Mayor Pro Tem Represents Placentia and Orange County during the League of California Cities' Policy Committee Meetings in Ontario

On **March 30th – 31st**, Placentia Mayor Pro Tem Chad Wanke represented the City of Placentia and the County of Orange at the League of California Cities' second policy committee meeting of 2017. Mayor Pro Tem Wanke serves on the Housing, Community and Economic Development Policy Committee, which is integral to the League's policy-making process. He also serves on the Board of Directors of the Orange County Sanitation District and as a Commissioner on the Orange County Waste Management Commission.

"Placentia directly benefits from participation in this policy committee because our current planning projects like the Transit Oriented Development Plan and the Old Town Placentia Revitalization Plan have significant housing, community and economic benefits. Both plans are heavily impacted by State legislation. The bills we reviewed in the Policy Committee directly affect the budget and quality of life in Placentia and Orange County. We use the Committee to develop policies that allow us to work with State lawmakers and shape future legislation to meet the needs of Placentia and Orange County residents. Without this meeting our influence on the State's decisions would be greatly diminished," said Mayor Pro Tem Wanke.

"At the last meeting, I made a motion to oppose legislation that would have forced cities to allow residential occupancy of industrial buildings. Although the bill made an admirable attempt at addressing the current lack of affordable housing in California, this bill would have imposed several unfunded State mandates on cities, forcing cities to divert funding from other critical municipal functions," said Mayor Pro Tem Wanke.

"These meetings are a great way for city officials to learn about legislative proposals affecting cities and offers an opportunity for individual cities to have their voices heard by the League and translated into direct advocacy efforts." said League Executive Director Carolyn Coleman.

There are seven standing League policy committees including; Community Services, Governance, Transparency and Labor Relations, Environmental Quality, Housing, Community and Economic Development, Public Safety, Revenue and Taxation, Transportation, Communications, and Public Works. These committees evaluate proposed legislation as it relates to existing policies and make recommendations for legislation where the League currently does not have policy.

The League's policy-making process allows city officials to debate the issues facing California and the organization's policy directions to be established. Close to 400 city officials serve on the League's policy committees and add their collective expertise, wisdom and opinions to the policy debate that is the foundation of the League policy-making process. The recommendations from the policy committee are forwarded to the League Board of Directors.

Following the April meetings in Ontario, the League's policy committees will meet in June in Sacramento and in September during the League's annual conference in Sacramento as needed.



City Council approves the Transit Oriented Development (TOD) Packing House District

On **April 18th** the City Council adopted Ordinance No. O-2017-04 establishing the TOD Packing House Zoning District. The approved Zone Change and General Plan Amendment collectively will create the TOD Packing House District, which includes all new development standards that will be used to create entirely new mixed-use and residential developments as well as quality public infrastructure that would support the area surrounding the new Placentia Metrolink Station. Previously zoned manufacturing, the area is currently characterized by a mix of low-scale industrial type uses and various non-conforming land uses.

Operational by 2020, the proposed new state-of-the art Metrolink Station and nearby 253-space parking structure Station will help transform the newly designated TOD Packing House District (near Melrose Street and Crowther Avenue) into an active, vibrant destination. Transit-oriented development, or TOD, is a planning and community development concept that includes a mixture of housing, retail, supporting uses and/or other amenities integrated into a walkable neighborhood located within a half-mile of a high volume public transportation station. Although significant new residential and mixed-use development is anticipated, the TOD Packing House District will also support existing retail and restaurant businesses in the area while growing the City's local economy. 

PLACENTIA AVENUE RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT



FACT SHEET



As part of an ongoing effort to repair public roads and improve pedestrian accessibility, the cities of Placentia and Fullerton have jointly initiated the Placentia Avenue Reconstruction Project. Both cities received Federal Arterial Pavement Management grant funds to reconstruct Placentia Avenue, a busy arterial roadway shared by both cities. This is a priority project as the current roadway conditions require it to be completely rebuilt. The project limits are Placentia Avenue between Ruby Drive and Chapman Avenue in addition to enhancing accessibility and safety.

The scope of work for this project includes the removal and replacement of the existing asphalt pavement and portions of the road base, as well as reconstructing damaged sidewalks, driveways, curbs and gutters, and ramps.

WHAT TO EXPECT DURING CONSTRUCTION

Construction is slated to begin June 1, 2017, with an estimated completion date in late August 2017. Construction will take place Monday through Friday, 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. During construction work, one lane in each direction will be open to through traffic, however, there will be extended temporary lane closures in place. Driveway access may be temporarily impacted at times for those who have only one driveway.

Please observe traffic control and advisory signs that will be updated regularly to reflect current construction activities and schedules. Detour signs will be posted, and residents and businesses can direct their questions to the construction helpline at (714) 442-0010. Additionally, updates will be posted on the cities of Placentia and Fullerton websites www.placentia.org/placentiaproject and www.cityoffullerton.com.

PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

- Removal and replacement of aging pavement
- Improve access ramps to meet ADA requirements
- Restore damaged sidewalks, driveways, curbs and gutters

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO!

- Travel on Placentia Avenue will be limited to one-lane of traffic in each direction; motorists should expect delays.
- It is recommended that motorists use alternative routes, if possible.
- Construction is scheduled June 1 to August 31, 2017

Remote Rescue / Medical Aid – April 23 - At 12 p.m., a remote medical aid was dispatched to the area of Shady Canyon, 1/2 mile up the Quail Trail. Due to the steepness of the terrain and no vehicle access. Engine 347 Firefighter/Paramedics hiked up the trail with ALS gear and started their assessment and treatment of a 37-year-old female and requested that the patient be extracted by Helicopter 1. Due to the location of the trail, steep terrain and no suitable Landing Zone, Helicopter 1 inserted a Rescue Medic via hoist. Patient was further assessed and the decision was made to extract patient by basket hoist. A second rescuer off of Truck 9 was inserted to help with basket tagline. Patient was packaged and prepared to fly direct to Mission Hospital. Patient was re-assessed enroute to hospital. Patient care was transferred to ER staff after cold off load.
