Citrus Pest and Disease Prevention Program

Recently, the California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) and the United States Department of Agriculture discovered Huanglongbing, also known as HLB or citrus greening disease, in La Habra and Anaheim. HLB kills citrus trees and has no cure. The disease is not harmful to humans or animals. The disease is spread by a pest called the Asian Citrus Psyllid (ACP). ACP is a small insect that feeds on citrus tree leaves, which causes a bacteria called Huanglongbing to spread. If a tree is infected, it can die in as little as five years.

At the October 17, 2017 City Council Meeting, Jeff Croy of the Orange County Agricultural Commission and Paul Worlie of the Citrus Pest and Disease Prevention Program provided a presentation regarding the citrus pest, HLB. 

News & Events

As of October 16, the Canyon 2 Fire was 100% contained. The fire started on October 9 near the 91 Freeway and Cole Canyon in the City of Anaheim. OCFA was in unified command with CAL Fire, Anaheim Fire and Rescue, and Orange City Fire. The fire burned 9,217 acres, damaged 55 structures and destroyed 25 structures.
