Stamp Out Hunger With Letter Carrier's Food Drive

On **Saturday, May 12th**, the National Association of Letter Carriers (NALC), including letter carriers in Placentia, will conduct their 26th Annual "Stamp Out Hunger" Food Drive.

Every year on the second Saturday in May, letter carriers in more than 10,000 cities and towns across America collect the goodness and compassion of their postal customers, who participate in the NALC Stamp Out Hunger National Food Drive — the largest one-day food drive in the nation.

Led by letter carriers represented by the National Association of Letter Carriers (AFL-CIO), with help from rural letter carriers, other postal employees and other volunteers, the drive has delivered more than one billion pounds of food over the past 24 years.

Carriers collect non-perishable food donations left by mailboxes and in post offices and deliver them to local community food banks, pantries and shelters. Nearly 1,500 NALC branches in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam and the Virgin Islands are involved.

To donate, just place a box or can of non-perishable food next to your mailbox before your letter carrier delivers mail on the second Saturday in May. The food is sorted, and delivered to an area food bank or pantry, where it is available for needy families.



Download the New Mobile App


The City would like to remind residents about its new mobile app, iPlacentia. This new mobile app is a part of an ongoing effort to improve communication and make city government more accessible to its residents. The iPlacentia mobile app is a smartphone application that allows users to instantly submit service requests for issues such as potholes, graffiti, and street light outages with just the touch of a button. The report is then automatically sent to the respective department for review. The iPlacentia app also features direct access to recent city news, upcoming events and meetings, permit applications and job openings.

iPlacentia uses GPS technology to automatically provide the problem's exact location, simplifying the reporting process for users while increasing the reliability of report location for city crews. The user submitting the service request is instantly notified when the City receives it and also when it has been resolved. iPlacentia also allows residents to track the status of their request, register for recreational classes and activities, renew a business license, contact City Council or Staff directly, and more!

PUBLIC WORKS

City Landscape Irrigation

City Hall has received questions and concerns from a number of residents in the community asking why the grass in the City's parks is looking so dry right now. Earlier this year, three years-worth of water rate increases from Golden State Water Company were unexpectedly implemented which negatively impacted the City's irrigation budget. As a result, the City had to reduce its irrigation consumption by reducing watering days to twice per week and five minutes per irrigation station. This change was implemented this past winter with the idea that the rainy season would help keep the grass green during the winter and spring. Unfortunately, this year's below average rainfall was not sufficient resulting in dry turf conditions in our parks. This past week, staff increased the number of watering days to three times per week and doubled the run time to 10 minutes per station. It will take a few weeks for the turf to turn green again and staff is monitoring these conditions closely. We apologize for how the parks look right now. The City was focused on controlling water costs however we are in a position now to balance those costs against ensuring the turf in our parks remain healthy and enjoyed by the community.

Statewide mandated water conservation regulations still preclude the City however from watering the turf grass in the City's landscaped medians. As part of an ongoing program, a number of medians throughout the City have been renovated in the past two years by removing the dead turf and replacing it with low water usage plant materials and drip irrigations. These improvements have helped to reduce water consumption, save money and enhance the aesthetics of our streetscapes.



Significant Emergency Incidents

Yorba Linda

April 27: At 2056 hours, ECC received several reports of vegetation/trees on fire near 20271 Avenida Del Norte, YBL. Units arrived on scene and reported a 100 x 200 grove of trees on fire. The assignment was augmented with 5 additional engines, 2 water tenders, the Santiago Crew and Copter 2. Copter 2 assisted with an Ariel view but did not make any water drops since the forward rate of spread had stopped. Laguna Coast

April 28: A REMOTE was dispatched at 1051 hours for a person down on Big Bend Trail in Laguna Coast Wilderness Park. At 1056 hours the call was updated for a patient that was hit by a bicyclist, was conscious and breathing with a laceration to their head. Both OCSD and Park Rangers were notified. P11 made patient contact at 1128 hours reporting patient was a 70-year-old male needing an ALS assessment, was conscious but reported he was unconscious for about 30 seconds after the incident. At 1136 hours Copter 2 performed a heli-step to get the medic on scene. At 1139 P11 reported a flat pitch load with Copter 2. At 1149 hours P11 assisted LABU1 loading patient for transport to Copter 2. At 1152 hours the patient was loaded onto Copter 2 and transported to Mission Hospital Regional Medical Center. Duke copter cleared the scene at 1152 hours. Copter 2 arrived at hospital with patient at 1157 hours. At 1229 ECC was notified by Duty Officer Kovacs to respond the Sheriff to the hospital for a report as the patient reported this was a hit and run type of incident.

Tustin

Marine Corps Pendleton

At 1237 hours ECC dispatched B6, B36, Copter 2, E345, E350 per request from MCP for a report of a 5-acre vegetation fire in the Cristianitos-San Mateo Rd area. D10 Norton confirmed this was a legit SRA threat fire. This was also in the PROS area. At 1322 B6 reported this as 10 acres in light flashy fuels with moderate rate of spread. B36 Levesque was utilized as an Agency REP as MCP also had a second fire. There were comm. issues due to MCP using the new frequency loads ahead of scheduled time and the Command frequency they assigned (XSD Command 11) is a new frequency not yet implemented in our radios. OCFA units utilized FOC. There was also an issue with Air to Ground as Copter 2 had to program the RX and TX frequencies. At 1341 hours B6 reported that fixed wing aircraft had been cancelled. At 1354 hours Cleveland had assumed central ordering and requested our Santiago Crew. All units were released by 1740 hours.



Community Risk Reduction

- On May 1, 2018, the Santiago Crew responded to a vegetation fire on Camp Pendleton.
- This week, OCFA's Heavy Equipment Section conducted the first week of a 2-week Heavy Equipment Workshop at Camp Pendleton, which is attended by numerous disciplines and agencies from across the state, who come together to train on dozer/heavy equipment operations. As part of the training, they will cut fuel breaks between Camp Pendleton and Orange and Riverside Counties.
- This week, AFM Nick Pivaroff, Wildland Resource Planner Dave Erickson, Sr. Fire Prevention Specialist Shawn Fraley and Fire Prevention Specialists Kim Brown and Teri Merritt, completed the Land Navigation Training Class and passed the test administered on Wednesday, May 2, 2018.
