Community Outreach Update on our Fiscal Sustainability

The City will be continuing to update you on the status of our efforts to achieve long-term fiscal sustainability for our City while protecting the quality of life services our residents and those doing business in the City expect and deserve.

Thank you to the hundreds of residents who have participated to date through these meetings and through our online survey. We were gratified to hear that the community values the work that we do and the services our City provides. Moving forward, we are eager to continue our public outreach on service priorities as the City continues to go through its 2018-2019 budget process.

As our community is aware, depleted local revenues, historical State takeaways, and reduced City funds due to an increase in online purchases have left Placentia with a \$6.1 million structural deficit. Because of this, certain basic City services and maintenance continue to be deferred. Over \$3.2 million a year for the past 7 years in street and road maintenance have been deferred.

In response to community feedback prioritizing public safety, Placentia currently maintains a proactive Police presence in our neighborhoods, parks and schools, with anti-drug and anti-gang police officers, youth violence prevention and gang-related graffiti programs to help keep our kids off the streets and out of trouble. With our current structural deficit, these services may be reduced in the years to come, impacting our quality of life and our property values.

The City will continue to engage our residents about our fiscal challenges and solicit input on your service priorities and recommendations for creating new revenues and/or reducing costs. Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf is Coming to Placentia!

A new Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf is currently under construction at 1188 E. Yorba Linda Blvd. This Coffee Bean & Tea Leaf is replacing the old Burger King site and is a welcome addition to the City of Placentia. A grand opening celebration has not yet been scheduled, but the anticipated opening date for this location is **Monday, June 11th**. Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf provides a menu with an assortment of coffee, espresso, ice blended drinks, tea, and seasonal drinks. A variety of packaged coffee beans, whole leaf tea bags, and baked goods will be offered as well.



In 1963, Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf first opened their first location here in Southern California, where founder Herb Hyman began importing and roasting coffee. As of 2017, the chain has over 1,000 self-owned and franchised stores in the United States and 31 other countries. The City of Placentia is excited to be home to the newest Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf location!



PUBLIC WORKS

City Landscape Irrigation

City Hall has received questions and concerns from a number of residents in the community asking why the grass in the City's parks is looking so dry right now. Earlier this year, three years-worth of water rate increases from Golden State Water Company were unexpectedly implemented which negatively impacted the City's irrigation budget. As a result, the City had to reduce its irrigation consumption by reducing watering days to twice per week and five minutes per irrigation station. This change was implemented this past winter with the idea that the rainy season would help keep the grass green during the winter and spring. Unfortunately, this year's below average rainfall was not sufficient resulting in dry turf conditions in our parks. This past week, staff increased the number of watering days to three times per week and doubled the run time to 10 minutes per station. It will take a few weeks for the turf to turn green again and staff is monitoring these conditions closely. We apologize for how the parks look right now. The City was focused on controlling water costs however we are in a position now to balance those costs against ensuring the turf in our parks remain healthy and enjoyed by the community.

Statewide mandated water conservation regulations still preclude the City however from watering the turf grass in the City's landscaped medians. As part of an ongoing program, a number of medians throughout the City have been renovated in the past two years by removing the dead turf and replacing it with low water usage plant materials and drip irrigations. These improvements have helped to reduce water consumption, save money and enhance the aesthetics of our streetscapes.

Federal Pipeline Safety Notice from SoCalGas

This notice provides all of the latest and greatest safety measures taken by SoCalGas to keep our community safe. SoCalGas compiled the most common questions and answers about natural gas pipeline safety information. Get more pipeline safety information at socalgas.com/safety.



How can I make my city safer and prevent pipeline incidents?

Public officials are encouraged to work with contractors to have buried utility-owned lines marked before excavation by obtaining a valid [811 ticket*](#). Contractors must do so by law. Homeowners should call, too. This is a FREE service and it can help prevent injury, costly property damage and loss of utility service.

How should I coordinate city planning and development projects with SoCalGas®?

Contact us and we can guide you through safe building around our major natural gas pipelines. We encourage you to review the information provided by Pipelines and Informed Planning Alliance (PIPA) because the decisions you make can impact the safety of the community surrounding the pipeline. If there is a major natural gas leak, how do I get emergency crews there as fast as possible?

What should I do when there is a natural gas leak?

If a natural gas leak is suspected, don't smoke or light a match, candle or other flame. Don't turn electrical appliances or lights on or off, operate machinery or do anything to create a spark. Be aware that natural gas leaking from a plastic pipe can create static electricity which can ignite the natural gas. Immediately leave the area and, from a safe location, call us directly at (800) 427-2200 or call 911. [Click here](#) to learn more.

How do I know where natural gas pipelines are located?

The approximate locations of major natural gas pipelines can be found online at [National Pipeline Mapping System](#) or on socalgas.com. We also place yellow pipeline markers next to major pipelines near intersections or railway crossings to identify approximate locations of our lines and provide an emergency phone number. Based on population and pipeline locations, do I have High Consequence Areas in my city or county?

Can I rely on my sense of smell alone to be alerted to a potential natural gas leak?

Most of the time. However, there may be circumstances where you may not be able to smell the gas odorant, such as if you have a diminished sense of smell, the odorant is being masked by other odors or the odorant has been lost or reduced because of odor fade. Why does SoCalGas prune or clear trees in my city?

We must have unobstructed access along our pipeline right-of-way to maintain and operate our facilities and to quickly respond to any pipeline emergency. Furthermore, tree roots can damage pipelines.

Placentia Police Department Honors Officer Daniel Rodriguez

The 28th Annual Orange County ATAC Vehicle Theft Recovery Officer of the Year Awards took place on **Wednesday, May 23rd**, at the Garden Grove Community Meeting Center. The Auto Theft Advisory Committee (ATAC) is a partnership between law enforcement, insurance and auto related companies to reduce auto theft.

The criteria qualifying an officer for this award from their respective agency consists of the following points:

- The sworn peace officer must have been a regular “road” patrol officer when he or she earned the statistics qualifying that person for the award. This means that officers assigned to vehicle theft investigative positions, or task force assignments, are ineligible, because they would have had an unfair advantage.
- Awards are usually presented to one individual, unless the agency has nominated a two-officer team, who will then share the award.
- ATAC carefully reviews the nomination submissions forwarded by each law enforcement agency and places a higher emphasis on rolling vehicle recoveries, arrests, and significant case highlights, as submitted by the nominating agencies."

Placentia Police Officer Daniel Rodriguez was recognized as Placentia’s top performer in auto theft for 2017. Last year he recovered ten (10) vehicles, with two of them being occupied stolen vehicles. We congratulate Officer Rodriguez on his outstanding work.
