Overview of OC Bridges Project Ribbon Cutting Ceremony

We are pleased to announce that the Orange County Transportation Authority, in partnership with the cities of Placentia and Anaheim, has completed the Lakeview Avenue Overcrossing Project. The City of Placentia hosted a ribbon cutting ceremony on **Monday, June 5th** which featured speeches from the Chief Executive Officer of OCTA Darrell Johnson, Mayor Craig Green, Mayor of Anaheim Tom Tait, and Mayor of Yorba Linda Peggy Huang.

Over the past few years, OCTA has been working diligently to improve traffic flow and safety on our streets by building a series of bridges-both underpasses and overpasses-to separate vehicle traffic from trains. Five of the seven bridges were constructed in Placentia and two in Fullerton. The Lakeview Avenue Overpass represents the final bridge construction in Placentia for a total investment of \$440 million in the area.

We would like to thank OCTA for their commitment in working with Placentia to improve travel time and enhance safety for our residents, businesses, and visitors. We would also like to thank the City Council and our City Staff for working with OCTA throughout the years to complete this project. This includes our Public Works Director Luis Estevez, City Engineer Masoud Sepahi and our Contract Project Manager Roy Stephenson of HR Green.

Torch Run for Special Olympics

The Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics Southern California is the largest public awareness vehicle and grassroots fundraiser with more than 3,500 Officers in Southern California championing acceptance and inclusion. The Law Enforcement Torch Run is represented in all 50 U.S. States, Canadian provinces and 46 nations with 97,000 Officers around the world, raising more than half a billion dollars since its inception in 1981. The Law Enforcement Torch Run in Southern California is one of the leading programs in the world, raising \$1.7 million in 2016 with participants representing 200 law enforcement agencies. 1,200 Officers from local, county, state, federal, and military agencies go above the normal call of duty and run in the annual Law Enforcement Torch Run Final Leg. The Officers carry the "Flame of Hope" 1,500 miles and through 200 Southern California communities. The Final Leg ends at the Summer Games Opening Ceremony, where the torch lights the cauldron to symbolize the start of the Games. Along the way, they educate the community about the gifts, talents and abilities of people with intellectual disabilities and promote unity and respect for all.

On Friday, June 2nd, at approximately 10:45 a.m., several members of the Placentia Police Department teamed up with other City employees and participated in the Torch Run through our City. The run was approximately 5 miles in distance. During the run, our team made a brief stop at some of the local schools (Tuffree Middle, George Key Elementary, and Golden Elementary). Our team took photographs with students who were standing at the front of the schools cheering and supporting the group and this great cause. Overall, this was a very successful event and our team received tremendous support from the community.



PLACENTIA AVENUE RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT



FACT SHEET



As part of an ongoing effort to repair public roads and improve pedestrian accessibility, the cities of Placentia and Fullerton have jointly initiated the Placentia Avenue Reconstruction Project. Both cities received Federal Arterial Pavement Management grant funds to reconstruct Placentia Avenue, a busy arterial roadway shared by both cities. This is a priority project as the current roadway conditions require it to be completely rebuilt. The project limits are Placentia Avenue between Ruby Drive and Chapman Avenue in addition to enhancing accessibility and safety.

The scope of work for this project includes the removal and replacement of the existing asphalt pavement and portions of the road base, as well as reconstructing damaged sidewalks, driveways, curbs and gutters, and ramps.

WHAT TO EXPECT DURING CONSTRUCTION

Construction is slated to begin June 1, 2017, with an estimated completion date in late August 2017. Construction will take place Monday through Friday, 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. During construction work, one lane in each direction will be open to through traffic, however, there will be extended temporary lane closures in place. Driveway access may be temporarily impacted at times for those who have only one driveway.

Please observe traffic control and advisory signs that will be updated regularly to reflect current construction activities and schedules. Detour signs will be posted, and residents and businesses can direct their questions to the construction helpline at (714) 442-0010. Additionally, updates will be posted on the cities of Placentia and Fullerton websites www.placentia.org/placentiaproject and www.cityoffullerton.com.

PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

- Removal and replacement of aging pavement
- Improve access ramps to meet ADA requirements
- Restore damaged sidewalks, driveways, curbs and gutters

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO!

- Travel on Placentia Avenue will be limited to one-lane of traffic in each direction; motorists should expect delays.
- It is recommended that motorists use alternative routes, if possible.
- Construction is scheduled June 1 to August 31, 2017

News & Events

The Orange County Fire Authority partnered with the American Red Cross, the City of Cypress, West County CERT, and community volunteers to install free smoke alarms for residents of Tanglewood North on Saturday, June 3. A total of 563 alarms were installed in 163 homes, and residents in almost 500 homes received information on fire safety and home escape plans. Cypress Council Member Rob Johnson, Battalion Chief Kenny Dossey, and Captain Alan Wilkes were there to support the event along with the crews from T17, T61, E63, and E17.

This week, OCFA participated with several other fire agencies at a wildland fire school being held at Camp Pendleton Marine Base. The live-fire training exercises enabled crews and supervisors the opportunity to “tune-up” before the upcoming fire season begins. Several small fires were intentionally set on prescribed burn areas of the base, enabling fire crews to exercise their skillsets with the most realistic settings available. This also presented great training opportunities for individuals to explore new techniques and practice teamwork with the same agencies they will be fighting fire with this summer. Chip Yost, KTLA Channel 5 joined crews and PIO Larry Kurtz and the [story was featured on the nightly news](#).

This month, OCFA safety messaging will focus on fireworks safety and drowning prevention. OCFA reminds everyone that only 10 Orange County cities allow the use of *Safe and Sane* fireworks. Drowning is a preventable tragedy; however, it is the leading cause of accidental injury and death in children under the age of five. Technical Rescue – June 2 - At 11:13 a.m., Engine 20 was dispatched to a fall at a construction site near Technology/Laguna Canyon Road. Engine 20 arrived on scene and reported a conscious but injured worker at the bottom of a shored trench. The assignment was augmented with Battalion 5, Heavy Rescue 6, Truck 9, Truck 34, Engine 54 (with Mule 54 & USAR lumber cache) and SAFE26. Battalion Chief Hoey B3 (USAR Duty) arrived on scene and was assigned USAR Safety. He began the permit process (208) for the rescue group. Additional units (E36 and E47) were requested to assist with ropes and clearing a spoils pile to place edge protection down. The onsite shoring needed to be extended and was done with equipment on scene and materials brought by HR6 and USAR11/USAR54. Truck 6 was utilized for a high point and engineered pads for outriggers to support the operation. Safety provided intel, air monitoring, and permit entry/exit times. Service Support 1 provided water and nutrition. The patient was extracted at 12:24 p.m. and transported to OC Global.

Remote Rescue – June 3 - At 3:12 p.m., a Remote Rescue was dispatched to a person down on a trail in Crystal Cove State Park. Passing hikers reported a male face down and not breathing.
