer, along with other stakeholders.
- Working cooperatively with CAL FIRE to better address defensible space tracking, through our Contract County relationship, we are moving towards using the "Collector" application to provide increased accountability.
- Fire Prevention Specialist Teri Merritt continued to support the efforts of the North Tustin Fire Safe Council, and attended their January meeting where they worked on developing better online tools to reach residents.
- Similarly, Fire Prevention Specialist Kim Brown attended the January meeting for East Orange County Canyons Fire Safe Council, where they discussed specifics for the upcoming Roadside Clearance grant, funded by the SRA Fire Prevention Fee, as well as tentatively scheduled five chipper days through the end of June. Kim also attended this week's meeting for the Inter-Canyon League.

Remote Rescue – February 2 - At 4:44 p.m., a remote rescue response was dispatched to a biker down on a trail in Laguna Coast Wilderness Park. Helicopter 1 and DUKE1 were in the air searching as ground units made ground access to the patient. It was determined the patient could be transported out in the Park Ranger vehicle and all air assets were cancelled. The patient then went POV to Saddleback Hospital.

Structure Fire – February 2 - At 8:13 p.m., Engine 163 was dispatched to a reported refuse fire behind 6072 Lincoln Avenue. Engine 163 arrived on scene at 8:17 p.m. and requested a structure response for a refuse fire that extended to several out buildings. The fires were quickly knocked down and reported out at 8:55 p.m. One victim sustained burn injuries and was transported to UCI. The Red Cross responded to assist with two displaced adults.

Traffic Collision Cut & Rescue – February 3 – At 2:43 a.m., Engine 13 was dispatched to a traffic collision with injuries at La Palma Avenue and Walker. After receiving reports of possible victims trapped the assignment was upgraded to a traffic collision cut and rescue response. Engine 13 arrived on scene at 2:47 a.m. with multiple victims trapped and requested three additional medic units and four additional code 3 ambulances. Battalion 8 arrived on scene at 2:54 a.m. and assumed the Incident Command declaring a multi-casualty incident. Mercy Air was requested to assist but was unable to lift due to weather. Helicopter 1 was requested but was later cancelled and all patients were transported via ground ambulance. Three patients were transported to UCI, one patient to OC Global and two patients signed out AMA.

Remote Rescue – February 4 – At 3:58 p.m., Helicopter 1 was requested to assist Anaheim Fire with a hiker down on a ridge top in Santiago Oaks Regional Park. HC 1 located the patient from the air and inserted two rescue medics via hoist. After evaluating the patient, it was determined the patient was experiencing a cardiac event. A stokes basket extraction via flat pitch landing was performed and the patient was transported directly to OC Global.

Battalion 6 arrived on scene with a large two-story estate home well involved and assumed the Incident Command. The fire was reported under control at 6:35 p.m. and units would remain on scene for extended mop-up. A primary and secondary all clear was reported at 7:04 p.m. One resident suffered smoke inhalation which caused nasal congestion. He was transported to Mission for further evaluation. One dog perished in the fire.
