Placentia Girl Scout Sharleen Loh Named 2017 National Young Women of Distinction by Girl Scout of the USA

Girl Scouts of Orange County recently announced that Placentia Girl Scout Sharleen Loh from Troop 330 was named by Girl Scouts of the USA (GSUSA) a 2017 National Young Woman of Distinction, the national organization's most prestigious honor. Sharleen organized a series of youth STEM events that she later turned into "STEMup4Youth," an initiative that now holds five programs a week to provide fun, hands-on exposure to science, technology, engineering and math. Sharleen, who secured \$60,000 in grants to fund the programs, has mobilized more than 140 volunteers and compiled more than 100 STEM activities. Sharleen and her volunteers host STEM programs at Boys and Girls Clubs, libraries, expos, showcases, festivals, schools, and children's learning centers across Orange County. These hands-on STEM activities that have benefited over 5,000 children across Southern California.

Nationally, approximately 5 percent of all eligible Girl Scouts earn their Girl Scout Gold Award each year—and just 10 girls in this already high-achieving group are selected to receive the National Young Woman of Distinction honor. Applications are judged by previous National Young Women of Distinction, leaders from a range of fields, GSUSA executives, and a representative from the Kappa Delta Foundation, which provides the honorees with college scholarships.

Sharleen was honored by Girl Scouts of the USA, along with nine other National Young Women of Distinction at the G.I.R.L. 2017 event, the largest girl-led event in the world, held on October 6–8 in Columbus, Ohio.

Sharleen was also recognized locally by Girl Scouts of Orange County and gave remarks during the September 23rd grand opening of Girl Scouts of Orange County's Argyros Girl Scout Leadership Center, a brand new hub for Girl Scout STEM programs in Newport Beach.

The Placentia City Council will be recognizing Sharleen Loh and her accomplishments at the November 7, 2017 Council Meeting at 7:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers.







Citrus Pest and Disease Prevention Program

Recently, the California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) and the United States Department of Agriculture discovered Huanglongbing, also known as HLB or citrus greening disease, in La Habra and Anaheim. HLB kills citrus trees and has no cure. The disease is not harmful to humans or animals. The disease is spread by a pest called the Asian Citrus Psyllid (ACP). ACP is a small insect that feeds on citrus tree leaves, which causes a bacteria called Huanglongbing to spread. If a tree is infected, it can die in as little as five years. 

Completion of the Placentia Avenue Reconstruction Project

The cities of Placentia and Fullerton have successfully completed the Placentia Avenue Reconstruction Project. As part of an ongoing effort to repair public roads and improve pedestrian accessibility, the cities of Placentia and Fullerton jointly initiated the Placentia Avenue Reconstruction Project. Both cities received Federal Arterial Pavement Management grant funds to reconstruct Placentia Avenue, a busy arterial roadway shared by both cities. The project limits were Placentia Avenue between Ruby Drive and Chapman Avenue. Construction started on June 1, 2017 and was completed in August. The scope of work for this project included the removal and replacement of the existing asphalt pavement and portions of the road base, as well as reconstruction of damaged sidewalks, driveways, curbs and gutters, and ramps. The City appreciated the patience exercised by local businesses and residents during the construction period. 

It's time to fall back! When you turn your clocks back an hour this Sunday for Daylight Saving Time, it is also a great time to [change your smoke alarm batteries](#). We recommend changing the batteries in your smoke alarms every six months; changing them when the time changes for Daylight Saving Time makes it easy to remember. Working [smoke alarms](#) can alert people to a fire before it spreads, giving everyone enough time to get out. Your smoke alarm can only save you if it's working! If you have the new 10-year lithium battery alarms, you still need to test them once a month. Press to test!

Holiday Cooking Safety is the highlighted safety message for this month. Unattended cooking is the leading factor in home cooking fires and on average there are an estimated 164,500 home cooking fires in the United States each year. Community Risk Reduction

- OCFA Crews and Equipment completed SCE and OC Parks emergency access roads in O'Neill Park, as part of our on-going collaborative efforts to ensure access by ground units for All-Hazards access.
- Next week, Crews & Equipment will be moving to the 133 corridor under the same process. This will include SCE roads in both OC Parks and Irvine Open Space areas. Coordinating meetings have already occurred with all stakeholders.
- AFM Nick Pivaroff returned from an ICS Overhead assignment as a Damage Inspection Specialist (DINS) in the Napa Fire area. Nick is part of the CAL FIRE team that is developing the Damage Inspection program that was used on the recent Canyon and Canyon2 Fires. The goal of this process is to utilize the already established Annual Defensible Space Inspection process as the foundation, post-fire, to determine methodologies to assess building construction standards and D-Space requirements to better protect the public in the future.
- Last week, Pre-Fire Management BC, Brian Norton, attended the CAL FIRE Association of Contract Counties Meeting in Marin.
- Fire Prevention Specialist, Kim Brown, who has a lead role in the development of CALFIRE's CALMAPPER Version 3, is in Sacramento on Nov. 1st-2nd to take part in focus groups. CAL MAPPER is a tracking database that CAL FIRE uses to record fuel reduction efforts within the units. It records funding information (source, amount, grant ID's, etc.), treatment activity information (start/end dates, executing agency, costs, etc.), along with spatial representations of the treatments.
- On Nov. 2nd, Sr. Fire Prevention Specialist, Shawn Fraley, and Wildland Resource Planner, Dave Erickson, walked the interior slopes with the City of Irvine's Urban Forester, Casey Gnadt, so that he can gain a better understanding of Fuel Modification and Defensible Space requirements.
