

### “Pump Up” Placentia!

The City of Placentia is working in partnership with Galaxy Oil Company to operate the Placentia Gas Station, also known as “Best 4 Less 76” gasoline station at 480 S. Placentia Avenue (northeast corner of Placentia and Crowther Avenue).

Through a partnership with Galaxy Oil, a portion of the revenue generated by the gas station will go directly back to the City for critical services including Police, Fire and Public Works projects. This will greatly assist the City with infrastructure maintenance such as roads and facility improvements. The City encourages all of its residents and visitors to fuel their vehicles at the 76 Gasoline Station and “Pump Up Placentia” by putting money directly back into your local services.

### Community Outreach Update on our Fiscal Sustainability

The City will be continuing to update you on the status of our efforts to achieve long-term fiscal sustainability for our City while protecting the quality of life services our residents and those doing business in the City expect and deserve.

Thank you to the hundreds of residents who have participated to date through these meetings and through our online survey. We were gratified to hear that the community values the work that we do and the services our City provides. Moving forward, we are eager to continue our public outreach on service priorities as the City continues to go through its 2018-2019 budget process.

As our community is aware, depleted local revenues, historical State takeaways, and reduced City funds due to an increase in online purchases have left Placentia with a \$6.1 million structural deficit. Because of this, certain basic City services and maintenance continue to be deferred. Over \$3.2 million a year for the past 7 years in street and road maintenance have been deferred.

In response to community feedback prioritizing public safety, Placentia currently maintains a proactive Police presence in our neighborhoods, parks and schools, with anti-drug and anti-gang police officers, youth violence prevention and gang-related graffiti programs to help keep our kids off the streets and out of trouble. With our current structural deficit, these services may be reduced in the years to come, impacting our quality of life and our property values.

The City will continue to engage our residents about our fiscal challenges and solicit input on your service priorities and recommendations for creating new revenues and/or reducing costs. 

### Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf is Coming to Placentia!

A new Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf is currently under construction at 1188 E. Yorba Linda Blvd. This Coffee Bean & Tea Leaf is replacing the old Burger King site and is a welcome addition to the City of Placentia. A grand opening celebration has not yet been scheduled, but the anticipated opening date for this location is **Monday, June 4<sup>th</sup>**. Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf provides a menu with an assortment of coffee, espresso, ice blended drinks, tea, and seasonal drinks. A variety of packaged coffee beans, whole leaf tea bags, and baked goods will be offered as well.



In 1963, Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf first opened their first location here in Southern California, where founder Herb Hyman began importing and roasting coffee. As of 2017, the chain has over 1,000 self-owned and franchised stores in the United States and 31 other countries. The City of Placentia is excited to be home to the newest Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf location!



## PUBLIC WORKS

### City Landscape Irrigation

City Hall has received questions and concerns from a number of residents in the community asking why the grass in the City's parks is looking so dry right now. Earlier this year, three years-worth of water rate increases from Golden State Water Company were unexpectedly implemented which negatively impacted the City's irrigation budget. As a result, the City had to reduce its irrigation consumption by reducing watering days to twice per week and five minutes per irrigation station. This change was implemented this past winter with the idea that the rainy season would help keep the grass green during the winter and spring. Unfortunately, this year's below average rainfall was not sufficient resulting in dry turf conditions in our parks. This past week, staff increased the number of watering days to three times per week and doubled the run time to 10 minutes per station. It will take a few weeks for the turf to turn green again and staff is monitoring these conditions closely. We apologize for how the parks look right now. The City was focused on controlling water costs however we are in a position now to balance those costs against ensuring the turf in our parks remain healthy and enjoyed by the community.

Statewide mandated water conservation regulations still preclude the City however from watering the turf grass in the City's landscaped medians. As part of an ongoing program, a number of medians throughout the City have been renovated in the past two years by removing the dead turf and replacing it with low water usage plant materials and drip irrigations. These improvements have helped to reduce water consumption, save money and enhance the aesthetics of our streetscapes.


### Upcoming Residential Street Maintenance Project

On **Tuesday, May 15<sup>th</sup>**, the City Council awarded a construction contract to Petrochem Materials Innovation (PMI) to slurry seal more than 400,000 square feet of residential streets in the northern portion of the City. This project is wholly funded by SB 1, the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017. This law, signed by Governor Brown, increased the Statewide excise fuel tax for the purpose of creating a new revenue stream from which to provide local governments additional funds to repair and maintain roads and improve transportation systems. The City of Placentia has received these funds during this current fiscal year and beginning next fiscal year we estimate the City will receive approximately \$900,000 per year for the next nine years.



The City's project noted above is focused on preventative maintenance and ensuring that the City's roads that are currently in good condition remain that way by sealing the pavement surface. The project will entail the placement of a rubberized slurry seal across the entire width of each street noted in the map below. Slurry seal is a combination of oil and sand and is used as part of a preventative maintenance program to seal roadway surfaces and extend the useful life of our roads. The slurry seal application will also seal pavement cracks to prevent water intrusion into the road base which can undermine the roadway and lead to much more expensive repairs in the future. Given the limited road maintenance resources in this current fiscal year, the City is only able to focus on preventative maintenance work and not more costly rehabilitation or reconstruction work on our most heavily damaged roadways.

The additional Gas Tax revenues will be an important source of funding for road maintenance and rehabilitation work for the City of Placentia in the coming years. It is estimated that the increase in the Statewide Gas Tax will bring more than \$9 million to Placentia over the course of the program which will help to address the City's existing street maintenance backlog.

Placentia Linda Hospital hosted an appreciation lunch for local first responders on **Tuesday, May 22<sup>nd</sup>**. Members of the Placentia Police Department joined several EMS agencies in attending this event. Also present were Placentia Council Members Ward Smith and Craig Green.

Police Officer Jeff Irvine was honored as being a valued partner with Placentia Linda Hospital Emergency Department staff. He was recognized for his helpfulness and friendly attitude towards staff and for his professional assistance he has given them on several calls for service.

Chief Lenyi was also honored for his initiative in the Department's partnership with Placentia Linda Hospital to raise breast cancer awareness and support cancer research. The Placentia Police Department's "Pink Patch Project" raised \$4,000 for the Susan G. Komen Foundation.
