### Residents Can Sign Up to Receive Local Alerts

The City has partnered with Nixle to provide an Emergency Notification System to alert residents in real-time about critical emergency information and relevant community advisories in Placentia. Notifications may be sent for crime alerts, power outages, road closures, construction advisories, and weather-related issues such as flooding. Subscribers have the ability to select how they would like to receive notifications. These alerts can be sent to a home, cell or business phone, email, text message or hearing impaired receiving devices at no cost to the subscriber.

To register, residents or business owners in Placentia can simply text **92870** to **888777** from a mobile phone. Once registered, residents will receive a confirmation text message. Residents may also customize their alert settings by going to [www.nixle.com](http://www.nixle.com) and creating a user profile. All alerts will be targeted geographically, allowing residents to receive localized, relevant alerts from the City of Placentia.

To kickoff National Mosquito Control Awareness Week and the summer season:

- OCMVCD has partnered with local cities to post 38 bus shelters and billboards throughout the county this summer with the #MosquitoFreeOC message, including Placentia's digital billboard.
- Thirty-eight OCTA OC Access buses will be displaying the message on their route throughout the county.
- The District is releasing a Public Service Announcement video with tips and recommendations for a mosquito-free home in English, Spanish, and Vietnamese. The message will also be broadcasted on Spanish and Vietnamese radio.
- The District's social media pages will again be highlighting mosquito prevention tips and tricks and awarding prizes to engaged participants.
- You will also see OCTA OC Access buses displaying the #MosquitoFreeOC message on their exterior tails.



#### TIPS:

#### INSPECT YOUR YARD WEEKLY

Inspect your property regularly for standing water, and tip or toss any containers filled with water at least once a week.

#### REPLACE SCREEN DOORS

Close all unscreened doors and windows to prevent mosquitoes from entering your home or space; repair broken or damaged screens.

#### DRAIN CONTAINERS AND OBJECTS

Turn over containers and objects that cannot be thrown away and properly protect them from the rain or sprinkler water.

#### DUMP WATER FROM PLANT SAUCERS

Pour out water from potted plant saucers to eliminate mosquito breeding.

#### SCRUB PET BOWLS

Clean and scrub bird baths and pet water bowl weekly to eliminate mosquito eggs.

## PUBLIC WORKS

### Completion of Residential Street Maintenance Project

The City of Placentia completed its first SB 1 funded project, the Residential Slurry Seal Project in the northern portion of the City. The project involved slurry sealing 424,581 square feet of residential streets. The project limits were the residential neighborhood north of Golden Avenue between Kraemer Boulevard and Valencia Avenue. This project was solely funded by SB 1, the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017. This law, signed by Governor Brown, increased the Statewide excise gas tax for the purpose of creating a new revenue stream from which to provide local governments additional funds to repair and maintain roads and improve transportation systems. The City of Placentia has received these funds during this current fiscal year, and beginning next fiscal year we estimate the City will receive approximately \$900,000 per year for the next nine years.



The project was completed within two weeks after City Council awarded the construction contract to Petrochem Materials Innovation (PMI) on May 15, 2018. The City's existing Purchasing and Contract Guidelines allows for the "piggybacking" onto previously bid and awarded contracts by other public agencies. As such, the City was able to "piggyback" onto the City of Los Angeles' existing contract with PMI for on-call slurry seal projects that was previously competitively bid. This enabled the City to complete this much needed residential street maintenance project within budget and a short time frame.

The scope of work for this project included the placement of a rubberized slurry seal across the entire width of each street. Slurry seal is a combination of oil and sand and is used as part of a preventative maintenance program to seal roadway surfaces and extend the useful life of our roads. This slurry seal application sealed pavement cracks to prevent water intrusion into the road base which can undermine the roadway and lead to much more expensive repairs in the future. The streets in this project area were previously crack-sealed by Public Works Maintenance Staff saving approximately \$20,000 in additional contracting costs. In addition, pavement markings and traffic striping was completed by Staff allowing the City to stretch its project budget further. Given the limited road maintenance resources in this current fiscal year, the City was only able to focus on preventative maintenance work and not more costly rehabilitation or reconstruction work on our most heavily damaged roadways.



The additional Gas Tax revenues will be an important source of funding for road maintenance and rehabilitation work for the City of Placentia in the coming years. It is estimated that the increase in the Statewide Gas Tax will bring more than \$9 million to Placentia over the course of the program which will help to address the City's existing street maintenance backlog.

The Mayor, City Council, and Staff appreciate the patience exercised by residents during this construction period.



## POLICE DEPARTMENT

### Placentia Police Patrol Division Welcomes K9 Kyra

In addition to having two canines working the streets at night providing seven day coverage, the Placentia Police Department is proud to announce the addition of a third canine to the Patrol Division. K9 Handler King and K9 Kyra are now working together during the day to help fight crime and drugs in Placentia. K9 Kyra is a four year old, female, Belgian Malinois. K9 Kyra was donated several years ago to the Placentia Police Canine Foundation, and has since served with the DEA. K9 Kyra was recently reassigned to the Patrol Division, while still being able to assist the DEA when needed. K9 Handler King and K9 Kyra recently passed certification and can be seen patrolling the streets during the day.

## **Did you know that 20% of adults in the U.S. read at or below the basic level needed to earn a living wage?**
