As you may know, a few years ago we embarked on a mission to revitalize Placentia and grow the City in a positive way. Everything from economic development, to grants, to inclusiveness to fiscal prudence. Our team has worked hard to make Placentia a leader in our County and throughout the region. Recently, we took on the task of regaining the illustrious title of "All-America City." It has been several years (1971 to be exact) since we won this distinguished award and Placentia was the first City in Orange County to win the award at that time.

Moving forward, we will proudly represent Placentia at the National competition on **Saturday, June 23<sup>rd</sup>** in Denver, Colorado. ### Residents Can Sign Up to Receive Local Alerts

The City has partnered with Nixle to provide an Emergency Notification System to alert residents in real-time about critical emergency information and relevant community advisories in Placentia. Notifications may be sent for crime alerts, power outages, road closures, construction advisories, and weather-related issues such as flooding. Subscribers have the ability to select how they would like to receive notifications. These alerts can be sent to a home, cell or business phone, email, text message or hearing impaired receiving devices at no cost to the subscriber.

To register, residents or business owners in Placentia can simply text **92870** to **888777** from a mobile phone. Once registered, residents will receive a confirmation text message. Residents may also customize their alert settings by going to [www.nixle.com](http://www.nixle.com) and creating a user profile. All alerts will be targeted geographically, allowing residents to receive localized, relevant alerts from the City of Placentia.



### City of Placentia Wins Planning Award for Old Town Plan

The City of Placentia was recently presented with an Award of Merit by the Orange Section of the American Planning Association (APA). This prestigious award was presented to the City for the Old Town Placentia Revitalization Plan, which was adopted by the City Council in July 2017. Director of Development Services, Joe Lambert and Senior Planner, Andrew Gonzales were on hand to accept the award on behalf of the City. City staff submitted a nomination for the Old Town Placentia Revitalization Plan under the category of Urban Design and a jury of Orange County Planning Professionals chose this project for the Award of Merit.

“The City team including staff from Development Services, Public Works, and Administration put in thousands of hours on this project and conducted more than 26 outreach meetings to gain input on this great master plan,” said City Administrator, Damien R. Arrula. “This was a project a few years in the making and it was nice to see colleagues in Orange County recognize our team’s efforts.”

The Orange Section of APA California includes over 500 professional planners representing the public, private and academic sectors. The Orange Section is a non-profit organization devoted to advancing the science of physical, economic and social planning at the local, regional, state and national levels. The purpose of the Orange Section awards program is to encourage quality in planning and to increase the public’s awareness of the planning profession by recognizing local achievements in the field.

The City is currently updating its General Plan, a key planning document that will shape the future of your community by providing direction for growth and change in Placentia. The General Plan will include goals, policies, and implementation actions addressing important community needs ranging from land use and mobility, to public safety. Some of the newer General Plan elements include Economic Development, Sustainability and Health and Wellness.

Community Participation is a critical part of the EIR process. The Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the City of Placentia General Plan is currently under review. The Purpose of the EIR is to discuss and disclose the environmental impacts that are reasonably foreseeable, and identifies the likely environmental effects of the continuing operations of an existing facility or those of a proposed project, and proposes measures to avoid, mitigate, or offset them.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT

### Interior Car Temperatures are a Serious Threat to Children and Pets.

On **Thursday, June 7<sup>th</sup>**, Placentia Police Officers arrested a Placentia resident for leaving her eighteen-month old toddler unattended in a hot car. Officers were flagged down by a concerned bystander, who directed Officers to the child in a car parked in the 100 block of E. Yorba Linda Blvd. The toddler was found alone, fastened in child car seat, with the windows rolled down just a few inches. With an outside temperature of 77 degrees in this case, the hot interior car temperature and lack of ventilation endangered the safety of the toddler. Fortunately, the toddler was discovered quickly and did not suffer any heat injuries.

It is important to remember that even on mild weather days, the temperature inside a closed vehicle can reach dangerous levels, posing serious risk to those left inside. In fact, heat stroke is the leading cause of deaths in vehicles (excluding crashes) for children 14 years old and younger. Since 1998, an average 37 children have died each year in the U.S. of vehicular heat stroke. The danger from high temperatures is particularly acute for young children because their bodies heat up three to five times faster than adults, according to the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP). Children lack the ability to efficiently regulate their body temperature and they dehydrate more quickly than adults. The Placentia Police Department reminds you that children and pets, should never be left alone in cars.

June 8: at 1124 hours, a medium watershed response was dispatched for a report of a small fire on the right shoulder of the Northbound 73 Tollway at Catalina View. Several calls were received. At 1136 hours, Battalion 4 reported that he could handle with E222 and E22. The remaining of the assignment was cancelled including a fixed wing aircraft and Copter 2. Duke airship was in the area and had reported nothing showing.

### **Laguna Woods**

Firefighters were working on knockdown, holding the fire to the kitchen, offensive attack, and working on a primary all clear. ### **Westminster**

### **Yorba Linda**

## **Pre-Fire Management**

- Last week, Wildland Resource Planner Dave Erickson and Administrative Assistant Kim Gomi submitted applications for two CAL FIRE Fire Prevention Grants that pertain to: (1) the purchase of additional remote wildfire detection cameras and the associated meteorological sensors (\$90K), and (2) comprehensively targeting the invasive tree pest problem in Orange County by requesting grant funding to: (A) perform annual aerial NDVI mapping for all county SRA/SRA-threat areas, (B) develop a predictive model to detect infestations from the NDVI flights, (C) conduct subsequent ground truth/tree tagging surveys, (D) remove thousands of severely infested trees, and (E) purchase a mobile Air Curtain Burner to safely and effectively dispose of the diseased wood (\$5.9MM).
- This week, AFM Nick Pivaroff and Wildland Resource Planner Dave Erickson are attending a drone class after passing Part 1 of 7 of the FAA certification test on Monday, June 11, 2018.
- Fire Prevention Specialist Kim Brown attended the North Tustin Fire Safe Council meeting on Tuesday, June 12, 2018 where the discussion included: (1) a concern about Red Flag Warnings, what they area they refer to, and when they go out, based on a recent Nextdoor App notification by the OCFA Education and Community Outreach section, (2) the distribution of Alert OC sign-up information to 41 neighborhoods via Nextdoor, (3) an interest in building a relationship with the Fire Safe Council East Orange County Canyons to learn about their history and ideas for projects and community education, and (4) the FSC is looking for one volunteer from each HOA to become part of the FSC to get representation from each community and grow the membership.
- Last week, and continuing this week, the Santiago Crew and Heavy Equipment section have been busy with both suppression and mop up efforts for not only the Aliso Fire, but for the other multiple vegetation fires that have occurred since then.
