

Fireworks are Prohibited in Placentia

Firecrackers, bottle rockets, cherry bombs and other devices that explode, move along the ground, or travel through the air are banned throughout the State of California.

OC Board of Supervisors Approves \$3 Million in County Funding for the Placentia Veterans Village

On Tuesday, June 27, 2017 the Orange County Board of Supervisors approved \$3 million in County funding for the Placentia Veterans Village. This marks a substantial step in completing the necessary local funding match to apply for State funding. Members of the Placentia Veterans Advisory Committee spoke in support of the item, including Mr. Fred Visconti (3-War Veteran) and Mr. Ronald Culler (Vietnam Veteran and Chair of the Placentia Veterans Advisory Committee). City Administrator Damien Arrula read into the record a letter of support from Mayor Craig Green. The County Board of Supervisors unanimously approved the item which allocates this funding to develop a state-of-the art permanent supportive housing to military veterans who are homeless or disabled.

The City is partnering with the County of Orange, Mercy Housing California, and New Directions to plan, design, construct and administer the Placentia Veterans Village, a permanent supportive housing development that will serve military veterans who are homeless or disabled. The development site is a 3.65-acre unimproved site comprised of two parcels, one is owned by the Orange County Flood Control District and the adjacent parcel is owned by a private party. The Development is located adjacent to a newly constructed street located near the intersection of Orangethorpe Avenue and Lakeview Avenue; north of the Atwood Flood Control Channel.

Cont'd OC Board Of Supervisors Approves \$3 Million in County Funding for the Placentia Veterans Village

The current property is vacant and has frequently been used for illegal dumping. The new Development will improve the property significantly while addressing a need in Orange County and throughout the nation.

The proposed Development will include fifty (50) furnished apartment homes (forty-nine (49) for veterans and one (1) for one-site management unit), a courtyard, community garden, recreation room, energy efficient design and appliances, computer room, and resident services offices. Construction Update: Placentia Avenue Reconstruction Project

Since the start of the project on **June 1st**, the Placentia Avenue pavement rehabilitation and improvements continue between Chapman Avenue and E. Ruby Drive. At the end of this week, crews have completed all concrete improvements (sidewalks, curb, gutter and access ramps) and have removed existing asphalt pavement and base materials in the # 2 (outside lane) of southbound Placentia Avenue.

During the week of **June 26th**, crews will be placing new base materials and pavements in the #2 lane on southbound Placentia Avenue. After this work is completed, crews will then begin work to excavate and pave the #2 lane on the northbound Placentia Avenue. Please note, in observance of the upcoming Independence Day holiday, **No construction work is scheduled on Monday, July 3rd and Tuesday, July 4th.**

Be advised, during construction activities, traffic may be reduced to one lane in either direction. Motorists should expect travel delays and use alternative routes when possible. If you have additional questions, please call the construction helpline at (714) 422-0010

Kraemer Boulevard Resurfacing Project

Work on the Kraemer Boulevard Resurfacing Project is scheduled to begin on **July 5th**. This project is being led by the City of Brea and involves resurfacing Kraemer Boulevard between Golden Avenue and Lambert Road. In addition, the City of Brea will be resurfacing Lambert Road between its west and east City Limits. The project will be completed in two phases with concrete sidewalk and curb and gutter repairs to be completed in early November, with the portion of work to be completed within the City of Placentia city limits completed in early August.

Maintenance Division

This past week Public Works performed various maintenance activities throughout the City. The Graffiti Crew removed graffiti per work order requests citywide. The Sign Shop repaired and replaced signs per work order requests. The Patch Crew filled pot holes citywide and grinded raised sidewalks. The Paint Crew painted red curbs in zones 26 and 27. The Ball Field Maintenance Crew worked on the infields at the Champions Sport Complex, Tuffree Park and Torii Hunter Field. The Facility Maintenance Crew completed work orders for City buildings. The Irrigation Crew replaced irrigation valves on City parkways and parks. The Maintenance crews cleaned the downtown area and sidewalks on arterial streets. Tree Removal at Koch Park

Approximately 11 Sycamore Trees at Koch Park have been infected with the Polyphagous Shot Hole Borer Beetle and have died. This beetle is very small and hard to see. The beetles bore into the trunk and branches of a host tree creating a fungus inside the tree. The fungus destroys the food and water conducting systems of the tree, eventually causing stress and dieback. The larvae of the beetles deposited within the tree feed on the fungus thus perpetuating this cycle.

The City's tree maintenance contractor will remove these trees within the next several weeks. The trees will be replaced with new 24-inch box specimens to be planted shortly thereafter. 

PLACENTIA AVENUE RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT



FACT SHEET



As part of an ongoing effort to repair public roads and improve pedestrian accessibility, the cities of Placentia and Fullerton have jointly initiated the Placentia Avenue Reconstruction Project. Both cities received Federal Arterial Pavement Management grant funds to reconstruct Placentia Avenue, a busy arterial roadway shared by both cities. This is a priority project as the current roadway conditions require it to be completely rebuilt. The project limits are Placentia Avenue between Ruby Drive and Chapman Avenue in addition to enhancing accessibility and safety.

The scope of work for this project includes the removal and replacement of the existing asphalt pavement and portions of the road base, as well as reconstructing damaged sidewalks, driveways, curbs and gutters, and ramps.

WHAT TO EXPECT DURING CONSTRUCTION

Construction is slated to begin June 1, 2017, with an estimated completion date in late August 2017. Construction will take place Monday through Friday, 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. During construction work, one lane in each direction will be open to through traffic, however, there will be extended temporary lane closures in place. Driveway access may be temporarily impacted at times for those who have only one driveway.

Please observe traffic control and advisory signs that will be updated regularly to reflect current construction activities and schedules. Detour signs will be posted, and residents and businesses can direct their questions to the construction helpline at (714) 442-0010. Additionally, updates will be posted on the cities of Placentia and Fullerton websites www.placentia.org/placentiaproject and www.cityoffullerton.com.

- Improve access ramps to meet ADA requirements
- Restore damaged sidewalks, driveways, curbs and gutters

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO!

- Travel on Placentia Avenue will be limited to one-lane of traffic in each direction; motorists should expect delays.
- It is recommended that motorists use alternative routes, if possible.
- Construction is scheduled June 1 to August 31, 2017

News & Events

Last night, at approximately 5:45 p.m., a vegetation fire broke out on the Camp Pendleton Marine Base. OCFA units were called to assist and entered into unified command with Camp Pendleton Fire. As of 4 p.m. this afternoon, the [Cristianitos Fire](#) has burned 760 acres and is 70% contained. Crews will continue to work through the night to further contain the fire. There were no injuries and no structures lost.

This afternoon, OCFA crews responded to a brush fire in Laguna Niguel. As of 4 p.m. today, the [Niguel Fire](#) has burned less than 2 acres and is 100% contained. Crews are currently in the mop-up stage. No injuries were reported and no structures lost.

The Orange County Fire Authority partnered with the American Red Cross, the City of Lake Forest, and community volunteers to install free smoke alarms for residents of Kimberly Gardens Mobile Home Park on Saturday, June 24. A total of 240 alarms were installed in 63 homes, and residents in all 159 homes received information on fire safety and home escape plans.

This month, OCFA safety messaging will focus on fireworks safety and drowning prevention. OCFA reminds everyone that only 10 Orange County cities allow the use of *Safe and Sane* fireworks. Drowning is a preventable tragedy; however, it is the leading cause of accidental injury and death in children under the age of five.
