Extended Summer Pool Hours

The City of Placentia is pleased to announce that for the Summer of 2017, the City Community Pools will be open for longer hours for free recreational swim. Whitten Community Pool extended hours commenced on June 27th, with new hours from 11:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on Mondays and Wednesdays, and 11:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays. Gomez Pool extended hours will begin on Monday, July 10th, with new hours from 11:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and 11:00 a.m.-6:00 p.m. on Mondays and Wednesdays.

“Thanks to a grant from St. Jude Medical Center last year, we were able to invest in improving the pools for our youth and families in Placentia,” said Mayor Craig Green. “ New plaster and pool equipment was installed which allowed the City to showcase our pools and extend their usage. Once we received this gift it became a priority for the Council and me to extend our summer pool hours to share these great improvements with our residents. The goal of these extended pool hours is to provide a safe, fun and active environment where kids and families can enjoy some of the benefits Placentia has to offer.”

The extended pool hours demonstrate a commitment from the City to promote community wellness as it begins to formulate a 5-year strategic health initiative, known as “Get Healthy Placentia.”



PLACENTIA AVENUE RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT



FACT SHEET



As part of an ongoing effort to repair public roads and improve pedestrian accessibility, the cities of Placentia and Fullerton have jointly initiated the Placentia Avenue Reconstruction Project. Both cities received Federal Arterial Pavement Management grant funds to reconstruct Placentia Avenue, a busy arterial roadway shared by both cities. This is a priority project as the current roadway conditions require it to be completely rebuilt. The project limits are Placentia Avenue between Ruby Drive and Chapman Avenue in addition to enhancing accessibility and safety.

The scope of work for this project includes the removal and replacement of the existing asphalt pavement and portions of the road base, as well as reconstructing damaged sidewalks, driveways, curbs and gutters, and ramps.

WHAT TO EXPECT DURING CONSTRUCTION

Construction is slated to begin June 1, 2017, with an estimated completion date in late August 2017. Construction will take place Monday through Friday, 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. During construction work, one lane in each direction will be open to through traffic, however, there will be extended temporary lane closures in place. Driveway access may be temporarily impacted at times for those who have only one driveway.

Please observe traffic control and advisory signs that will be updated regularly to reflect current construction activities and schedules. Detour signs will be posted, and residents and businesses can direct their questions to the construction helpline at (714) 442-0010. Additionally, updates will be posted on the cities of Placentia and Fullerton websites www.placentia.org/placentiaproject and www.cityoffullerton.com.

PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

- Removal and replacement of aging pavement
- Improve access ramps to meet ADA requirements
- Restore damaged sidewalks, driveways, curbs and gutters

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO!

- Travel on Placentia Avenue will be limited to one-lane of traffic in each direction; motorists should expect delays.
- It is recommended that motorists use alternative routes, if possible.
- Construction is scheduled June 1 to August 31, 2017

Wildland Fire – June 29 – Units and overhead assigned overnight to the MCP fire remained for day ops. S/T 9328C demobed from the Manzanita fire in RRU and were requested to respond to the MCP Fire as 1402C for an assignment. 1401C was released in the evening and disbanded, however crews from E327 and E353 covered FS23 and FS57 behind career patrols assigned to the incident for night ops. S/T 1402C was released to RON at ORC fire stations. S/T 1402C, Santiago Crew, Dozers 1 and 2, W7, and WLAND1 will return to the incident at 0700 for morning briefing. The IMT is expected to be released at 1200 hours.

Vegetation Fire – June 29 – Multiple reports of a small vegetation fire were reported in a natural drainage in the area of Via Del Agua and Via Catalina in LGN at approximately 11:47 a.m. The fire was reported as a 20' x 20' spot running uphill. A VEG was dispatched augmented with HC2 and E345 as the closest type 3 engine. Additional units were requested for structure protection by T9 who was first onscene at 1158 hours. T9 assumed Niguel IC and gave the report of a 50' x 50' spot running uphill towards a condo complex. T9 reported evacuations in progress. B4 assumed Niguel IC and requested a Type-1 S/T for structure threat and a Type-3 S/T to stage. HC2 made water drops and were released shortly after. All units were complete at approximately 3:45 p.m.

Plane Crash – June 30 - At 9:35 a.m. the John Wayne Tower advised the ECC of an aircraft with engine trouble coming into the airport. As ECC staff were creating the Category 1 Standby response in CAD the tower advised that the aircraft had crashed just north of the airport. At this point a Plane Down off the airport response was dispatched to the area of the I-405 and Mac Arthur Bl. The tower continued to provide information to the ECC as units started en route. First arriving units found a Cessna 310 that had hit the northbound side of the freeway, skipped over the center divider wall, slid across the southbound lanes and came to rest after hitting the right shoulder barrier wall. The units identified that they had two patients from the aircraft and were still investigating if there were any other patients from the vehicles on the freeway that had also been involved in the incident. Additional paramedic units, ground and air ambulances were requested to start toward the scene. After a full investigation of the scene it was determined that the only injuries were to the pilot and passenger of the aircraft and the additional units were cancelled. Both patients were transported to Orange County Global Medical Center for the treatment of their injuries.

Vehicle Fire – July 2 - At 10:28 p.m. a Vehicle Fire Threatening a Structure response was dispatched to the car port area on Fairfield Lane. First arriving units found five vehicles on fire in under a car port and asked for the balance of the Working Structure Fire response. The fire was quickly contained to the vehicles involved and declared knocked down at 10:43 p.m. As the incident was winding down one of the residence that was affected by the fire began to have a medical emergency and an ambulance was requested. Paramedics evaluated/treated the patient at scene and then and it was determined that no transport would be needed and the ambulance was cancelled.

Vegetation Fire – July 3 - A VEGM was dispatched to the RC Airport on Trabuco Creek Rd. at 12:45 p.m. based off several reports of a small brush fire. An RC aircraft collided with a power pole before falling to the ground catching surrounding brush on fire. Units quickly responded, B7 assumed Trabuco IC at 12:56 p.m. Notifications to Cal Fire and CNF were made. CNF dispatched a full response in addition to the ORC response. Forward progress of the fire was stopped at 1:17 p.m. and HC1 was released. All units were complete at 2:54 p.m.

Gypsum Canyon

Vegetation Fire – July 3 - At 6:08 p.m. a VEG was dispatched for multiple reports of fire on both sides of EB91 at Gypsum Canyon in the ANA-MTZ. Fixed wing aircraft was ordered and all notifications to area coordinators. ANA B1 arrived onscene at 6:15 p.m. and assumed Gypsum IC. RRU and Cal Fire dispatched full vegetation fire responses. ANAB1 unified with ORC B2 and requested 1 additional type3 strike team. Forward progress of the fire was stopped at 1858 ours and all fixed wing were released and multiple units including the ORC strike team were released shortly after. HC2 made a few water drops before they were released. ANAB1 dissolved command at 9:36 p.m.

Brea/Unincorporated

Vegetation Fire – July 3 - A VEGM was dispatched for multiple reports of a vegetation fire at Tonner Canyon and Brea Blvd. at 9:06 p.m. Notifications were made to Cal Fire for the threat to SRA. Fixed wing aircraft was unavailable for this incident. All units responding reported they were not able to use the VHF command frequency for the incident. An alternative VHF frequency was tried to no avail. For the safety of personnel onscene and overhead the decision to move the incident to 800 MHz was made. An 800 MHz com package was delivered and units assigned were able to communicate without any further disruption. HC2 was first onscene reporting ½ acre involved burning at the bottom of a slope in light to moderate fuels and requested the assignment continue. B2 assumed Canyon IC and requested a type 3 strike team. Forward progress of the fire was stopped at the fuel modification at 9:40 p.m. HC2 was released at 9:48 p.m.

Vegetation Fire – July 4 - ORC started a VEGM response based off reports of fire alongside of the SB 57 at Imperial Hwy. LAC also started a full response as this was the MTZ. LAC made the SOLAR announcement, assuming the central ordering point. First oncoming ORC units were asked to standby per LAC, all other incoming units were cancelled. ALL ORC resources were released at 2:21 p.m.

Vegetation Fire – July 4 - A VEGM was dispatched based off a local report of a 50' x 50' spot near 7 Windy Ridge, at 11:34 p.m. P18 was first onscene at 11:27 p.m. reporting a ½ acre fire in medium fuel with a moderate rate of spread. B7 assumed Rose IC at 11:30 p.m.. Cal Fire and CNF were notified of fire in the forest/SRA. Forward progress of the fire stopped at 11:37 p.m. Santiago Crew was requested to continue.

Structure Fire – July 4 - A STR response was started for a shed fire threatening a structure located on Ervin Ln. at 11:33 p.m. Numerous additional reports were taken and E8 advised while enroute. Based off multiple reports E8 requested a WSTR assignment. E72 arrived onscene at 11:40 p.m. assuming Ervin IC, minutes later IC cancelled the WSTR balance, continuing an investigator. The fire was called under control at 11:44 p.m.

San Clemente

Vegetation Fire – July 5 - At 1:34 p.m. a Vegetation Fire response was dispatched to the area off the east end of Avenida Pico. First arriving units found a working vegetation fire in annual grass and brush. Aircraft from the OCFA and Cal Fire arrived over the area and began to work the head of the fire. This work was hampered somewhat by the high tension power lines that traverse the area. Ground units were also able to get to the head of the fire and make quick work of knocking the fire down at 3 p.m.

Rancho Santa Margarita

Vegetation Fire – July 5 - At 3:24 p.m. a Vegetation Fire response was dispatched to the area of Santa Margarita Pkwy and Hwy 241. First arriving units found a ¼ acre fire burning next to the freeway. Air Attack 310, from the La Pata Fire, flew to area to see what type of potential/threat the fire had.
