
2017 Citizen and Business of the Year Award Celebration

Child Seat Laws

The Placentia Police Department's Traffic Bureau is frequently asked about child seat laws. Over the last few years, the law has changed in relation to the age, height and/or weight of children required to be in a child or booster seat. Here is the most updated information:

Children under the age of 8 (or 4'9" tall) must be secured in the appropriate child seat or booster seat in the rear seat of a vehicle.

Children under 2 years old SHALL ride in a rear facing child seat until they weigh 40 pounds or more OR are at least 40 inches tall.

Children can move to a forward facing seat once they have outgrown the legal limit.

A child is ready for a booster seat when they have outgrown the weight or height limit of their forward facing harnessed child seat. This usually occurs around 65 pounds.

Once children have reached 8 years old OR have reached 4' 9" tall they may move from the booster seat to a regular seat belt.


