The volunteers donated over 3,000 volunteer service hours, saving the City of Placentia, Placentia-Yorba Linda Unified School District, and Non-Profits thousands in labor costs.

The day began with a rally at El Dorado High School. Craftsman Wood Fired Pizza, Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs of Placentia joined together to serve a pancake breakfast to the volunteers. 

PLACENTIA AVENUE RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT



FACT SHEET



As part of an ongoing effort to repair public roads and improve pedestrian accessibility, the cities of Placentia and Fullerton have jointly initiated the Placentia Avenue Reconstruction Project. Both cities received Federal Arterial Pavement Management grant funds to reconstruct Placentia Avenue, a busy arterial roadway shared by both cities. This is a priority project as the current roadway conditions require it to be completely rebuilt. The project limits are Placentia Avenue between Ruby Drive and Chapman Avenue in addition to enhancing accessibility and safety.

The scope of work for this project includes the removal and replacement of the existing asphalt pavement and portions of the road base, as well as reconstructing damaged sidewalks, driveways, curbs and gutters, and ramps.

WHAT TO EXPECT DURING CONSTRUCTION

Construction is slated to begin June 1, 2017, with an estimated completion date in late August 2017. Construction will take place Monday through Friday, 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. During construction work, one lane in each direction will be open to through traffic, however, there will be extended temporary lane closures in place. Driveway access may be temporarily impacted at times for those who have only one driveway.

Please observe traffic control and advisory signs that will be updated regularly to reflect current construction activities and schedules. Detour signs will be posted, and residents and businesses can direct their questions to the construction helpline at (714) 442-0010. Additionally, updates will be posted on the cities of Placentia and Fullerton websites www.placentia.org/placentiaproject and www.cityoffullerton.com.

- Removal and replacement of aging pavement
- Improve access ramps to meet ADA requirements
- Restore damaged sidewalks, driveways, curbs and gutters

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO!

- Travel on Placentia Avenue will be limited to one-lane of traffic in each direction; motorists should expect delays.
- It is recommended that motorists use alternative routes, if possible.
- Construction is scheduled June 1 to August 31, 2017

Significant Emergency Incidents

Irvine

Remote Rescue – April 27 – At approximately 11:52 a.m., OCFA Units and Helicopter-2 (HC2) responded to a Remote Medical Aid located at 33° 48' 32.31" / 117° 45' 31.15" in Irvine Park. Helicopter 2 went enroute without delay from Fullerton. Duke-1 was dispatched for the search mission part of the call. While enroute HC2 made contact with Duke-1 on the victor frequency to de-conflict the air space. Patient was located by Duke-1 and Duke-3 was cancelled by Duke-1 who was on scene. Once the patient's location was determined, OCFA HC2 landed flat pitch by the patient location. Due to the location of the patient vs ground units, HC2 had the Rescue Medic make initial patient contact. The Rescue Medic from HC2 determined the patient to be a trauma and best transport for the patient would be to fly direct to OC Global Medical Center. Rescue Medic determined patient needed the stokes basket for transport to HC2. Patient was packaged and transported by HC2 to the Trauma Center.

Irvine

Outside Agency Assistance – April 28 – At approximately 8:21 a.m., OCFA was asked by Irvine PD to assist with the search for a reported elderly male last seen leaving Kaiser Irvine around 2000 hours the night before. The male was reported to have Alzheimer's and insulin dependent diabetes. Irvine PD had made an initial attempt to utilize Duke resources, but told they were unable to provide the aircraft. Irvine PD then contacted OCFA for use of our helicopter. OCFA offered the use of HC 2 and landed at FS47 to accommodate the Irvine PD rep on board the aircraft for the search. Battalion 5 met with Irvine PD Sergeant Jahid at FS47 to assist with search operations. Battalion 5 entered into Unified Command with Irvine PD and established Irvine Command at 16405 Sand Canyon (Alton and Sand Canyon). The scope of the search was augmented with two OCFA search dogs and consideration for the USAR Large Area search component. OCFA HC2 performed a 3-mile search radius in conjunction with a ground search by IPD motor and CERT assets. Captain Brian Roberts was assigned Search Team Manger along with Donovan George (Canine 1) and Doug Van Iwarden (Canine 2). ORCO E47 and a Care ambulance were used for the medical contingency.

The missing person was located at approximately 11:30 a.m., just before the incident was expanded, and assessed by ORCO E54. A "tip" from a cell caller helped to pinpoint the location. The elderly man was reunited with his family staged at the ICP uninjured, but tired. Irvine PD was very appreciative of the response from OCFA and all the resources offered to facilitate the search.

Newport Coast Unincorporated

Remote Rescue - April 28 - At approximately 2:56 p.m., OCFA Units and Helicopter-2 (HC2) responded to a Rescue-Remote Medical Aid Call in the unincorporated area of Laguna at the location of Nix nature Center at 18751 Laguna Canyon Rd. HC2 went enroute without delay while in the air on the way to training at Santiago Canyon. HC2 while enroute heard Duke 1 go on-station at the given location. A second airship was seen heading in the direction of the given location of the remote medical aid. OCFA HC2 was unaware of additional helicopters responding to the incident. While HC2 was approaching the location of the remote medical aid, Duke 1 advised that Duke 3 had just come on-station (the other aircraft seen previously).

B4 assumed Nix IC and asked Duke 1 to coordinate the search portion of the incident with 3 aircraft now on scene and to de-conflict the airspace. Duke 1 asked that HC2 be held south of the 73 toll road. Duke 1 and Duke 3 searched for the hiker/medical aid to the north of the 73 toll road around the area of Serrano Ridge and Sycamore Trails. Nix IC (B4) advised that HC2 could be used for search if needed. Duke 1 requested HC2 to search south of the 73 toll road. Towards the end of the search, Duke 1 left the scene to re-fuel and Duke 3 was left with the search coordination. HC2 was not asked to assist with search north of the 73 toll road but to continue to hold south of the incident location. After searching for approximately 1 hour, the subject of the search was never located by ground units or aircraft. OCFA HC2 and Duke 3 cleared the incident. HC2 went to re-fuel at FS47 and returned to Fullerton.

Newport Beach

Vegetation Fire – April 28 - At 2:36 a.m. Chief Clark and HC2 were dispatched to assist NPB with a vegetation fire at 15 Pacific Mist. The first NPB resources in the area reported a fire approx. 1 acre in size off in the distance with very difficult access in the hills. Given that report and the very strong wind condition I assisted myself to the fire. I arrived at the ICP and consulted with BC Clark and NPB B6. HC2 gave us a great 952 and GPS coordinates. We quickly determined the fire was well inside of the City of NPB, a small spot with a very slow rate of spread. I entered into Unified IC with NPB B6, ORC B5 assumed DIV A and coordinated the access, HC drops and led the ground troops, and B23 Covey directed the air operations. Metro was left as the ordering point since there was no threat to SRA and no additional requests were anticipated other than a T3 STEN requested "immediate need" through Metro Net since NPB engines had no access. HC2 knocked down the fire (11 drops), engine crews made access, constructed a line direct and are in the process of mopping up. Unified IC was disbanded and the incident was released back to NPB patrol and investigate.

Seal Beach

Structure Fire – April 29 - At 7:40 a.m., a structure response was dispatched to Electric Avenue. Engine 44 arrived on scene at 7:46 a.m. with light smoke showing from a single family residence and requested a working structure response for a working kitchen fire. The fire was reported under control at 0754 hours and the working response was cancelled.

Cause: Electrical

Remote Rescue – April 26 - At approximately 09:02 a.m., Orange Fire requested assistance with a REMOTE Rescue in Santiago Oaks Regional Park. E23 T43 B3 and HC1 were dispatched. Helicopter 1 arrived on scene in the area however DUKE1 and DUKE3 were already on scene inserting a rescuer and would not clear the airspace as directed by the Incident Commander. DUKE3 transported the patient directly to OC Global and all OCFA units were cancelled.

Villa Park

Wires Down – April 29 - At 9:53 a.m., Engine 23 was dispatched to Wires down near Center Drive. After receiving additional reports of vegetation now being involved and threatening a structure, the assignment was upgraded to a structure response. Engine 23 arrived on scene at 1005 hours with a 50 x 50 spot fire. As initial knockdown of the fire was achieved, the high winds in the area carried fire embers to neighboring vegetation located at 19221, 18201 and 18172 Charter Road. These embers started additional vegetation/tree fires as well as causing energized electrical lines to drop in one back yard. The lines down caused a power outage in the immediate area.

Laguna Beach

Remote Rescue – April 29 - At 4:08 p.m., Laguna Beach Fire requested assistance with a REMOTE Rescue at Table Rock Beach. An unconscious male was reported on cliff and ground units were unable to make access.
