Placentia Business Bodhi Leaf Coffee Featured on the TV show "The Profit"

Marcus Lemonis, billionaire businessman and star of the TV reality show "The Profit," featured Placentia's café chain Bodhi Leaf Coffee Traders on **Tuesday, July 11th**. In the show, Marcus Lemonis shared his business expertise to Steve Sims, owner of Bodhi Leaf Coffee Traders. Bodhi Leaf was founded by Steve Sims in 2009 and now has four locations, which includes Placentia, Orange, Anaheim Hills, and Santa Clarita.

Steve Sims, a real estate investor, has been successful with his farm-direct coffee roasting, distribution and retail cafes but wanted to seek more growth, investment, and expansion. "I went to Marcus because I wanted to scale my business, not because I was struggling," said Steve Sims. In most episodes, Marcus Lemonis makes cash investment in exchange for a piece of the company and a percentage of the profits. He has invested more than \$40 million in companies featured on the reality show, including Farrell's Ice Cream Parlour and Amazing Grapes wine bar in Rancho Santa Margarita.

Hotel Development Opportunity at 350/380 S. Placentia Avenue

The City has issued a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) in connection with a Hotel Development Opportunity to develop approximately 1.8-acres ("Sites") of City-owned property located at 350 and 380 S. Placentia Avenue. The Site features good visibility from the 57 Freeway and is within close proximity to a future Metrolink station in the City. Additionally, the Site is situated near a large retail center anchored by a Home Depot and a Sam's Club and is just a half-mile away from a California State University-Fullerton. The City of Placentia is currently in the process of rezoning the parcels to C-2 (Community Commercial, with a 65 foot height overlay), which is anticipated to be completed by September/October 2017 and would allow for hotel and retail uses.

Kosmont Companies is an advisor to the City of Placentia and will administer the RFQ process in collaboration with City Staff.

The deadline for submittals is 5:00 p.m., **Wednesday, August 9th**.

Bark Walk



Nutritional Seminar at the Whitten Center

Second Harvest Food Bank has partnered with “America On Track” to provide Kids Café summer sites with fun and engaging activities for the kids that attend the Community Centers. On **Monday, July 10**, a special guest discussed the importance of eating healthy with participants. Kris Rankin taught the 30 students what is the appropriate serving size of fruits and vegetables that everyone should eat according to their age and activity level. The participants also learned the difference between a fruit and vegetable and about the different types of food that fall under each category. They learned about the importance of fiber and how it aids in the digestion process. Additionally, they were shown what 5 pounds of fat looks like versus 5 pounds of muscle. Many of the participants were shocked at the differences between the two and how they can affect the body. To conclude the seminar, they were reminded that it is very important to exercise and eat healthy foods to help prevent diseases like diabetes and were given dried mangos as a healthy snack.



PLACENTIA AVENUE RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT



FACT SHEET



As part of an ongoing effort to repair public roads and improve pedestrian accessibility, the cities of Placentia and Fullerton have jointly initiated the Placentia Avenue Reconstruction Project. Both cities received Federal Arterial Pavement Management grant funds to reconstruct Placentia Avenue, a busy arterial roadway shared by both cities. This is a priority project as the current roadway conditions require it to be completely rebuilt. The project limits are Placentia Avenue between Ruby Drive and Chapman Avenue in addition to enhancing accessibility and safety.

The scope of work for this project includes the removal and replacement of the existing asphalt pavement and portions of the road base, as well as reconstructing damaged sidewalks, driveways, curbs and gutters, and ramps.

WHAT TO EXPECT DURING CONSTRUCTION

Construction is slated to begin June 1, 2017, with an estimated completion date in late August 2017. Construction will take place Monday through Friday, 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. During construction work, one lane in each direction will be open to through traffic, however, there will be extended temporary lane closures in place. Driveway access may be temporarily impacted at times for those who have only one driveway.

Please observe traffic control and advisory signs that will be updated regularly to reflect current construction activities and schedules. Detour signs will be posted, and residents and businesses can direct their questions to the construction helpline at (714) 442-0010. Additionally, updates will be posted on the cities of Placentia and Fullerton websites www.placentia.org/placentiaproject and www.cityoffullerton.com.

- Removal and replacement of aging pavement
- Improve access ramps to meet ADA requirements
- Restore damaged sidewalks, driveways, curbs and gutters

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO!

- Travel on Placentia Avenue will be limited to one-lane of traffic in each direction; motorists should expect delays.
- It is recommended that motorists use alternative routes, if possible.
- Construction is scheduled June 1 to August 31, 2017

News & Events

The graduation ceremonies for OCFA Academy 44 were held at our Regional Fire Operations and Training Center on June 28. The event was well attended and the 24 graduates demonstrated their skills by way of live structure fire demos, building repelling and auto extrications. The Orange County Fire Authority partnered with the American Red Cross, the City of San Juan Capistrano, San Juan Capistrano CERT, and community volunteers to install free smoke alarms for residents of the Capistrano Valley Mobile Estates on Saturday, July 8. A total of 236 alarms were installed in 88 homes, and residents in all 230 homes received information on fire safety and home escape plans.

This month, OCFA safety messaging will focus on [kids and pets in cars](#) and drowning prevention. On a warm day, the temperature inside a parked car can reach as high as 140 degrees in as little as two hours. On average, 37 children and hundreds of pets die of heatstroke each year after being left alone in cars. Drowning is a preventable tragedy; however, it is the leading cause of accidental injury and death in children under the age of five. No one should ever swim alone. The ABC's of water safety stand for *A – Active Supervision*, *B – Barriers* around pools, and *C – Classes*, CPR and swim. The focus this month is [barriers](#).
